

Bull Sale Committees Described

Charles F. Stover, chairman of the Red Bluff Bull Sale Committee, stated today that sitting and grading committees for the 1956 sale, scheduled for February 2, 3 and 4, have finally been determined.

Stover stated that the sitting committee of which Bill Owens, Bull Sale committee head, consists of himself, Charles Lumber, another Bull Sale committee member, Harry Parker, a Hereford breeder from San Luis Obispo and Dr. Joe Giamboni, veterinarian from Red Bluff.

Owens, Luther and Giamboni have served on the sitting committee for a number of years and are considered able and efficient operators by both commercial and purebred breeders.

Harry Parker, a new comer on the committee, has served as judge and grader at early Red Bluff Bull sales and is considered a nationally known authority on beef cattle.

The grading committee which has been arranged by Abner McKenzie, a Tehama County commercial operator and member of the County Bull Sale Committee, has also been approved, according to Stover.

This committee will consist of four men to be headed by Don E. Peterson, executive farm adviser from Merced, California. Other members of this committee consist of Jake Schneider, a commercial operator from Sloughhouse, California and former president of the Cattlemen's Association; Cameron Cliff, who operates a 2,500 cow outfit with headquarters at Burns, Oregon; and Ed Francisco, an experienced commercial cattleman from Pomeroy, Washington who has had considerable experience in grading cattle with Charles R. Kyd, the former livestock specialist of Washington State College.

Stover stated that the grading and sitting committees for the 1956 Bull Sale will meet at 1 p.m. on Wednesday, February 1 to discuss the combined efforts of the two groups and that a limited number of Horned Herefords will be graded that afternoon.

He said that the balance of the Horned Hereford range and herd bulls will be graded on Thursday, February 2 starting at 9 a.m. Champion and Reserve Champions in pens of 2, 3 and 5 will be selected on that date together with top individuals.

Polled Herefords, Angus and Shorthorns will be graded on the morning of February 3, according to Stover, with the sale starting at 12 noon that day, with Polled Herefords to be followed by Angus and Shorthorns.

The sale of an excellent service age Hereford bull, sired by the 1953 reserve champion and donated by Frank and Margaret Day, Hereford breeders of Montague, California for the March of Dimes, will start at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, February 4. Guest auctioneers will be Princess Kekaulike Kawannok of Honolulu and Hilo Hattie.

Former Governor Dan Thornton of Colorado is slated to address a Klamath County Republican Central Committee dinner here on Monday, February 6.

Governor Thornton, one of the dominant leaders of the GOP on a national level, served two terms as chief executive of the Columbian State. He was first elected in 1948 and reelected in 1952. He declined to run again in 1954.

In 1950, Thornton directed the Crusade for Freedom Campaign in Colorado. He went into the governor's mansion on appointment after the late Governor Ralph L. Carr suddenly died just 34 days before the end of his term. Thornton launched a whirlwind campaign and won the next gubernatorial election.

"We are indeed fortunate to have secured Mr. Thornton as a speaker," Proctor said. "He has an enviable reputation as a public speaker, coupled with a keen understanding of complex world problems."
