## Kefauver Lays Charge Of Atom War

BOSTON (AP)—Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said today the United States has been placed in a position where "the trump cards" of its diplomacy "are all threats of atomic war."

He said in a speech prepared for the New England Weekly Press Assn., that a "few more blunders" like his "brink of war" interview and "Secretary of State Dulles will have outlived his usefulness."

Kefauver referred to a controversial article in Life magazine in which statements attributed to Dulles—verified by him in substance—have aroused criticism from Democrats and from abroad.

Kefauver, a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, said he does not doubt Dulles wants peace, but that "it only seems to me that he takes the

most dangerous means of achieving it."

"He says that he carried us three times to the brink of war and artfully brought us back again," Kefauver said. And he added:

"Secretary of Defense Wilson, during all this period, does not appear to have moved up to the brink of war. There is no evidence that the armed forces were ready for any final engulfing war. The people of the United States certainly were not prepared for a war."

"There are now enough bombs on both sides to blow to dust every target of any military significance in the whole world," Kefauver continued. "It is not a time for boyful games and fanciful illusions."

Attacking administration domestic policies, Kefauver said that "despite the apparent prosperity of the nation, business failures are rising, and it is mostly small businesses which are failing."

## When You Write A Letter, Be Sure The Address Is Correct, Writing Legible

WASHINGTON (UP)—When next you write grandma, make sure the address is right. Else it might wind up like 30,625,463 letters and packages did last year—in the dead letter office.

Postmaster General Arthur F. Summerfield's crew is still quite upset about the carelessness of the letter-writing public. Over 18 million of those misguided missives wound up in the trash. About 35 million were greetings for the Yule—to people who never got wished a merry or happy one.

A lot of the wrong-way letters contained money. If the sender puts his return address in the left hand corner, the dough is returned to him. About \$116,131 was returned last year. The rest went into a relief fund.

Well, the dead letter office is so worked up, it has come up with a set of mailing rules that all of us should paste in our hats.

First, write so the Post Office can read it, even if you have to print. Make sure the address is correct, written in full without abbreviations. The return address. Use the postal zone number. And if you think your letter is overweight, put it on the scale to assure enough postage.

Abbreviating the names of states can run into trouble. For instance, carelessness with the pen can make "La" for Louisiana look like "In" for Iowa. Write 'em out. Likewise there can be confusion in "NC" and "ND" as "NH".

Also there are similarities within a single state. Like Belmar and Belman, in New Jersey. Cullen and Crellin, in Maryland. There is Elivston and also Evanston, in Illinois.

George Post, who heads the coordinating unit of the Minneapolis Post Office, recently reported variation on the problem of names of streets. A housewife reported she and her husband had moved and had filed the proper change of address form. She wondered why they were not receiving any mail.

Post looked into the matter and learned that the couple had moved into the only house on a recently cut-through block—long street, which never had been reported to the Post Office. Clerks had been sending the letters back.

James Sheerer, a letter peddler at Pottsville, Pa., knows about streets that are hard to spell. He says that the name of a street, properly spelled "Mahantongo" in his town has been touring his appointed rounds. "I have," Jim says, "properly delivered letters with addresses spelled all the way from C (Chantooget) to Z (Zoomahantongo). It sure wears on a man!"

Some people overdo the business of a complete address. Like the

case reported by Postmaster John Whalen of Icard, N.C. A woman addressed a letter like this:

"Downtown furniture store,  
 "Run by two brothers who look alike,  
 "Across street from dime store,  
 "Appliance store at one end of street,  
 "Dry goods store at other,  
 "Gulfport, Miss."
