

Klamath Road Work Slated

Three Klamath and Lake County projects among the 29 projects on which the Oregon Highway Commission will open bids on January 23 and 27.

The total value of the 29 projects will be approximately three million dollars.

Klamath County projects include the raising and widening of a 67-foot bridge over the Little Deschutes River on the Willamette Highway, four miles west of its junction with U.S. Highway 97, and the grading, paving and oiling of the shoulders on 4.02 miles of the Lost River-Hatfield Junction section of the Klamath Falls-Malim Highway near Merrill.

The third project is located in both Klamath and Lake counties. It calls for the oiling of 26.06 miles of the south unit of the LaPine-Silver Lake section of the Fremont Highway 14 miles southeast of LaPine.

Another project on the Willamette Highway is the construction of a 1,250 foot dike in Lane County near Oakridge. This is in the vicinity of the washout which closed traffic for several days December, and cut off Klamath Falls from the southern end of the Willamette Valley.

Army Officer Gets New Post

U.S. Army Major Jack Samson, former resident of Klamath Falls, and his wife Doris, visited friends and relatives in Klamath Falls this week.

The Army officer will leave later this month from an eastern U.S. embarkation point for a three-year assignment at European Army Command Headquarters near Paris, France. He will be assigned to the operations and training office at this joint headquarters. Mrs. Samson will accompany him to Paris.

Maj. Samson recently completed the field officer's course at the Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. The last two years he has been assigned to Fifth Army Headquarters in Chicago.

The former Klamath man is a veteran of World War II with the 10th Mountain Division in Italy and was with the 2nd U.S. Army Division during the fighting in Korea.

He served a short enlistment in the late 1930s in the Army stationed in the Philippine Islands, returning to Klamath Falls and graduating from Klamath Union High School in 1940. He attended Southern Oregon College in Ashland for two years after World War II. Maj. Samson rejoined the Army in 1940 via Battery C of the 249th Coast Artillery Regiment, a Klamath Falls National Guard unit called to active duty in September, 1940. He was commissioned as infantry officer candidate school in 1942 and left the Army in 1945. He was re-called to active duty in October, 1950.

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School Studies Water Problem

DUNSMUIR—Castle Rock School trustees, eager to get the new \$157,000 elementary school open, took steps last night to find out when water installations can be completed. The new school is located four miles south of Dunsmuir.

Mrs. Tracy Morgan, clerk of the school board, was instructed to write Redding architect Clayton Kaniz, in charge of the project, for notice of when the work will be completed.

Last month the allocations division of the California state department of finance allocated \$5,250 for use in purchasing a chlorinator, 140 feet of pipe, a storage tank and other items needed to take water from the Castella water system.

Trustees said that about 35 minor deficiencies in the school building requires corrections. The school was originally scheduled for completion last September 23. Opening of the building, however, has been delayed largely because of problems in obtaining a satisfactory water supply.
