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Atomic Ship Work Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress is being asked to authorize building of the first atom-driven surface warship and in other ways to speed the Navy's progress into the nuclear age.

A Navy ship construction bill introduced Tuesday by Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of the House Armed Services Committee includes authority for:

1. A light cruiser, nuclear-propelled and intended to be used as a guided missile launcher.
2. Six more atomic submarines. The one the Navy has in service and the second under construction for it are, so far as is known, the only atomic vessels in the world today.

3. Plans and designs for an atomic power plant to drive an aircraft carrier equivalent to the Forrestal, the biggest in the present fleet.

The bill also would authorize building one more conventionally powered carrier of the Forrestal class.

The authorization bill calls also for extensive construction of landing and patrol craft and "modernization of a number of existing ships. Notable among the modernization proposals are those for installing canted flight decks on one large and three smaller carriers.

The Vinson bill was reported to be closely tailored to Defense Department plans for the Navy this year. It contained no expenditure figures, but unofficial estimates were that these would total in the same range as last year's program—about \$1,300,000,000.

Lumbermen Okay Wage Proposal

International Woodworkers of America (CIO) local union 6-221, Butte Falls, has accepted a Medford corporation proposal for a graduated wage increase averaging 8 1/2 cents per hour according to the Pine Industrial Relations Council.

The increases are effective retroactive to December 16, 1955, the PIRC said. Contractual issues are closed until June 1, 1957, and wage rates are closed until April 1, 1957, with a provision for an interim opening for a general wage change by 60 days notice prior to January 1, 1957, the PIRC announcement said.

IWA Local 6-221 represents the approximately 180 wood employees of the Medford corporation in collective bargaining.

Plant employees accepted a similar graduated increase on December 19, 1955, by company agreement with lumber and sawmill workers (AFL) local union 2715, the PIRC added.

Three Of Quads Die In Hospital

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP)—Three of quadruplet boys born prematurely Monday died yesterday in Lancaster General Hospital. The surviving quad, reported previously as being in "good" condition, was listed in "fair" condition today.

The survivor is Norman Charles Hohenwarter, the first born. The four weighed a total of 14 pounds 7 ounces.

The father, Norman C. Hohenwarter, a 35-year-old postal clerk, said he and his wife Regina, 25, had been expecting twins in about a month. The Hohenwarters have two other sons, 6 and 3.
