Committee Holds Up Go Slow Sign On Tax Cuts

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Senate-Economic subcommittee today held up a go-slow sign against any precipitate tax-cutting moves in the 1956 congressional session.

"A tax rate reduction next year in the face of a booming economy might well be inflationary," said a report signed by two Democrats and two Republicans on the Tax Policy subcommittee.

It held out hope, however, that if things go well in the next 10 years, taxes may be cut "perhaps by as much as one third" in that period.

The subcommittee, headed by Rep. Mills (D-Ark.), conducted extensive hearings earlier this month, taking testimony from 31 economists, lawyers and other tax experts.

Its report said that wise tax policy calls for rates high enough in boom times to pay off some of the federal debt and soak up excess purchasing power.

"We should reduce the federal debt during periods of boom to offset the deficits resulting during periods of recession and depression."

Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.), a subcommittee member and chairman of the full Senate-Economic Committee, filed a supplemental report saying he favors "some re-adjustment" in federal tax laws.

He suggested cuts in income tax rates on the highest and lowest brackets, but said the tax cuts should be offset by "plugging or reducing" loopholes. He called for repeal of the special tax relief for stockholders voted in 1954, and cutting down on the depletion allowance for large oil and gas operators. Among other things.

The subcommittee's report said a balanced budget is likely for the current fiscal year, which ends next June 30, because of increased revenues resulting from booming business.
