Role Of CAP Told By Group

The role of the Civil Air Patrol as an adjunct to the U.S. Air Force at the Klamath Falls air base was discussed at a meeting of CAP officers and Air Force personnel Friday, January 6 at the airport.

Lt. Col. Robert H. Larson, senior project officer for the USAF at the base, spoke on the equipment to be stationed here when the USAF units become fully operational. Col. Larson also discussed the part the CAP would be expected to play in air rescue and other missions which may come up from time to time.

CAP Lt. Everett Peery, commander of the Klamath Falls CAP squadron, said that the unit now has available for use a search and rescue team made up of the cadets and senior members equipped with skis and other winter equipment.

The squadron also has two new mobile radios owned by Warrant Officer John Barker with call letters of "Beaver Muskrat 103" and one owned by T-Sgt. John Wilson whose call letters are "Beaver Muskrat 107."

Col. Larson pointed out that as the CAP is an auxiliary of the USAF, it would be expected to be available for research and rescue missions in case of call by the USAF.

The senior air officer said that he was pleased to see the activity of the Klamath CAP and that he felt sure the CAP squadron could handle any job they may be called on to perform.

Designer Urges Romantic Era

NEW YORK (AP)—It's high time for a romantic era, in the opinion of David Gottlieb, a designer who has managed to create a sensation in the New York fashion industry in a comparatively short time.

The cocktail and evening dresses in his spring preview definitely dramatic, planned frankly for allure and designed to make any woman feel like a dream girl. He uses such fragile and delicate fabrics as chiffon, lace, net and silk organdie for these creations, often combines lace bodices with clouds of frothy organdie in bouffant skirts, does tricks with lace appliques and sprinkles stardust in the form of sequins.

A highlight of his collection is a short evening dress of white net, appliqued all over with red lace roses and dramatized with a wide sash of red taffeta. As contrast, he

shows a slim tube of lace tiers, bisected by a velvet belt.

Gottlieb likes white frosting for his daytime dresses in navy silk, dealing out wide capelet collars of lace and embroidered organdie with a lavish hand. These collars form dramatic accents to dark costumes, and he froths them with lace edging, elaborates them with appliques, sparks them with jewels, does them in double tiers and otherwise concerns himself with frosted frills.

Visiting fashion editors winding up a crowded week of spring fashion previews by New York designers also saw a showing of children's clothes today, observed new fashions in eyeglass frames and were given a concentrated briefing on the trends in jewelry for 1956—the "precious" look is the thing this year, they were told, and the bold ropes of beads of last season now are passe.

This is a prior hearing to the naturalization ceremony which will be held in Judge David R. Vandenberg's circuit court March 7.

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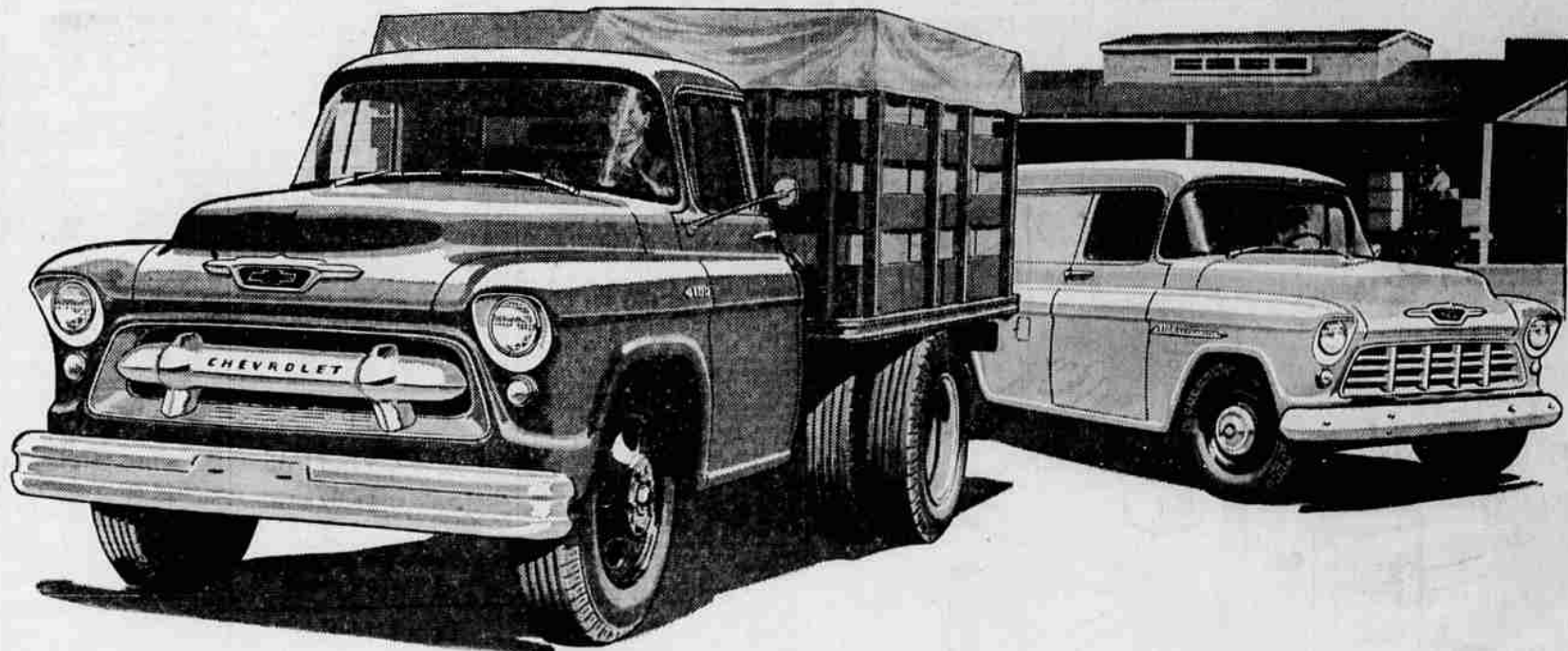
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
