LONDON (AP)—A strong earthquake shook northwest Yugoslavia Tuesday, Belgrade Radio said "considerable damage was done to public and private buildings" but there were no deaths.

Judge Denies Dismissal Plea

Conflicting testimony Tuesday clouded the issue at the trial of Jack Gordon, 34-year-old construction worker, accused of ravishing an 8-year-old girl.

However, Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg overruled a dismissal motion by Defense Attorney U. S. Balentine, who contended that the prosecution's testimony failed to support the allegations in the indictment against Gordon.

The motion followed resting of the state's case by District At-

torney Richard Beesley and Deputy District Attorney P. K. Puckett. Before the noon recess, Balentine had called three witnesses—Louis Robinson, father of the child involved; his present wife, Opal Robinson, and Hazel Hall, sister of the defendant. They all gave testimony refuting parts of statements made on the witness stand. Vera Robinson, mother of the alleged rape victim, she had Gordon arrested.

It was expected the case would reach the jury late Tuesday afternoon. Spectators nearly filled the courtroom.

Groping Car Rams Depot

An auto got lost in the fog Monday evening in Alturas and rammed into the Southern Pacific freight house at the end of Main Street, Klamath Falls officials of the S.P. reported today.

The auto was driven by Mrs. Johnnie Ruth Mayard of The Dalles, who was headed for Reno. Officials said she failed to make a left turn where through traffic for Reno leaves Main Street. Her auto was badly damaged when it hit the wooden building.

Fog was also responsible for a train accident on the S.P. Klamath Falls-Alturas line two miles from Merrill Sunday evening, when an auto drove into the side of a moving freight train.

The auto, driven by Bryant Lee Wolfram of Medford, was badly damaged, but the boxcar it hit, the 30th car ahead of the caboose, was only slightly damaged.

The trainload of 66 empties was headed for Klamath Falls. The engineer was C. W. Brady and the conductor was R. L. Myers. Both are based at Klamath Falls.

Neuberger Raps D'Ewart Naming

WASHINGTON (UP)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) has attacked the nomination of Wesley D'Ewart for assistant secretary of Interior.

He told the Senate yesterday the D'Ewart appointment was "ill advised" because of his "record of unfriendly acts in the field of resource conservation."

He said D'Ewart, former Montana Republican congressman, had sponsored a "grazing giveaway" bill which Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay once described as "lousy." He said McKay "now attempts to rationalize the appointment by describing D'Ewart as a man 'very, very good judgment.'"

OTI Schedules Highway Course

Tentative plans for a new course in highway technology were discussed at a meeting of OTI and state highway officials Friday. The new course was requested by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer and will start the fall term of 1956.

OTI director, Winston D. Purvine, A. P. McVey, head of the department of engineering associates, Brooks O. Custer and John J. Howard, head of the school of technical education, represented Oregon Technical Institute.

The consulting committee of the Highway Department included R. H. Baldock, G. S. Paxson, assistant highway engineer, Frank Hall, design engineer, Forrest Cooper, assistant construction engineer, F. B. Crandall, traffic engineer, and Gene Huntley, personnel director. The Department Advisory Committee for Engineering Associates will consider it at their meeting here February 3. Purvine said.
