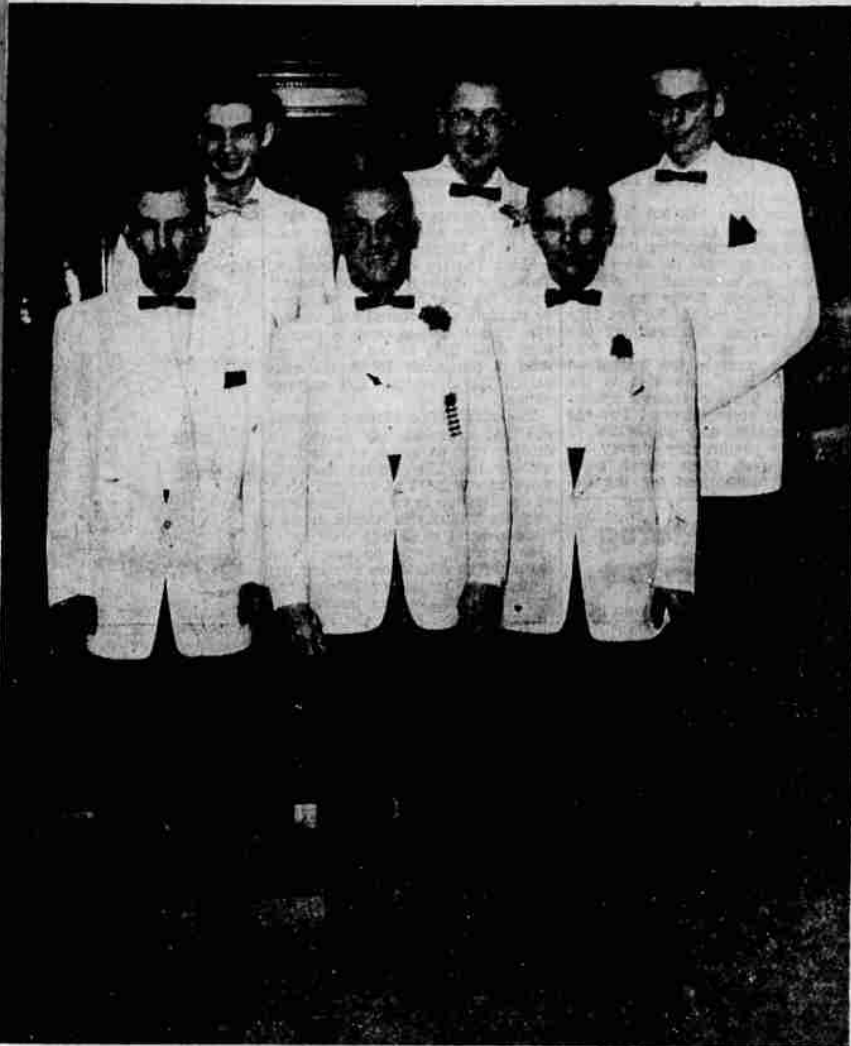
Edith Cuning Book Club
