DO SOMETHING DIFFERENT.

Have you ever wished you could give your living room or bedroom windows a new treatment without going to a lot of work and expense? For a novel, easy-to-keep-clean plan, try using wallpaper draperies. It's simple. Flank the window on each side with a three-panel standing screen the height of the window. Make the screens out of three 1-foot plywood sections hinged together. Select wallpaper in a color and pattern that fits well into the room plan and cover the screens with it. If you wish, use two patterns of wallpaper—one on one side, one on the other. Then you can reverse them from time to time. A floral pattern was chosen for the screens in the accompanying sketch to fit in with the Traditional decor of the room.
