



### D. Acheson Urges New U.S. Policy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former Secretary of State Dean Acheson called last night for a revitalized foreign policy, imaginatively and vigorously pursued, and cautioned against conducting foreign affairs by "hucksterism."

"This is the era of the huckster," he told some 200 hearers at a dinner given in his honor by the Women's National Democratic Club. "If we go on as we have been doing we'll come to the ultimate slogan of 'weakness is strength.'"

Acheson said it might be well for this country to reappraise its whole foreign policy in view of a Russian shift in emphasis from political to economic methods of waging the cold war, and what he called the increased attention to uncommitted countries from North Africa across the Middle East to Indochina.

"If we look around us," he said, "we will be hard put to find any area in which events of the past few years have not moved to our disadvantage."

"I do not mean to imply that this administration is entirely responsible. . . . Some things are their fault. . . . Some things are beyond their control."

He said U.S. relations with South America and Canada have not improved, those with Britain are formal and distant, Germany is drifting dangerously, France is torn by discord and countries in the Near East have been offended by what he termed "pactomania."

Further, he said, the islands of Quemoh and Matsui in the Formosa Strait constitute a "time bomb" and trouble with Communist China may erupt "at any moment."

He made no direct reference to Secretary of State Dulles' assertion, quoted in a current Life magazine article, that a strong American policy of "deterrence" had averted possible war in the Formosa area.

### Kefauver Steps On Throttle

BOSTON (AP)—Sen. Kefauver's campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination is actively under way in New England.

The Democrat from Tennessee made two speeches in Massachusetts and met with Mayor John B. Hynes of Boston yesterday.

Hynes supported Kefauver in his unsuccessful bid for the presidential nomination four years ago.

Kefauver spoke before the Harvard Young Democrats Club in Cambridge and before the Big Brother and Sister Assn. in Boston.

His next step is a three-day swing through New Hampshire, where he is entered in the March 13 first-in-the-nation presidential primary.

Before the Harvard group, Kefauver said, "There is little question that the federal security program's demand not only for loyalty but for a sort of puritanical conformity is keeping qualified young men from all government service."

In his Boston speech, he blamed "adult insufficiency" as a major cause of juvenile delinquency.

### FBI To Conduct Special Conference On Auto Thefts

J. F. Santolana Jr., special agent in charge of the Portland office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, announced today that an FBI Law Enforcement Conference on auto theft will be held on April 12 in Eugene. Additional conferences will be held April 19 at Portland and April 26 at Pendleton.

Santolana said more than 100 conferences of this type have been scheduled this year by the FBI on a regional basis throughout the United States. The conferences will be aimed at bringing about additional coordination among law enforcement agencies and improved efficiency in dealing with this crime. They will be operated on a forum basis providing for a mutual exchange of information and knowledge by all participants.

The seriousness of this violation is highlighted by the fact that in 1954 an estimated 215,940 automobiles were stolen in the United States. Although 94 per cent subsequently were located, at the year's end 12,856 cars, valued at more than 12 million dollars, still were unrecovered. In 1953, an estimated 226,630 cars were stolen and 93.9 per cent were recovered, leaving 13,818, valued at some 14 million dollars. In 1952, the net loss was 16,364 automobiles valued at more than 17 million dollars.

Part of this decrease may be the result of a similar series of conferences held during 1952. During that year there were 131 auto theft conferences throughout the country which were attended by 8,707 individuals representing 3,121 agencies. This coming year's conferences will follow the same pattern as the 1952 series and also others held during the succeeding years.

There were 133 conferences in 1953 on thefts from interstate shipment. These were attended by 8,702 persons representing 4,159 agencies. During 1954, 144 conferences were held regarding the interstate transportation of stolen property and were attended by 10,142 persons representing 5,570 agencies. During 1955, the subject of the 178 conferences was bank robbery and 16,909 persons representing 8,652 agencies attended.
