Mississippi Legislature Awaits Segregation Bills

JACKSON, Miss. (AP)—A barrage of segregation bills waits today for action by the Mississippi Legislature. One bill would place a fine of \$1,000 a day against any railroad or bus company which failed to keep segregated waiting rooms for intra-state passengers. Another bill is designed to prevent outside lawyers from handling

segregation cases in state courts. Three bills, taken together, apparently would form an attempt to prevent all integration in railroad and bus stations, whether passengers were traveling only within Mississippi or were crossing state lines. Passengers who refuse to wait in rooms marked for their race could be fined a maximum of \$1,000 and sent to jail for one year.

Rain Disperses Bay Area Fog

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Rain fell over much of Northern and Central California today, dissipating a thick fog that had blanketed the area for three days in a row. The weatherman said the rain and fog cleared this morning, to be followed by cloudy weather. He predicted more rain tomorrow from a new storm. The weatherman predicted snow would fall north from Monterey in the mountains above 6,000 feet from Yosemite north today and above 7,000 feet from Tahoe north tomorrow. Yesterday's fall of fog was heaviest in the San Francisco Bay Area, San Francisco, Oakland and Sacramento airports, Alameda and Moffett Naval Air Stations and Hamilton and Travis Air Force Bases were closed at various times. Traffic on the Bay and Golden Gate bridges and on freeways slowed to a crawl.

Dunsmuir Residents Contribute Funds

DUNSMUIR—The residents of Dunsmuir contributed \$403.42 toward flood relief during the past week. The money has been sent to KHEL-TV in Chico with the instructions that it be divided between the Red Cross and the Salvation Army. Contributions of clothing and household items are again being up in the Dunsmuir City Hall. They will be stored there until facilities are available for distributing them in the flood-stricken areas. The fund drive was sponsored by Dunsmuir's civil defense boys and the American Legion Auxiliary.

County Health Board Urged

YREKA—Dr. S. E. Lamb, county health officer, Dr. George O'Brien of the State Health Department, and Robert W. Wickenden, junior sanitary engineer of the department, told the board of supervisors that a county health department was advisable. Dr. Lamb expressed his opinion that a county health department would afford greater protection in sanitary inspections of restaurants, water supply, grocery stores and other establishments. He called attention to the lack of preventive measures under the present system to forestall certain epidemic conditions. He reported that the water supply of Happy Camp was not chlorinated.

Divine Plea Voiced In Abbott Case

OAKLAND (UP)—Defense attorney Stanley Whitney has asked the jury of seven men and five women hearing the Burton W. Abbott murder case to invoke Divine guidance in deciding whether the defendant is guilty or innocent. Whitney voiced this plea yesterday shortly after Asst. Dist. Atty. Polier Emerson demanded the death penalty for "one of the most foul, most abominable crimes ever committed in California."

This was the kidnap-murder of 14-year-old Stephanie Bryan of Berkeley. It apparently took place shortly after 4 p.m. April 28 while she was returning home from school. Less than three months later, Stephanie's purse and other belongings were found in the basement of Abbott's home in Alameda. And on July 29, her body was discovered in a crude grave near Abbott's Trinity County mountain cabin.

Replying to Emerson's demand for the death penalty, Whitney advised the jury to disregard Emerson's suggestion that there is no doubt about Stephanie's kidnap and murder. "There is a question of doubt in this case," Whitney declared. "If there were not, you and we would not be here."

"This is a murder case, and I hope to God that you will get your advice from above, because a man's life is at stake," Whitney declared. "The state has never established by innuendo, speculation, or anything else, a reason why Burton Abbott is supposed to have kidnaped and killed Stephanie Bryan."

"There is a reason for everything that people do, unless they are complete lunatics. There is no shred of proof that this man is a lunatic. This man is just as sound, just as intelligent and just as responsible as any other student at the University of California."

Whitney went on to say that no witness has ever connected Abbott with Stephanie Bryan. The defense attorney said no witness ever testified the two even met in Pring's Doughnut Shop near Stephanie's school. "There is nothing there except the insinuations made by Mr. Emerson. There is absolutely nothing."

Earlier Emerson asked the jury to weigh every theory and argument against what he called the "four fundamental facts of the case." He listed them as:

1. The fact that Stephanie's body was found at Abbott's cabin.
2. The fact that Abbott was at the cabin on the weekend the girl disappeared.
3. The fact that Dr. Paul Kirk, a criminologist, testified he found fibers and hairs matching Stephanie's in Abbott's car, and that he found soil from Stephanie's grave on Abbott's boots.
4. The fact that the defendant was "untruthful" with regard to the case.

"These four facts alone are enough to convict this defendant," Emerson said.

The program consists of three shots, with the third, a booster shot, to be given approximately seven months after the second. The first shot will be given free of charge, as will the boosters to children who had their first and second shots last spring.

Kindergarten children and first graders received their vaccine January 12, and second, third and fourth graders will receive their shots on Monday, January 16, 9 a.m., at the elementary school.

Annie Davis Funeral Held In Dunsmuir

Mrs. Davis died January 9 in Mount Shasta Hospital following a short illness. She was a native of southern Shasta County, born in Mont on March 21, 1890. She is survived by her husband, James B. Davis, and a daughter, Mrs. Eve Davis, both of Dunsmuir.

Bowie Choice Draws Fire

WASHINGTON (AP)—Some Republican Senate leaders were reported to be angry today at President Eisenhower's selection of Robert R. Bowie as assistant secretary of state.

Bowie, a member of the State Department's Policy Planning Board since May 1955, was formally nominated yesterday. Secretary of State Dulles and Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall were said by informed sources to have tried in advance to soften opposition to him.

Some influential Republicans said they have been told that Bowie has said privately he favors admission of Communist China to the United Nations.

That is a Red flag for such senators as GOP Leader Knowland of California and GOP Policy Chairman Bridges of New Hampshire, who are outspoken opponents of recognition.

The Bowie appointment was said to have been the first since that of Charles E. (Chip) Bohlen, an ambassador to Russia, which has been formally submitted when there was advance knowledge of opposition from Senate GOP leaders.

After Bohlen was confirmed, leaders reached an agreement with

White House aides that they would be notified in advance of contemplated appointments. In the case of Bowie, Dulles is reported to have told the GOP chiefs he already had promised Bowie the job and did not feel he could range. Dulles also is reported to have said Bowie would not influence his policy decisions.

Board Hears Jail Report

YREKA—The county jail wing that now houses the sheriff's office is suitable, after proper alterations, for use of maximum security detention for women and juveniles, Murray Hanson, state jail inspector, told the board of supervisors Tuesday.

Hanson, who had been requested to make the inspection by the board of supervisors, was accompanied by Sheriff A. B. Cottar, Undersheriff George Banich, and Probation Officer Lester Newton. The group then conferred with the board of supervisors.

Hanson told the board to present an architect's sketch of the proposed building and it would be submitted for approval of the state youth authority.

Alterations plans provide for construction of maximum security room accommodations for 10 women and 10 juveniles. The Siskiyou county grand jury recently recommended that provision be made for women and juveniles.

Drunken Drivers Rapped By Judge

District Judge D. E. Van Vactor continued Friday to deal harshly with drunken drivers. Two motorists found guilty of driving while intoxicated, Victor A. Wendt, 36-year-old mill worker, and Dean Norton, 32-year-old Benanza livestock feeder, were sentenced to 30 days each in the county jail. They also were fined \$200 each.

"I don't like drunken drivers," the judge told the defendants after passing sentence.
