But that's what they told Sam Fuller a few weeks ago at NBC when he was dispatched to Hollywood with orders to assemble a comedy program for the NBC-TV Sunday spot opposite Ed Sullivan on CBS-TV. The result, beginning this Sunday, is The NBC Comedy Hour.

It takes the place of The Colgate Variety Hour, which went that way after its audience was mauled by Sullivan's larger audience. "There's an erroneous impression abroad that we're getting together some kind of an amateur hour," Fuller said the other day when he dashed back to headquarters from the West Coast firing line. "But this is definitely not an amateur night in Dixie. We'll have the best comedians. We're going to do a show that looks fresh and thinks fresh—and is fresh."

The host will be none other than Leo Durocher, a gentleman of impeccable charm and vast good humor since he left the Polo Grounds and consummated a fat contract with NBC. Music will be incidental to comedy on the new program, which will appear three out of four weeks on Sundays.

Speaking of that heavily contested Sunday night spot, Kate Smith has just been signed for five appearances on the Ed Sullivan Show at a figure reportedly running over \$100,000. Her first appearance will be Feb. 5.

Funeral services were held today at 1 p.m. from the Conger-Morris Funeral Home, Ashland, for Tracy Boothby, 69, who died January 3. The Rev. Robert L. Greene, pastor of the Church of the Good Shepherd officiated. Commitment was in Memory Gardens Memorial Park.

Mr. Boothby was born July 13, 1886, in Ashland, the son of early day Oregon pioneers. He was married January 3, 1914, to Mrs. Edith Boothby, nee DeWitt, of Jacksonville, Oregon, on July 22, 1906 to Mary M. Manning, who survives him. He had been an employee of the California Oregon Power Company for 12 years prior to his retirement three years ago. He had made his home in the Prospect area almost his entire lifetime. He was a member of the Upper Rogue Grange.

Wesley Baker Begins Two Year State Prison Term

Wesley Bryon Baker, 46-year-old Klamath County rancher, was taken to Oregon State Prison Friday morning to serve two years for a Merrill safe burglary after the state supreme court refused to consider his appeal. Baker, who was convicted last March of stealing a safe from the Spud Cellar Tavern in Merrill, surrendered to Sheriff Murray Britton late Thursday. He had been at liberty under \$3,000 bond.

Rummage Sale Gets Canceled

DUNSMUIR—Members of the Dunsmuir High School P.T.A. voted Tuesday evening to cancel the annual rummage sale and send all surplus clothing to either the Red Cross or Salvation Army for flood relief.

The group will sponsor a food sale on January 27. Extra-curricular activities of the high school was the discussion subject at the meeting, led by Del Poe, principal. Dave Blount, Paul Reginato, James McClelland, Elsie Ellington, Charlotte Samuelson and David Erickson, members of the high school teaching staff, spoke on subjects of sports, music, drama, work on the annual and organization activities such as YW and Future Homemakers of America.

It was with the consensus that these activities enable the student to widen his experience, prepare him to meet later problems and teach him how to make personality adjustments.

Baker was sentenced to prison by Circuit Judge Ralph M. Holman of Oregon City, who was presiding at the time in Klamath County. After sentence had been passed, Defense Attorney U. S. Beesley filed notice of appeal and Baker was released on bond. District Attorney Richard Beesley revealed Friday that the defense failed to file the necessary papers with the supreme court within the legal time limit. Beesley filed a motion to dismiss the case with the high tribunal on grounds that the defendant failed to serve the prosecution with a copy of its brief within 30 days after the transcript of the case had been filed in Salem. The law holds that under such conditions, the judgment of the lower court may be affirmed. As soon as he was informed in Oregon City of the supreme court action, Judge Holman issued an order for Klamath County Sheriff Murray Britton to take Baker into custody and transport him to the state penitentiary for execution of the sentence. Baker was taken to Salem Friday morning by Deputy Sheriff Del Summers.
