### Higher Spending Proposal Expected In Ike's Budget

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower plans to send to Congress Monday a balanced budget, but one that contemplates higher spending, and to indicate that outlays are likely to keep climbing in the next several years.

The actual budget totals are closely guarded until disclosed to Congress.

But on the basis of Eisenhower's State of the Union message and other official pronouncements it seems certain the budget will forecast: (1) spending of between 65 1/2 and 66 billion dollars in the next fiscal year; (2) income of at least that much; and (3) requests for appropriations well in excess of projected spending.

In his State of the Union message Jan. 5, Eisenhower said his budget would forecast a balanced budget in fiscal 1956 and 1957.

If a balanced budget is achieved this fiscal year, it will be the first since 1951.

The budget is being balanced, even while spending is going up, because the expanding economy is enriching the government's income faster than spending is growing.

Aside from the balanced budget forecast, the most significant items in the forthcoming budget message, as indicated in previous announcements, are:

1. The expected sharp rise in appropriations requests—a reversal from recent years—because this indicates a rising trend of federal spending for some years to come.

2. An indicated sizable surplus of perhaps five billion dollars in the cash budget—because that could, in given circumstances, virtually force a personal tax cut.

3. An innovation went into effect last night on Arthur Godfrey's television show—the program was put on without a studio audience. A spokesman for Godfrey said, "We just tried something new," adding that the experiment would be continued "for a couple of weeks." No reason was given.

### Grain Support Deadline Told

TULELAKE—Final date for the grain growers of Siskiyou County to file application for price support in the form of loans on wheat, barley, oats, or rye is Monday, January 16, according to Hans Karstensen, of the Siskiyou County Agricultural Stabilization Committee in Yreka.

In event price support is desired by means of purchase agreements, applications may be filed as late as January 31.

The price support paid for grain harvested in 1955 in Siskiyou County follows: wheat, No. 1 or better, \$2.02 per bushel; barley, No. 2 or better, 92 cents per bushel; oats, No. 3 or better, 70 cents per bushel and 15¢, No. 2 or better, 87 1/2 cents per bushel.
