### Weather Balloon Heading Westward

**OPPAMA, Japan (AP)**—A U.S. Navy weather balloon launched here Saturday is moving eastward across the Pacific at about 65 miles an hour and is expected to reach the Western United States early Tuesday, the Navy said.
