Welfare Said "Efficient"

YREKA—In recognition of "no complaints of the administration of the welfare department of Siskiyou County, either from taxpayers or recipients of relief," the welfare committee of the 1955 grand jury closed its report with the statement that the department is well administered and operating efficiently.

The committee stated that examination had been made of the different types of cases handled by the department and found that a close check was kept on the needs of each case and adjustments made accordingly. The report also commended the staff for its accounting procedure.

Better School Move Gains

YREKA — Improvement of schools in Siskiyou County is "proceeding satisfactorily" according to the report of the school committee of the 1955 grand jury.

New construction underway and in the planning stage will relieve crowded conditions the report stated. Deficiencies noted include inadequate heating for the first and second grade rooms in the Dorris school and the need for more classrooms, play space, and office space.

YREKA — Dedication of the Greenhorn watershed will be sought by the city of Yreka. The city council directed the city clerk to petition the forest service to grant use of this area at its meeting last week.

Recommendation for this action was made by George Walker, secretary of the Yreka Water Development Committee. Walker stated that the committee's preliminary report will be ready March 1 and suggested seeking the Greenhorn watershed as an interim action.
