The sandals are believed to be the oldest man-made relics in North America and were found by University of Oregon excavators, directed by Dr. L. S. Cressman, in 1928.

GI Bill Stand Told By Solon

WASHINGTON — Senator Richard L. Neuberger, Democrat of Oregon, issued a statement Tuesday explaining why he introduced a bill in Congress a few days ago for revival of the G.I. Bill of Rights.

"I have always thought," he said, "that the educational benefits of the G.I. Bill of Rights, under which millions of World War II and Korea veterans attended schools and colleges, was the most far-sighted veterans legislation we have ever had."

"Unfortunately," the senator continued, "the G.I. Bill was permitted to expire for all men and women entering the service after January 31, 1955. But the United States needs skilled and educated people more now than ever before. We are falling behind the Soviet Union in training scientists and engineers. It is my conviction that today's servicemen deserve equal treatment with those who happen
