

Grange Master To Be Opposed

MILWAUKIE (AP) — Incumbent Grange master Elmer McClure will be opposed in his bid for re-election.

Grange headquarters here reported that Ralph Rogers of Eugene won enough votes in the recent primary election to get his name on the general election ballot next April.

Rogers polled 1,706 votes to 3,883 for McClure, who is seeking his fourth successive two-year term. Clarence Jackson, Eugene, was third with 1,153.

William O. Howes, Medford, incumbent overseer, polled 3,841 votes. He will be opposed in the general election by Robert Schmidt, Albany, who had 2,580.

Executive committee (three to be elected) — Bertha J. Beck, Corvallis, 4,530; Ray W. Gill, Portland, 3,076; William G. Ross, Vale, 2,437; Rush Miller, McMinnville, 3,187; Herbert Carleton, Prospect, 2,677.

Grain Stocks Total Listed

WASHINGTON (UP) — The Agriculture Department reports its stocks of wheat, corn, oats, sorghum grain, and barley on Jan. 1 totaled a record 116 million tons.

These stocks were in transit or stored at farms, terminals, government-owned bins, mills, elevators and warehouses.

Total wheat stocks—1,535,000,000 bushels—were the largest in history. This amount was 4 per cent larger than a year ago, and 70 per cent larger than the 1945-54 yearly average. Off-farm stocks totaled 124,000,000 bushels, 6 per cent larger than a year earlier.

Of the off-farm total, about five-sixths of the wheat was either owned by the Commodity Credit Corporation or was warehouse-stored under government commodity loans. About one-fourth of the wheat on farms was under government loan.

Other stocks on hand compared with a year ago were:

Rye: 28,800,000 bushels, up 11 per cent; corn stocks: 3,057,000,000 bushels, compared with 2,825,000,000 bushels a year ago; oats: 1,082,000,000 bushels, up seven per cent; barley: 303,000,000 bushels, compared with 283,000,000 bushels; sorghum grain: 222,500,000 bushels, up 15 per cent.
