Berger Named OSC Official

Appointment of a former Oregonian as extension information specialist at Oregon State College has been announced by P. L. Ballard, associate director of the Oregon extension service.

Burton Berger, who grew up on a farm near Oregon City and graduated from OSC, returns to Oregon from agricultural news work in Nebraska and Wisconsin. He will join the OSC agricultural news staff January 3.

Following graduation from OSC in 1954 with degrees in both agriculture and education, Berger earned a master's degree in agricultural journalism at the University of Wisconsin. He attended Wisconsin on a fellowship as an agricultural press writer. Since July, Berger has been in charge of agricultural press releases for the University of Nebraska extension service.

The new specialist also holds a degree from the Iliff School of Theology, Denver. Farming experience includes management of the home farm for two years following six years' military service during World War II, work with Grange youth groups, and 4-H Club work.

Berger will assist with press work for the OSC extension service and agricultural experiment station and in training extension staff members in information methods.

Oregon Political Activity Continued Light Last Week

Oregon political activity continued quiet in the closing week of 1955, a typical holiday calm.

The Republicans announced publication of their first annual yearbook, an 88-page illustrated presentation of party facts and viewpoints available from county finance chairmen at \$1 a copy.

Two changes in GOP leadership were announced. Mrs. Marshall Cornett, long the state's national Republican committeewoman, said she would not seek the position in May's primary voting. And Douglas T. Huegli of Palo Alto was

named executive secretary of the Republican State Central Committee.

Huegli's selection followed assignment of Clyde Brummell, who had been executive secretary, to fulltime field organizing, an activity getting special attention from Republicans now.

Democrats were mulling the choice of sending 16 delegates to the national convention with a full vote each, or sending 32 with a half vote each. State Chairman Howard Morgan said the party's state committee would decide in

early February. The purpose of doubling the number of delegates would be to allow more party workers a chance to participate in the convention.

Morgan said he preferred having only 16.

There was some talk of political overtones to the question whether Gov. Patterson should remove Multnomah County Sheriff Terry Schunk from office. A law says the governor must do so because of a court judgment against the sheriff.

Political possibilities existed be-

cause the governor, a Republican, had a chance to oust the sheriff, a Democrat who is viewed by the party as its best bet for secretary of state. The attorney general, a Democrat, said the law did indeed say the governor had to remove the sheriff. But Thornton added the law is unconstitutional and the governor can disregard it.

The matter faded when the governor said he would leave things alone.

Both Oregon United States senators had comments on the Northwest's rivers. Sen. Morse said he

will propose an atomic reactor power station at Hanford, using waste heat for power generation both to aid the Northwest and to provide a yardstick for performance of private utilities' reactor plants.

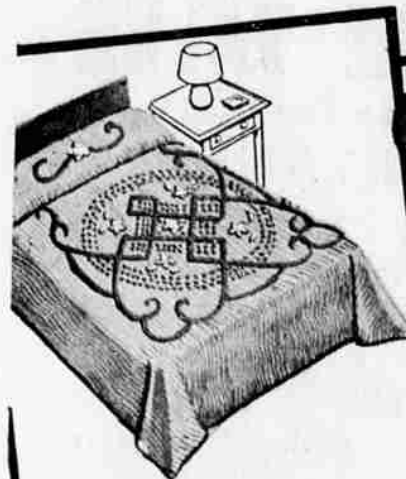

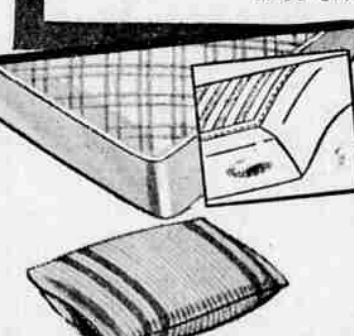
