### Farm Surplus Sales Rapped

WASHINGTON (AP) — An administration request for authority to sell some surplus farm products "at market prices" drew criticism Thursday from two Democratic senators.

The administration, in proposing to pay farmers in cash or surplus commodities for withdrawing land from production under its soil bank plan, asked authority to sell at market prices commodities equivalent to the amount of cash payments under the program.

The law now requires that most government-held surpluses be sold at not less than the support price plus a 5 per cent handling and storage charge.

Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn) called the request "a joker" that could further beat down all farm prices after a five-year decline, and added, in a statement:

"It becomes apparent that they are more concerned about getting rid of government holdings than they are about what happens to the farmer."

Sen. Morse (D-Ore) joined in the attack saying that President Eisenhower's "farm proposals" would continue and even deepen the farm price slide.

### PNW Forest Damage Told

PORTLAND (AP) — Pacific Northwest forest improvements suffered 1955 storm damages totaling at least \$1,108,000, R. F. Grefe, regional engineer, estimated Thursday.

He said it was the second highest damage year on record. The worst was in 1948 when the sudden melting of winter snows brought on floods that caused losses of three to four million dollars.

Grefe said roads, bridges, and culverts took the greatest beating, but forest camp and picnic areas will cost some \$42,000 to put back into shape.

Siskiyou Forest in southwestern Oregon was the most heavily damaged in the 1955 storms, he said, closely followed by Mt. Hood in Northern Oregon. In Washington, Snoqualmie, Okanogan and Olympic were the most heavily damaged.

Every forest, he said, suffered some damage.

### A. Harriman Defines Policy

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Gov. Averell Harriman announced last night he will not allow his name to be entered in any presidential primaries without his consent.

It was the first statement by the New York State governor on whether he would test his voter popularity with avowed presidential Democratic candidates Adlai E. Stevenson and Sen. Estes Kefauver.

Harriman, who admitted he is the "favorite son" of New York State's 98-vote key delegation, again said he was not "an active candidate" for the Democratic nomination.

He predicted that the Democrats will recapture the White House this November against any Republican candidates, including President Eisenhower and Vice President Richard Nixon and Chief Justice Earl Warren.

The governor's announced refusal to enter any primaries was interpreted by some observers as an apparent campaign strategy to stay on the sidelines until Democratic party leaders and voters test the popularity of Stevenson and Kefauver.

Harriman has entered only one primary previously, that in 1952 when in the District of Columbia he defeated presidential aspirant Kefauver of Tennessee handily, 14,075 votes to 3377.

### Skin Diving Record Set

HOLLYWOOD BEACH, Fla. (UP) — A spunky Indianapolis housewife plunged 270 feet beneath the Atlantic Ocean yesterday to set a new world skin diving record for women.

Mrs. Barbara Jacobs, 33, apparently wasn't bothered by the mysterious "rapture of the deep" that snuffed out the life of Miami Atty. Hope Root when he tried a similar dive off Miami Beach two years ago.

With instructor Ed Townsend of Hollywood Beach accompanying her and her husband waiting above on a boat, Mrs. Jacobs yesterday swam down a 400-foot anchor line and tied a marker at 270-foot down. Her dive beat the record of 208 feet set on the Pacific Coast last year by Zale Perry.

Townsend, remembering Root's fate, wouldn't let the attractive mother of two boys take a chance by going deeper.

Root, trying to break the men's skin diving record, passed the 400-foot mark and then apparently let his breathing apparatus slip off. He never came back.

"I was frightened until I found my equipment was in good shape," Mrs. Jacobs said after she clambered back into the boat. "I remember one incident very well down below the 200-foot mark... my red fingernail polish turned blue."

Townsend explained that red color is filtered out at such depths.
