

Logger Held In County Jail

Jimmy Aaron Parks, 47-year-old Lakeview logger, was held in the county jail here Thursday following his arrest by the Federal Bureau of Investigation on a charge of violating the interstate bogus check law.

The arrest was announced by J. F. Santolana, agent in charge of the FBI office in Portland.

An FBI agent who took Parks from Lakeview to Klamath Falls, said the suspect cashed a "spurious check drawn on a Washington state bank in Redding, California."

Parks was arraigned before United States Commissioner Bert Thomas late Wednesday afternoon. He was ordered held under \$2,500 bond.

Student Set For Treatment

DUNSMUIR—Tony Welch, Dunsmuir High School senior, injured in a scrimmage football game in September, entered the California Rehabilitation Center in Vallejo for therapy treatments Wednesday. He was taken there by ambulance from McCloud Hospital where he has been receiving care for three months.

Arrangements for this special care was made by the Crippled Children's Society which raises its funds through the sale of Easter Seals. Tony's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Welch, are also scheduled for assistance with hospital bills from Tony's fellow students who raised over \$750 last week through promotion of a benefit basketball game. The students are continuing their drive through January 16 to give all organizations who wish to donate as a group, the opportunity to do so.

Tony's expenses to date, in addition to hospital insurance payments, have cost over \$2,000. It is hoped that through therapy treatments, Tony can develop sufficient use of his upper body to be self-sufficient. Complete recovery has not been assured him.

Auto Loses Train Fight

An auto skidded into a Southern Pacific switch engine which was crossing South Sixth Street between Broad and Market streets Wednesday evening and came off second best in the encounter, Klamath Falls police reported today.

The auto, driven by Roger David Wagner, 2634 Eberlein Avenue, skidded into the locomotive, and had to be pulled out from under it by tow truck operators, police said. It was heavily damaged in the left front.

A ladder on the locomotive was bent about six inches out of line.

Investigating officers said that the skid marks on the auto were about 38 feet eight inches long.

Larry Johnson, 5716 Harlan Drive an SP flagman, said he attempted to warn Wagner, but was unable to do so.

Thursday morning, Wagner was sentenced to pay a fine of \$25 or serve 12½ days in jail on charges of violation of the basic speed rule by police Judge Frank Blackmer.

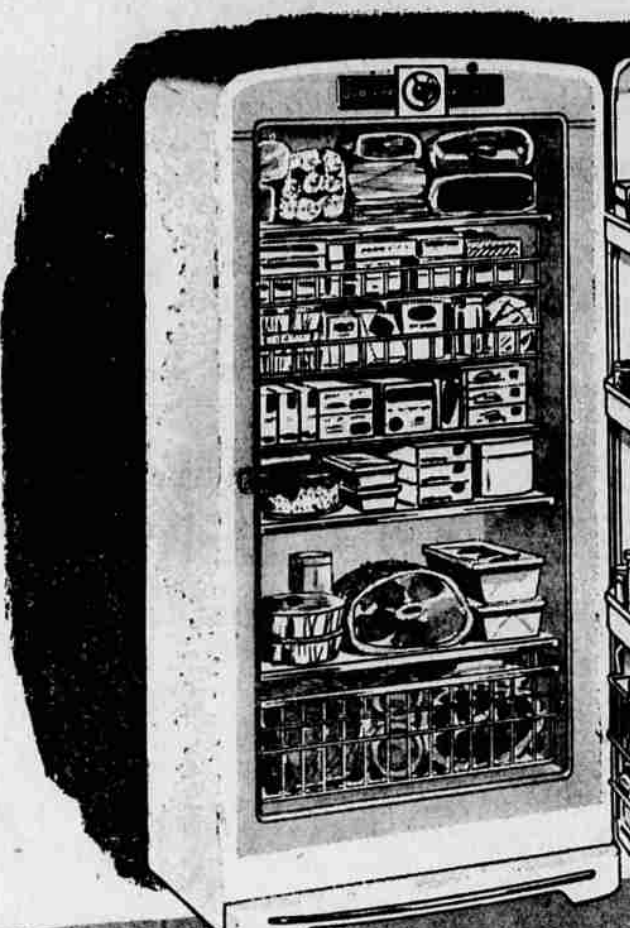

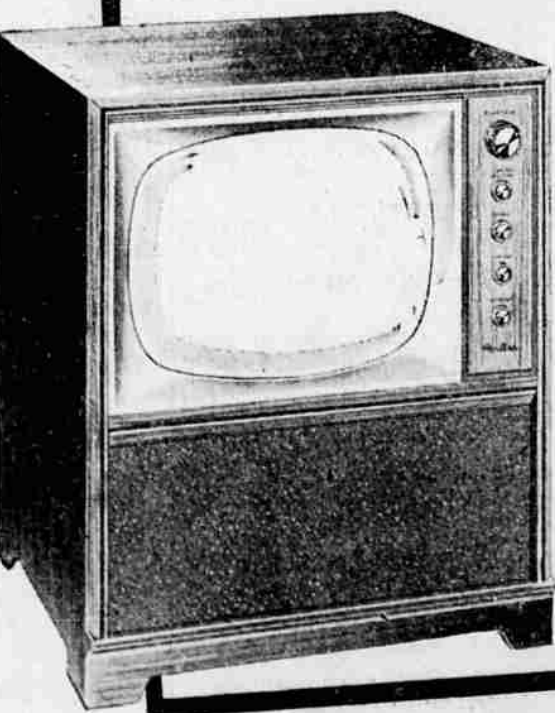
