Atomic Reactor In Plane Used As First Step In Atom Powered Craft Move

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Experiments with an atomic reactor in a plane B36 as part of a program to develop atomic-powered aircraft were announced yesterday by the Air Force and Convair aircraft.

"Among other things the reactor is used to investigate problems of shielding against radiation to study effects of radiation on aircraft materials and systems to develop airborne nuclear instruments," the joint announcement said.

All safety precautions have been taken and "the public can be assured that there is no danger of a nuclear explosion resulting from an accident to the aircraft," it said.

The announcement continued: "The reactor is never operated during takeoffs and landings. It is operated only when the aircraft is flying over a designated area where maximum public safety is attainable."

"Precautions taken also include informing local public officials throughout the Southwest concerning public safety measures to be taken in the unlikely event of an accident."

"In past months the aircraft has made numerous successful flights during which the reactor was operated. The aircraft is presently on the ground at the Convair plant undergoing preparations for further test flights."

The announcement follows a Fort Worth Star-Telegram report Saturday that police agencies in this area had been alerted on how to handle crowds if the bomber should crash.

The Dallas News quoted what it termed a reliable source who asked that his name be withheld as follows:

"The B36 flights in this area began about Dec. 1 and the Civil Aeronautics Administration asked the 'flying public' in a bulletin to avoid the plane which carries a brightly colored coat of paint."

The crew doesn't turn on the atomic reactor until the bomber has reached the test area near Hobbs, N.M.

"When it starts back to Texas, the atomic reactor is turned off."

The bomber is escorted by a C97 carrying paratroopers. The C97 waves off any other approaching aircraft and would drop the paratroopers to seal off the area in case the B36 crashes.
