The event is co-sponsored by Scholastic magazines and Lipman Wolfe & Company for students in grades 7 through 12 regularly enrolled in any school. Gold achievement keys and certificates of merit are awarded regional winners and all key winning pieces are forwarded to the National High School Art Exhibition at Carnegie Institute in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, for national honors which include tuition scholarships and cash awards.

Entry classifications include: oils, transparent water colors, opaque water colors; pastels, charcoal crayon and colored chalk, drawing inks, mixed media, lead pencil drawings, cartooning, linoleum block prints, posters, lettering; illustration, general design, and greeting card design.

Sculpture, ceramics, textile decoration, weaving, jewelry, and metalry, enameling, leathercraft, black and white photographs, and color transparencies.
