Church Women Told Of Desegregation Problems

The present state of tension in the South over school segregation is only an intensification of an underlying situation, said Glen Smiley, field secretary for the Fellowship of Reconciliation, who spoke at a meeting of the United Council of Church Women recently.

He described the town of Orangeburg, South Carolina, as a town similar in size to Klamath Falls with a 50 per cent Negro population. Fifty eight of its residents signed a petition asking that the Supreme Court decision be carried out to desegregate the

schools. As a result, a Citizenship Council was formed similar to those being formed in many Southern communities with the aim of peacefully but implacably opposing desegregation and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

All of these signs were persecuted in various ways, the speaker said, losing their jobs and credit, and having mortgages foreclosed. Only 27 of the 58 did not remove their names from the petition and these are still suffering pressure and hardship.

As a former Southerner, a Methodist minister, Smiley spoke with warmth and appreciation of the Southern people and with faith in the "reservoir of spirituality" to which the church can appeal in working toward equal citizenship rights.

Army Reservist To Take Course

A Klamath Falls Army Reserve officer, Captain Robert T. Van Kleek, Indian Service employee at Klamath Agency, has received orders to attend a two-week refresher course on military government and civil affairs at the Provost Marshal General School at Camp Gordon, Georgia.

A member of the 6402 Logistics Command, which meets the first three Monday evenings of each month at the Army Reserve Center, 432 Main Street, Van Kleek will attend the school during the first half of March.

The two-week course, for which he requested assignment, is designed for reserve officers who have worked in this type of duty while on past active duty tours. Material presented will include any major changes adopted recently.

His unit is the only Army Reserve unit meeting in the Klamath Falls area which has vacancies for officers over the rank of Captain. There are two other units meeting here which have vacancies for enlisted men, whether they have had prior military service or not. In these units, Company C, 311th Military Police Battalion, and the 73rd Aviation Engineer Company (Depot), men are paid for each meeting they attend.

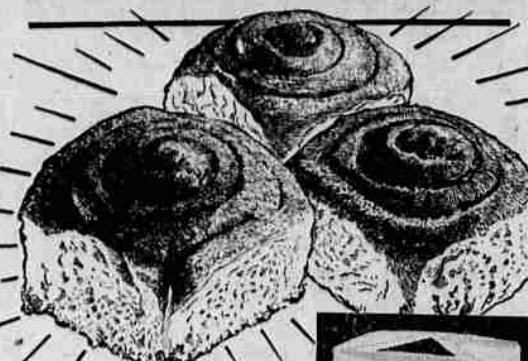

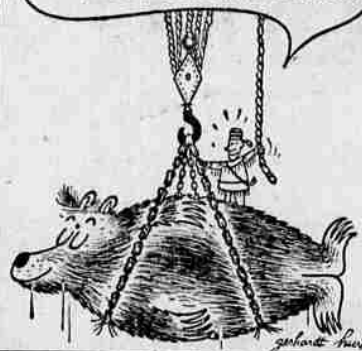

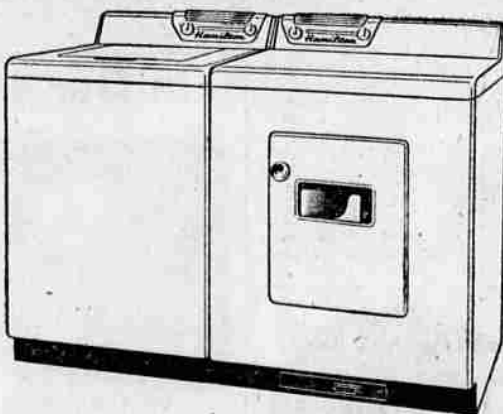
