Home Designer Utilizes Wood

The luxury of fine wood paneling and similar interior trim is within the reach of most U.S. home buyers, a leading western architect observes.

John K. Smeed, AIA member, whose contemporary home designs have attracted much attention in the west, says that modern styling has found smart, fresh ways of utilizing the traditional beauty of wood.

Intriguing and distinctive decorative effects can be achieved, he points out, by judicious use of paneling; a wall base, a corner or a full room. Such use of wood lends richness and grace to a home's interior.

Smeed is especially partial to some of the more popular western softwoods which are available at every crossroads in the nation. He says the texture, grain and natural colorings of Douglas fir, honey-toned west coast hemlock and autumn shades found in western red cedar offer the imaginative architect limitless opportunities to pass on this beauty to the home.

Wood is so flexible, Smeed points out, that it can be used in an endless variety of ways without, notably, to get desired effects. It has had increasing acceptance since the advent of the contemporary western home design because of its affinity for glass, brick and stone and other natural materials.

Wood is probably man's oldest known building material. Smeed observed, yet it is one of the newest because of its adaptability to any architectural style.
