All-College Play Captured By Tulsa

The little fellow still can't a bit show in college basketball, after all.
Largely because of two under-sized players, Tulsa won Oklahoma City's All-College Tournament and Murray State took the title in Louisville, Kentucky Invitational Tournament.
Junior Born, a 5-10 guard, registered 32 points in leading Tulsa to an upset 6-38 victory last night over 10th-ranked Oklahoma City. He was named the tournament's most valuable player.
Oklahoma A&M, after watching a 24-point lead dwindle to 6, snapped back to stop Seattle 63-52 for third place.
Dick Kinder, who stands only 5-11, tallied 25 points to lead Murray to a 74-69 victory over favored Western Kentucky. Three free throws by Kinder in the closing minutes choked off the threat of the Hilltoppers, who had rallied to narrow Murray's lead to 92-81.
A couple of other little men, Margery Thompson of Iowa State and captain Dallas Dobbs of Kansas, led their respective teams into the final round of the Big Seven Tournament at Kansas City.
Thompson, a flashy 5-10 guard, sank four successive free throws in the last minute as Iowa State overcame a closing Colorado challenge to win 55-52. Dobbs, 5-11, scored 21 points as the Jayhawks swept past Missouri 73-56 for the third time. Iowa State for the championship tonight.
Miami of Florida, paced by Dick Miami's 35 points, defeated Tulane 85-75 and moved into the final of the Orange Bowl at Miami Beach. The Hurricanes were joined by West Virginia, who turned back Columbia 75-60 despite a 34-point effort by 5-9 Cliff Forte of the Lions. Rod Hundley led the West Virginians with 23 points.
Clemson knocked Seion Hall of South Orange, N.J., from the unbeaten ranks with a 82-51 victory in the semifinal round of the Richmond Invitational at Richmond but Army's 11 Mark Binstein stole the headlines with a 50-point performance as the Cadets whopped Rhode Island in a consolation game 99-74. Richmond joined Cincinnati in the final round, defeating William and Mary 72-60.
New York's Madison Square Garden comes off tonight, with San Francisco seeking its 36th victory in a row against UCLA.
Clemson won the Gator Bowl Tournament, defeating South Carolina 94-87 in the title game at Jacksonville.

Pelicans Topple Jefferson 69-64

Klamath Rally Hands Jeff First Cage Loss

Coach Don Peterson's Klamath Union High School Pelicans rallied for 36 points in the second half Thursday night at Pelican Court to turn the tables on the visiting Jefferson Democrats of Portland and capture an exciting 69-64 victory. The loss knocked the Demos from the unbeaten list.
Pelican followers had all but given up as the Pelicans trailed 49-33 at halftime, then dropped 11 points behind the smooth playing band of Portland preppers. But the roof fell in on the visitors as Earle Tichenor and Glenn Moore spearheaded a Klamath P.A. 11 surge that could not be contained by coach John Neely's charges.
High-scoring Jerry Anderson sent the Jefferson stock soaring in the opening moments of the third quarter as he hit three consecutive field goals to give the Jeffs a 46-35 lead, the widest of the non-league ball game. But Donn Taucher on a pair of free throws and one field goal to cut the margin back to seven points. Jefferson's Chuck Rask and Art Krohn traded baskets with Klamath's Butch Kimpson and Moore to maintain the same seven point spread.
With just about two minutes remaining in the quarter, Tichenor hooked a field goal. Kimpson followed with one of two free throws and Moore tallied on a tip-in when Kimpson missed his second free throw attempt as the Pelicans led the scoreboard figures to a 52-50 count. The final minutes of the third period continued to find the teams' matchups point for point and Jeff held a 55-53 lead going into the final stanza.
FIRST LEAD
Klamath took their first lead of the ball game with five and a half minutes remaining to play. Tichenor again twisted the screw with a right-handed hook shot to drop the Demos on the short end of a 58-56 count. But Jeff rebounded back into the lead 59-58 on two charity tosses by Rask. Bob Berreman sent the visitors three points to the front on a field goal with 2:40 remaining.
Orin Perkins countered with a bucket 20 seconds later to cut the margin back to one point again, setting the stage for the deciding lead in the nip and tuck battle. With only two minutes and 35 seconds left in the contest, Taucher dropped in a jump shot to the right of the free throw line and the Pelicans were back in front 62-61. Tichenor added a free throw and Moore stuffed a field goal through the net when he was left unguarded under the Klamath basket to give the Whitebirds a 65-61 lead. Tichenor hit from underneath the basket for two more points and Donn Taucher hit two out of two from gift-shot alley to close out

