## Fight Set For Flood Insurance

WASHINGTON (UP)—Chairman J. W. Fulbright of the Senate Banking Committee today pledged "immediate consideration" of legislation to provide flood insurance for future flood victims.

The administration sent a three billion dollar federal-state insurance program to Congress yesterday. A stack of other flood insurance bills also have been introduced.

All aim at protecting individuals against the devastating losses suffered during recent floods in California and the Northeast. Fulbright said his committee will discuss the proposals at its first regular meeting Monday and set a time for public hearings.

The Arkansas Democrat said he hopes hearings can be held later this month so a bill can be reported out for action by February. President Eisenhower in his state of the Union Message yesterday called for an experimental program of flood-damage insurance.

Sen. Prescott Bush (R-Conn.) promptly introduced the administration bill in the Senate. Rep. Jesse Wolcott (R-Mich.) introduced a similar bill in the House.

The administration bill calls for: 1. A five-year "experimental" program of flood insurance and re-insurance conducted by the federal government in cooperation with the states and private insurance companies. Flood damage would include coastal as well as inland flooding.

2. Individuals, including small businessmen and manufacturers, would be able to take out insurance policies to a maximum of \$250,000. The policies would contain a deductible clause specifying \$300 to 10 per cent of the claim will be deductible from damage payments.

3. The individual would pay 60 per cent of the insurance premium, the state 20 per cent and the federal government the remaining 20 per cent. The federal government would absorb all administrative costs.

4. Flood insurance totaling \$1,900,000,000 could be issued and the President empowered to authorize an additional one billion dollars.

5. The federal government would re-insure flood insurance issued by private companies a total of 100 million dollars so they could extend their coverage.

## Camp Okayed On Game Land

At a recent meeting of the game commission, the board of commissioners voted unanimously to allow public camping on lands administered by the Oregon Game Commission.

The policy as adopted will be by permit only and will allow overnight camping by groups or individuals for educational or recreational purposes as long as it does not conflict with the primary land uses or jeopardize wildlife or property.

All permits shall be issued by the area superintendents under the following conditions: The camping site and period of use shall be designated on the permit. Permittees shall agree to maintain the camp site in a sanitary and uncluttered condition and observe regulations for the prevention of fires and the safeguarding of lives and property. Permits shall be revocable in the event of any violation of laws or regulations pertaining to the area in question.

No permits will be required for camping on the Wenaha, White River and North Fork John Day River big game winter ranges for hunting or fishing purposes.

Two hubcaps were taken from an auto parked on the lot of the Motor Mart on Seventh Street, Klamath Falls police reported Thursday.

## Inter-Agency Council Hears Xmas Bureau Work Report

A report on the 1955 Christmas Clearing Bureau and consideration of coming program were on the agenda for the luncheon meeting of the Inter-Agency Council at the YMCA on January 4. Everett Peery, newly elected president, presided.

Paul Campbell, who headed the Christmas Bureau effort, announced that a total of 157 families were assisted. Food alone went to 33; toys alone to 11; both food and toys to 133 families. Seventeen organizations called the bureau to offer assistance; two individuals gave \$15 in cash, which was turned over to the Salvation Army to be used for slippers and food baskets. There were 56 direct phone calls made.

Appreciation was voiced for the assistance given by Rex Dye, executive secretary of the United Fund campaign, the use of his telephone and the help of his office assistants during the pre-holiday season when the program for the underprivileged was under way.

The suggestion was made that a starting period be named for the bureau work this year. Members present offered ideas on programs for the next four meetings that will precede the summer vacation period. Included were sessions on the Indian problem and education; a child guidance program by Dr. John Waterman of the Oregon State Department of Health and Dan Campbell, psychiatrist with the Klamath County Health Office; information on the mentally retarded, the local juvenile problem; clarification by a member of the bar association of the legal status of children; the housing and sanitation situation by a member of the city council and clarification of requirements for aid from various agencies.

## Driver Suffers Minor Injuries

One man suffered minor injuries in one of the two traffic accidents reported Wednesday afternoon by Klamath Falls office of the Oregon State Police.

Injured was George Spencer of Vancouver, Washington, driver of an auto involved in an accident at about 3 p.m., Wednesday on U.S. 97 seven miles north of Sand Creek. He suffered minor head injuries, police said.

The incident occurred when his southbound auto was sideswiped by a northbound auto driven by Karen I. Graves of Sand Point, Idaho. She said the vehicle she was following slowed down suddenly, and when she braked, her auto went out of control.

Both autos were severely damaged. Clay Wheeler of Medford reported he hit a horse near Sprague River Junction on Highway 66 at about 12:32 p.m., Wednesday. Wheeler said the horse got up and ran into the brush.

## Water Theme Set For Talks

FORT ROCK — "Fitting Irrigation Practices to Specific Soils" will be the subject of the second in a series of irrigation conferences to be held at 2 p.m., January 13, at the Fort Rock (Grange) Hall.

Fred Tilston of Hermiston, agriculture research service irrigation engineer, will be guest speaker. He will present data resulting from experiments conducted in the Fort Rock - Silver Lake Soil Conservation District last August.

The experimental tests, using a method of testing water penetration developed by Tilston, measured water on and off sample borders by means of recording graphs. Soil samples were processed to find moisture retention characteristics at various levels in the soil profile. Two tests were made at Fort Rock and one at Silver Lake.

At the December meeting, basic principles of soil and moisture were presented by Elgin Cornett, Lake County agent, and H. L. Leithead, SOCS specialist for the Bend area. Mrs. Leonard Pitcher spoke of her experience with an increase in the rate of penetration of water after a field has been irrigated several seasons. Robert Morehouse brought up discussion of the value of late fall irrigation of bare ground and the extent of evaporation loss through the winter season. Tilston's analytical report is expected to expand information concerning these and other local problems.
