Three Get Jail Terms

Three probation violators were sentenced here Thursday afternoon by Circuit Judge Ralph M. Holman. One of the defendants was given five years in Oregon State Prison and the other two drew one-year county jail sentences.

Edward Jensen, described by police as an inveterate bogus check passer, was already under a three-year sentence in the state prison when appearing before Judge Holman.

While on probation granted in Klamath County a year ago, Jensen was sentenced to prison from Lane County where he pleaded guilty to a check charge. "You have had every possible chance," the judge told Jensen. "Your probation is revoked and you are sentenced to serve five years in the state prison."

William G. Slimer, 38-year-old automobile salesman, was returned here from San Diego as a probation violator, was given a year in jail. He originally was arrested for cashing spurious checks here.

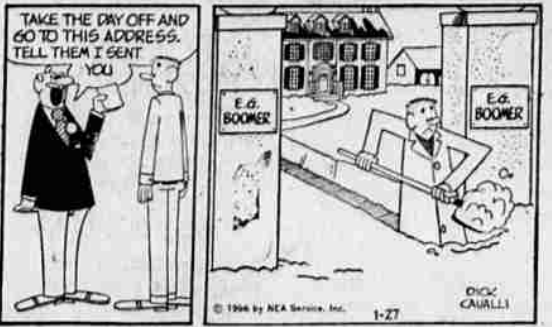
The third probation violator was Robert W. Nickelson, 36-year-old ranch worker. He left the state without permission of the court and also associated with a woman other than his wife.

County jail records show Nickelson once served a prison term in Oregon for bigamy. Judge Holman revoked his probation and ordered him incarcerated in the county jail.

Norris Plans Store Opening

DUNSMUIR — Clarence Norris, formerly of Project City, will open a new downtown grocery store in Dunsmuir early next month. He has leased half of the building formerly occupied by Mac's Market which Francis McEmery vacated when he transferred his business to a new supermarket in north Dunsmuir.

Norris stated his new venture will be a family affair with his wife and daughter helping him. He will handle the meat cutting department and there will be self-service delicatessen case. Frozen foods, fresh vegetables and a complete line of groceries and sundries.

The store will be open six days a week and closed on Sundays, Norris said. He plans to operate the store on a cash and carry basis.

Norris plans to sell his store in Project City, 50 miles south of here, and devote full time to his Dunsmuir store. He is a family man, he said, although four of his six children are married and away from home. They have 18 grandchildren, he stated proudly.

Complete redecoration of the store has been underway for the past two weeks. A modern masonry-like trim has been installed along the 20-foot frontage. Norris has purchased market fixtures from Francis McEmery.

The Norris family operated their business in Project City for the past three years. Prior to that time they lived in Coos Bay, Oregon.