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—A warmup drill for the East team and a skull session for the West squad wound up training today for the Shrine East-West football classic.
The game will be played tomorrow in San Francisco's Kezar Stadium.
Coach Woody Hayes of the East, steadfastly refused to tell his starting lineup.
"I'd be hurting some kid's feelings," he said as he ran the squad through a half-hour warmup drill in sweat suits.
There seemed to be little doubt, however, that his No. 1 attacking team would have Garek Reichow of Iowa at quarterback. Hopalong Cassidy of Ohio State at left half, Len Moore of Penn State at right half and Don Schaefer of Notre Dame at fullback.
Schaefer was in the Santa Clara infirmary yesterday with a cold, but he insisted he'd be on the firing line tomorrow.
"I don't care if I have pneumonia," he declared. "I didn't come all the way out here to lie in bed."
The other starters for the East, judging from workouts, could be: Ends, Jim Katcavage, Dayton, and Will Frye, North Carolina; tackles, Dick Murley, Purdue, and Francis Machinsky, Ohio State; guards, Ray Lemek, Notre Dame and Calvin Jones, Iowa; center, Ken Vargo, Ohio State.
The East pulled a "sneak" drill yesterday morning. After a 1-2 hour session, the players elected Jones and Vargo as co-captains.
At Stanford, West Coach Stan Hill gave out his starting assignments yesterday after what he called a "most satisfying" workout during which all phases of the running and passing attack were polished.
The backfield was composed of southpaw Jim Contratto of Southern California, a fine ball handler, at quarter; Preston Carpenter, Arkansas, left half; Herb Nakken, Utah, right half; and Henry Moore, Arkansas, fullback.
The starting line will have Henry Greimier of Baylor and Menan Schriever of Texas at ends; Lon Stiner, Oregon, and Forrest Gregg, Southern Methodist, tackles; John Janikans, Arizona State (Tempe) and Orlando Ferrante, Southern California, guards; and Joe Long, Stanford, at center.

OSC Falls In Dixie Cage Play

Three Pacific Northwest major college basketball teams fell before Eastern foes in tournament competition Thursday night, but not without a tussle.
Oregon State, opening in the Dixie Classic at Raleigh, N.C., staged a last half rally that all but caught defending champion North Carolina State, then bowed, 59-54. Behind 34-21 at the half, the Beavers pulled to within one point three times in the last four minutes. A six-point N.C. State rally put out the fire.
In finals of the Louisiana Invitational tournament at Shreveport, Washington State saw its 32-30 halftime lead vanish in the second period and Centenary, paced by Jimmy Edelein, who scored 29 points, rolled to a 63-55 final victory. WSC took second place and Cougar forward Larry Beck was named the tournament's most valuable player.
Seattle University fought back from a 24-point deficit but couldn't quite catch the Oklahoma Aggies who settled for third place in the All College Tournament at Oklahoma City with their 63-52 victory.
Oregon State tackles its second opponent of the Dixie Classic Friday night, meeting Minnesota in the consolation division.
Idaho returns to action Friday night, playing Colorado A&M at Twin Falls, Idaho.

Top Slatmen Vie For Spot On Ski Squad

SPOUT SPRINGS, Ore. (AP)—Some of the world's best slatmen were to move out across the rolling hills in a countryside Friday in quest of the national cross country and open ski championships. Plus a position on the U.S. Olympic ski team.
And when the day's events are over the resulting statistical tangle will take the services of a certified public accountant to unravel.
The skiers actually were in three main groups. The first group, for purposes of this explanation only, are the 20 men seeking Olympic team positions. Friday's competition will count as the third of three tryouts for the U.S. cross country team which will represent the nation in Italy next month.
It also will count for the Olympics hopefuls, for the national medal winner and the open cup winner. Conceivably, one skier could win a berth on the Olympic team and cop the medal and cup, too.
The second group consists of 10 other U.S. citizens seeking the national and open cups.
Then, because Scandinavians can't win the national title, an aggregation of Finns, Swedes and Norwegians were expected to seek the open title, specially set up for them.
Americans can't win the national titles in the Scandinavian countries, either, and that's why we excluded them.
Considered as top contenders for the national and open titles were Ted Farwell, Montague City, Mass.; Larry Damon, Burlington, Vt.; and Leo Halgren, Tacoma, Wash. Eirik Bergstrom, a Norwegian exchange student attending the University of Idaho, was picked as the man to beat for the open title.
Farwell and Damon also were battling for positions on the 3-man Olympic ski teams. Farwell is second-ranking man in competition so far to represent the U.S. in the Nordic (combined jumping and cross country) events. He is third in cross country competition and Damon is fourth.
A Farwell win Friday could knock Damon out of the cross country running and send him to team as a specialist in that event instead of a Nordic member.
