Eden Calls Cabinet; Plan Talks On Middle East

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Eden called his Cabinet today to discuss the growing crisis in the Middle East and to consider Laborite demands for parliamentary debate on the government's policy of selling arms to Arabs and Israelis.

Eden assembled his minister after meeting Labor party leader Hugh Gattiskell and turning down a Socialist request that he invite the Kremlin to help maintain peace in the explosive Middle East.

The Cabinet meeting preceded an emergency conference tomorrow between Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and British ambassadors to eight Middle East countries who were suddenly ordered back to London.

Accompanying the flurry of diplomatic activity was a warning by Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion that Israel must be ready for imminent war with her Arab neighbors. Ben-Gurion told his Parliament, however, that was not "unavoidable."

Britain's press kept up a barrage of criticism against the Eden government over revelations that old British tanks and other surplus World War II goods have trickled through Belgium to the Middle East.

The government issued a statement pledging anew to do all in its power to prevent a Middle East arms race.

At the same time, it partially lifted its recent embargo on war surplus goods. It said such goods

could be shipped abroad if governments of the countries concerned could guarantee the material would not be reconditioned and resold for military purposes.

In response to Gattiskell's request for a "new approach" to Russia on Middle East issues, Eden said he already had made futile overtures to the Russians, who are busy wooing the Arab world and channeling arms to Egypt.

The Soviet answer, he said, "was not in the Geneva spirit." He said he doubted a new approach could gain anything "unless there was a change in the Russian attitude."

He said he undoubtedly would discuss the Middle East situation when he meets President Eisenhower in Washington later this month.

This was believed one of the reasons for Lloyd's sudden decision to summon Britain's Middle East envoys for talks here. It was reported they will be consulted in preparation for the Eden-Eisenhower meeting.

Henry Byroade, U.S. ambassador to Egypt, was slated to leave for Washington today on what was believed a similar mission to Secretary of State Dulles.

Byroade also was expected to fill in the State Department on reported Egyptian insistence that the World Bank must ease its terms before Cairo will accept a 200-million-dollar loan for the Aswan dam project.

Airmen Tell Storm Ordeal

KEMMERER, Wyo. (AP) — Two airmen today told how they survived two days in a blizzard raging over the rugged mountains of western Wyoming where they crash-landed their light plane.

"All I can say is that we were awfully lucky. We're both alive and I guess that's what counts,"

said the pilot, A.2.C. Kenneth Kiefer, 27, of Fort Collins, Colo. His passenger was A.2.C. Delbert Fluy, 22, of Evanston, Ind.

Kiefer said he and Fluy huddled in a snow shelter they built and later located a deserted summer ranch cabin.

They stayed there two days, eating a hardtack made of flour, sugar, salt and oatmeal, and a rabbit Fluy caught with his hands. They doused a haystack with kerosene and lit a signal fire, but it was not seen.

Finally, after the storm abated yesterday, they set out with a sled made from one of the plane's wings and heard a dog barking in the distance. They headed that way and met a rancher who drove them here. Neither was injured.

They had taken off in Kiefer's two-place Aeronca Chief from Rock Springs, Wyo., Saturday morning. They were headed to Travis Air Force Base in California after visiting Kiefer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Al Kiefer, in Fort Collins, Colo.

French Make Arms Claim

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) — A high French military source said today a steady stream of arms is reaching rebel forces in Algeria from across the Libyan border.

The informant said in an interview the munitions included British-manufactured grenades which were shown by serial number to have come from Egyptian army depots. Other arms, he said, were among some 300,000 weapons abandoned by German Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's army when it surrendered in Tunisia during World War II.

The source said Tunisian nationalists spirited these arms south to the Libyan frontier. Others were hidden in dumps and desert regions of Tripolitania during the war.

He said the rebels were trying to give themselves the appearance of regular troops by wearing American surplus Army uniforms picked up in Tunisia.

The informant said that Algerian rebels were being trained by Mohammed el Kettabi, brother of the famed lord of the riff, Abd El Krim.

He said they were receiving commando training at three camps in Egypt.

Rebel forces captured a 13-man French garrison and killed six only 20 miles outside Algiers before dawn yesterday. The remaining seven men were still reported missing.

The daring attack came several hours after a French armored patrol killed 16 rebels in an assault near Meskian, about 80 miles from the Tunisian border.

Church Plans Tomb Opening

LONDON (AP) — The Church of England has given permission to open a tomb in a Kent County church in an effort to determine if Christopher Marlowe wrote the plays attributed to William Shakespeare.

After a hearing in Chislehurst's mellow old St. Nicholas Church, Chancellor Percy Lamb of the diocese of Rochester ruled Maj. John Marlowe — Townshend, lord of the manor of Scadbury, could open the 16th century tomb believed to contain the body of Marlowe's patron Thomas Walsingham and others of his family.

Partisans of Marlowe hope to find inside papers that will bear out this theory:

Marlowe, a rising dramatist and poet, fell under suspicion of treason and Queen Elizabeth's privy council ordered his arrest. To save his protegee, Walsingham arranged a tavern stabbing and had a farmer's body identified as Marlowe's.

Then he secluded the poet at one of his estates, where Marlowe turned out "Hamlet," "King Lear" and the rest of the dramas. To get the plays produced, Walsingham hired a dull poacher recently come to London, William Shakespeare of Avon, to give them his name.

The pro-Marlowe scholars figure Walsingham would not have died without leaving some evidence of his great secret. They reckon his tomb was the logical hiding place.

Calvin Hoffman, a New York writer, has been one of the most energetic of those seeking to have the tomb opened, but he was not mentioned in the hearing at Chislehurst.

The lord of the manor said he has set no date to commence operations.

GERMANS ARRIVE

NEW YORK (AP) — The first German soldiers to come to the United States in uniform since World War II arrived here by plane yesterday to study at U. S. Army schools.

The 38 officers and enlisted men from West Germany's new army will be here from three to six months.
