

# Bartender, Wife Go On Trial For Fatal Heiress Abortion

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A bartender and his beautiful wife go on trial today on charges they performed the illegal operation that killed a young heiress two months after her story-book elopement with a motorcycle policeman.

Defendants in the case that has attracted nationwide attention are Milton Schwartz, 49, and his wife, Rosalie, 42. Both have been free in \$5,000 bail since their Sept. 12 arrest.

The Schwartzs specifically are accused of abortion, abortion causing death and conspiracy in connection with the death of Mrs. Doris Jean Silver Oestreicher, 22-year-old heiress to an east coast food chain fortune. They face a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine.

The red-haired beauty died in the Schwartzs' north Philadelphia apartment on the night of Aug. 24, three days before her 23rd birthday and exactly two months from the day she had eloped to Georgia with Earl M. Oestreicher, Miami, Fla., policeman after a whirlwind, four-week romance.

The cause of her death, estab-

lished by the medical examiner after an autopsy was performed, was an unsuccessful abortion. The girl's mother, Mrs. Gertrude Silver, is also charged with abortion, abortion causing death and conspiracy. Her father, vice president Herman Silver of the huge Food Fair supermarket chain, has not been implicated in the case.

Mrs. Silver is not scheduled to go on trial at this time.

The mother said Doris left her policeman-husband in Miami Beach because he had mistreated her, and asked her father to start divorce proceedings. Oestreicher called these assertions "ridiculous."

Quarter Sessions Judge Vincent A. Carroll, who will preside, announced the jury—which court observers say may take as long as three days to select—will be locked up in a downtown Philadelphia hotel each night until the trial's end.

# Tokyo Rose Learns Terms

CHICAGO (AP)—Tokyo Rose, welcomed home from prison by her family, reports to the U. S. courthouse in Chicago today to learn the terms of her parole from the federal reformatory at Alderson, W. Va. She served 6 1/2 years of a 10-year term for treason.

Tokyo Rose — Mrs. Iva Ikuko Toguri D'Aquino — whose low-voiced talk of pretty girls and home over Radio Tokyo tantalized GIs in the Pacific in World War II—went into hiding from reporters after her arrival in Chicago yesterday.

A brother, Fred Toguri, said she didn't want to talk to newsmen before her appearance at the courthouse because "she doesn't want to do anything to jeopardize her parole."

Mrs. D'Aquino, who was born in Los Angeles, was served with deportation papers when she was released from prison Saturday.

Mrs. D'Aquino feels she has "served her punishment" and that she wants to remain in America and be an American citizen.

She drove from West Virginia with her father Jun Toguri the brother and a sister. The family moved to Chicago after all persons of Japanese ancestry were relocated from the West Coast in World War II.

The government contends Tokyo Rose lost her citizenship on conviction of treason in San Francisco in 1949.

Robinson said she will not be kept in custody while the legal question of whether a natural-born American can be deported is settled.

Mrs. D'Aquino's husband Philip, a Portuguese, is working for a newspaper in Tokyo.

**Assassins Kill Korean Officer**  
SEOUL (UP)—Assassins dressed in Army uniforms and driving a Korean Army jeep today murdered the Republic of Korea Army's counter-intelligence chief, Maj. Gen. Kim Chang Yong.

The 36-year-old Army officer was killed as he rode in his jeep to work from his home in Seoul at 7:30 a.m.

Two unidentified men in ROK Army uniforms rode up beside him and pumped four bullets at the general. Two struck his chest, another ripped through his chin. The fourth hit the left foot of the driver.

The assailants escaped, but police said they were on their trail.

General Kim was one of the most vigorous enemies of Communism in the notably anti-Communist government of President Syngman Rhee.

Last October he arrested nine men accused of plotting the assassination of Rhee.

Since 1949 he has been chiefly responsible for purging Communist and leftist elements from the ROK Army. His methods have been harsh and efficient.

Although Kim was among the strongest anti-Red nation, high Army sources said they did not believe the killers were Communists.

They believed he was the victim of disgruntled South Koreans who were caught up in his highly successful investigations.

# Tony Curtis Returns From Europe Loaded With Culture

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—Tony Curtis, the poor Bronx tough boy turned movie star, is back from Europe with a load of culture and the discovery that it's cheap for tourists after all.

Most returning travelers grouse about how Europeans make a fast buck from naive Americans.

But Tony and spouse Janet Leigh, formerly young marrieds from a world bound by Ciro's and fat magazines, lives for five exciting months abroad. They not only acquired culture, but got it inexpensively.

"You can eat anywhere very cheaply," insisted fast-talking Tony as he stretched on the couch of his living room.

"Wonderful little restaurants. Little hotels. Why do people complain they get cheated? On the boat I went down to third class to talk to a young New York attorney and his wife who were going over on less than \$1,000 for the entire trip. Most anybody who saves can go to Europe these days."

Tony and Janet's acquisitions: "We bought a bunch of paintings. Well, actually lithographs. By Picasso, Matisse, Braque, very cheaply," the kid from the Bronx said.

Janet also brought drums and sculptures from Africa. And we took 3,500 photographs."

His biggest bargain, he thinks, were two German cars. One is a tiny three-wheeled bug he picked up for \$650 as a surprise for Janet when she arrived in Paris after finishing a movie in Africa. The other is a plushy \$8,600 model—"at least \$2,000 cheaper than I'd pay for the car in this country."

"When we drive the three-wheeler in Beverly Hills cars pull over to the side to ask us what it is," he laughed.

"The curly haired actor even picked up a smattering of French. He can rattle off the French words for 'laundry,' 'braccio' and 'brassiere' but the use of this vocabulary mystifies me. The word for 'brassiere' he thought meant 'good morning' and he used it as a greeting for weeks in Paris until he was wised up.

On this culture trip Tony worked in Hecht-Lancaster's "Trapeze," filmed in Paris with possibly the best role of his career. The bobby-soxers will be delighted to hear
