Five Persons Arrested In SF

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Five persons were arrested last night in what police said was the crack-up of a ring that fenced thousands of dollars worth of clothing, furs, jewelry and other merchandise from some of San Francisco's most exclusive shops.

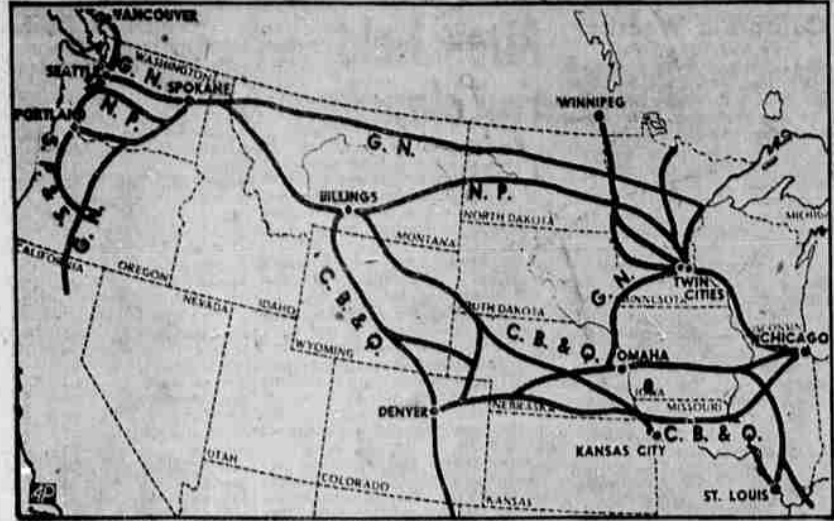
Four of those arrested, three women and a man, had links to the underworld. The fifth was a schoolteacher. All were charged with receiving stolen property.

The arrests were carried out by the newly designated Chief of Police Francis J. Ahern and his aides after weeks of investigation by Dist. Atty. Thomas Lynch.

Lynch said the merchandise was stolen from "stores" in the past few years by two well-known shoplifters, whom he did not identify. However, it was learned that they testified last night before the Grand Jury. One of them was brought here from the women's prison at Corona.

According to police, the shoplifters would steal, for example, a dress worth \$300, then sell it for \$100 or less through a member of the ring.

Those arrested were: Rinaldo (Red) Ferrari, owner of Ciro's Tavern, an ex-convict with links to prostitution and narcotics; Miss Lorraine Staker, 40, a teacher at McKinley Elementary School who said she had "no idea" why she should be arrested; Dorothy Ryan, identified by Lynch as a longtime madam and whose name was brought into the 1953 extortion trial of Jimmie Tarantino; Mildred Farnow, whose name appeared in the record of the Mabel Malotte prostitution trial; Marie Gifford, identified by police as "another former madam."

Last Of Three Kansas Bank Robbers Surrenders To FBI

DALLAS, Tex. (UP)—Joe Herbert Hoskins, last of three men sought for robbing a Kansas bank operated by the first woman treasurer of the United States, surrendered quietly to the FBI Monday night outside a Dallas tavern.

Hoskins, an ex-convict from Dallas, was not armed. He offered no resistance when FBI agents closed in on him and a woman companion after they came out of an east side tavern Hoskins was known to frequent.

Still sought today was a red-haired mystery woman believed possibly in the Dallas or Fort Worth area. She was believed to be a friend of Billy Gene Ross, Dallas hoodlum shot to death during an attempted robbery last Saturday of the home of Mrs. Georgia Neese Clark Gray in Richland.

The woman was seen driving a Cadillac with Texas plates on it in the area where the robbery took place. Later she called from a filling station in the area to ask about Ross.

The woman with Hoskins identified herself as his wife, and accompanied him to the Dallas County Jail, but left later. The FBI said she was not wanted.

A \$25,000 bond was recommended for Hoskins by the U. S. district attorney at Topeka, Kan. He was to be taken before a U. S. commissioner today on the bank robbery complaint.

Hoskins, Ross and Louie Dea Young Jr., 28, all were charged with entering the Richland home of Mrs. Gray and forcing her at pistol point to open a vault of her bank. They took \$2,000 in the bank robbery Jan. 2.

Ross was shot to death on a darkened stairway of the Gray home early last Saturday by Andrew Gray, a former Washington public relations consultant and husband of the former U. S. treasurer. Young was captured Saturday and is being held in Topeka.

Employers Get Tax Warning

ALTURAS — California employers who paid wages in 1955 of \$2,000 or more to a single person or \$3,500 or more to a married person are required to file a form IT559 for each individual, together with form IT596, on or before February 15.

Robert C. Kirkwood, chairman of the Franchise Tax Board, announced that state information returns have been mailed to all employers who filed last year. Any employers who have not received these forms may obtain a supply from the Franchise Tax Board office, 1020 "N" Street, Sacramento 14.
