Circuit Series Announced By KF Watchtower Society

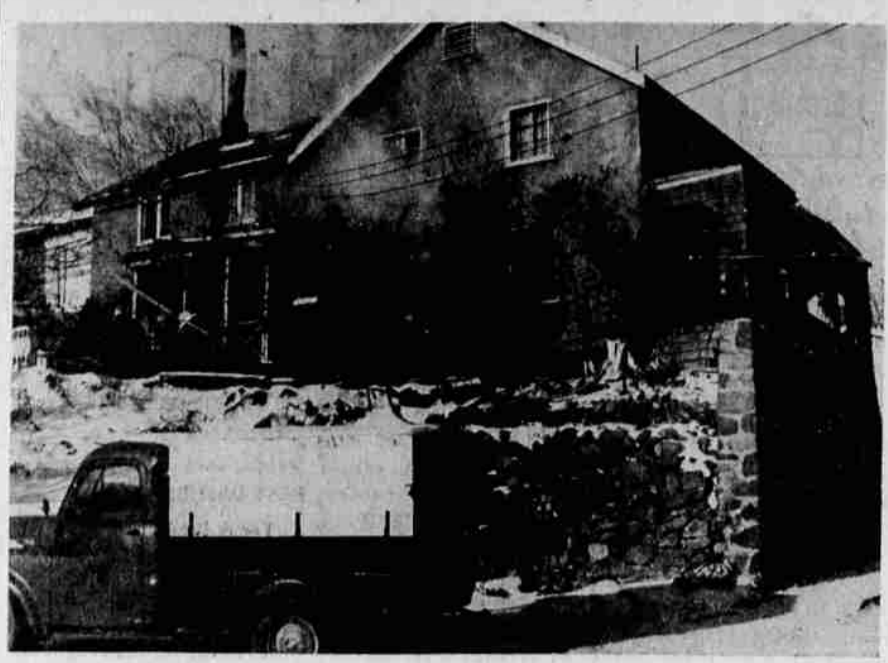
The Watchtower Bible and Tract Society will sponsor a three day circuit assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses in Klamath Falls Friday, Saturday and Sunday, January 6, 7 and 8. The assembly, which will be held at the Klamath County Fairgrounds, 3600 South Sixth Street, is for Bible instruction and concentrated gospel preaching in this area, spokesman for the group announced today.

The convention will consist of morning, afternoon and evening sessions of Bible talks, discussions, and demonstrations, which are open to the public without charge. Opening Friday evening at 7 o'clock, delegates will attend from 19 communities in Southern Oregon and Northern California to participate in the first local circuit assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses in seven years.

Klamath Falls householders have been asked, in a personal visit by the witnesses, to provide moderate priced rooms for the attending ministers and their families. Available hotel and motel rooms have been booked in Klamath Falls and surrounding areas.

The pre-convention activity will move into its final phase with the arrival of Mr. Nicholas Kovalak Jr., of New York, the featured speaker of the assembly, and Mr. Lawrence Kraushaar, convention chairman, Tuesday, January 3. Highlighting this activity will be the public lecture given by Mr. Kovalak Tuesday evening at 8 p.m. at the Kingdom Hall of Jehovah's Witnesses at 833 North Ninth Street.

Jehovah's Witnesses open the gates of the Klamath County Fairgrounds to the citizens of Klamath Falls, but all are invited to attend from the opening on Friday through Sunday. Particularly do they extend an invitation to the high point of the convention, namely, the widely advertised talk "Overcoming Fears Of This Generation" by Mr. Nicholas Kavalak Jr., district minister of Jehovah's Witnesses, on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Upwards of one thousand delegates are expected to attend this discourse.



SMOKE POURS from the first floor of a two story and basement apartment house at 510 North Seventh Street, which was severely damaged by fire Thursday morning. Two persons were injured in the blaze, Mrs. Mae Taylor, owner of the building, in whose apartment the fire began, and Harry L. Turner, a tenant. The fire began when some clothing on top of a hot air furnace register caught fire. It spread up to the second floor of the building, but firemen were able to keep it inside the house, where it was not fanned by the high wind blowing at the time. No estimate of damage was available.

Girl Waives Jury Probe

Grand jury investigation was waived by Charles Hood Eggman, 19-year-old Chiloquin housewife, when she was arraigned late Friday on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. She was ordered held for the grand jury.

The Eggman girl is accused of striking a 19-year-old Chiloquin housewife, Phyllis Hill, with a broken beer bottle on Roland Lalo, 59, during a drinking party at the Pat Jackson ranch.

Both girls are reported to have fled after their alleged victim was found unconscious at the Jackson ranch by Deputy Sheriff Alvie Youngblood. Lalo was taken to Klamath Agency Hospital where he required 58 stitches to close the wounds in his head.

The fugitives were arrested by Portland police. Mrs. Eggman was returned to Klamath Falls Friday morning by Deputy Sheriff Dale Matton. Deputy Sheriff Del Summers left for Portland Friday night to take the Hill girl into custody.

Sheriff Murray Britton said his investigation indicated that a long-standing feud between the Lalo and Eggman families was responsible for the cutting affray.

The Jackson ranch has been the scene of two killings in the past two years. Numerous raids on the place have been staged by Police Chief Lewis Jones of Chiloquin. He described it as a "wino hangout."

Aliens Must Make Report

Commissioner J. M. Swing reminded non citizens today that they must report their addresses to the Immigration and Naturalization Service during each January under provisions of the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act.

The commissioner urged all aliens to go to the nearest post office or immigration office to fill out an address report card in compliance with the requirement.

Swing pointed out that willful violation of the act could make an alien subject to a fine or deportation.

The commissioner noted that some 2,300,000 aliens reported their addresses under the act last year. He said the figure is expected to top the two and one-half million mark in 1956.

He stressed that the address report cards must be filled out during January to be in compliance with the law.

Mr. John W. Wilson, of the local office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service said the address report cards are now available at all post offices, and joined with the commissioner in urging that all aliens fill out cards as soon as possible.

Mr. Wilson explained that to comply with the law the alien must fill out a card and hand it to a post office or immigration clerk. No alien should mail his own card.

Woman Dies In Son's Home

Mrs. Margaret K. Schaeffer, 80, native of Bloomington, Illinois, died December 30 at the home of a son, Dorman Schaeffer, owner of the Linda Vista Apartments in Klamath Falls.

She was a member of the Methodist Church and a charter member of Marion Chapter OES of Helena, Montana.

Survivors include in addition to her son of this city, two daughters, Mrs. C. L. Colbert, Helena, Montana, Mrs. A. B. Marlow, Holy, Indiana; a sister, Mrs. W. H. George, Great Falls, Montana; four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be announced by O'Hair's Memorial Chapel.

Soil Banking Meet Scheduled

Oregon farm leaders are scheduled to meet at Oregon State College in late January to study and develop recommendations to the U.S. department of agriculture and Congress on the much discussed "soil bank."

Some 35 agricultural leaders at a recent preliminary meeting at the college requested OSC officials to compile information on proposed approaches to the "soil bank" idea for reducing surplus farm production and saving soil for future needs.

F. E. Price, OSC dean of agriculture, has appointed a special committee to organize and digest all current proposals for study at the January session. He said representatives of all organized farm groups in Oregon will be notified as soon as possible of the exact meeting date.
