Two new teams ruled the roost as the Men's City Bowling Tournament headed into the final night of team competition at Lucky Lanes. The Class A leader after last night's pin action was Lucky Lanes with a 2931 score. Robert's Hardware stole the lead in Class B by posting a 2893.

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Dons Tip SJ State; NCS Rolls

That San Francisco winning streak is just like money in the bank—gaining interest and getting bigger all the time.

The Dons, No. 1 in the nation, extended their major college basketball victory record to 41 games as expected last night, covorting to a 67-40 victory over San Jose State.

At this rate, San Francisco will have a 51-0 mark when it opens defense of its NCAA crown against the Pacific Coast Conference champ in the Far West regional at Corvallis, Ore., March 16. If the Dons can make it through the four tourney games to a second straight title, they'll match the all-time, all-college record of 55 consecutive victories hung up by Peru (Neb.) State 30 years ago.

San Francisco, now 15-0 for the season, again was led by All-America Bill Russell, 6-10 1/2 center, who scored 21 points in his 36 minutes of play. It was a pressing defense by K. C. Jones and Hal Perry, however, that finally broke up the duel between the two defensive clubs.

The Dons led 20-14 at the half, then surged out front 51-26.

St. Francis of Brooklyn remained unbeaten, shaking loose of New Jersey 92-82. The Terriers now are 14-0.

Elsewhere last night, North Carolina State, No. 4, walloped Virginia 99-54 in an Atlantic Coast Conference game; Southern Methodist gained full control of the Southwest Conference lead by smacking Baylor 92-72; and Coach Phog Allen went one up on rival Hank Iba as Kansas slipped past Oklahoma A&M 56-55.

U.S. Hockey Coach Denies Play In USSR

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP)—The coach of the U. S. ice hockey team today denied rumors that the squad would play in Moscow after the completion of the winter games.

"It's not so," said Robert B. Ridder of Minneapolis. "Neither Walter Brown (president of the International Ice Hockey Federation from Boston, Mass.) nor I have been approached by the Russians. We are committed to play in Switzerland and Sweden after the games and although we'd like to play in Russia it's getting very late to switch plans."

Police officers here are doing their job with a good deal of enthusiasm—Olympic authorities feel too much enthusiasm.

In the past couple of days, a television cameraman, a girl reporter and several spectators have complained that they were unnecessarily roughed up by policemen. And during the opening game ceremonies last week photographers said that police harassed them.

As a result, Olympic authorities have asked police officials to crack down on their men.

American bobsledders are vitally interested in a meeting here tomorrow of the International Bobsled Federation.

The federation is expected to rule on a Swiss demand for a change in the present regulations. The change likely would weaken Italy's new domination of the event.

Under the rules now in force, the weight on a two-man bobsled cannot exceed 462 pounds. The four bob maximum is 1,600 pounds.

The Italians picked the smallest available men for the sleds, making up the extra weight with lead slung as close to each sled's center of gravity as possible. This made the Italian sleds move easier and faster than most of the others.

The Swiss are asking that the metal allowance be reduced to 66 pounds.

Outsiders Key Behind Revolt Says Cherberg

SEATTLE (UP)—Johnny Cherberg, recently fired as University of Washington football coach, indicated here last night outside influences were a factor in his dismissal.

"Could it be I was fired because R. C. (Torchy) Torrance was faced with losing control of some of the players?" Cherberg asked during a 22-minute simulcast over a Seattle radio-television station (KING).

Torrance is a key athletic recruiter for the school, Cherberg claimed Torrance could have put down last year's so-called "player rebellion" when he first met with the disgruntled players.

Torrance could have stopped it "in his apartment or office, wherever he met with a couple of disgruntled players," Cherberg said.

He also insisted Harvey Cassill, athletic director, and H. P. (Dick) Everett, the school's vice president, could have stopped the controversy last Nov. 21—the first time the players made a formal complaint against Cherberg.

TAKES ADVICE
Cherberg said Cassill, acting on Everett's advice, informed him not to have his assistant coaches at a meeting where the situation was to be talked over among the players.

"Cowboy" Johnny said at that meeting the son of a prominent downtown alumnus buttonholled players outside the door and told them to ask questions and keep the discussion alive.

"I found later the boy who opened with questions and kept the discussion alive had been in Cassill's office just prior to the meeting," Cherberg said.

Cherberg said Cassill told him after the meeting "John, you handled yourself admirably. I'm all for you."

RECOMMENDATION
Cherberg said he would recommend the school operate along the lines prescribed by Pacific Coast Conference regulations and not have the players looking beyond the coaches and athletic department for counsel.

Both Cassill and Torrance declined to comment on Cherberg's talk. The station has offered equal time to any member of the school's athletic department for rebuttal.

"I'm here because I believe I'm right," Cherberg said in beginning his talk. "I don't want anybody to feel sorry for me, please, because football has been really good to me."

Roadkings Claim Second Goose Tatum

Klamath Basin basketball fans will be in for a big treat Thursday night at Oregon Tech's gymnasium as the Klamath Falls Basketball Association presents the Harlem Roadkings in an exhibition game against an all-star delegation from the local City League. Game time is 8 o'clock.

One of the prime factors in the Roadkings' large drawing power at the box office so far this season has been the playing of big Lester Burks, a wizard with a basketball. Wake Forest Diamond Boss Resigns Post

WAKE FOREST, N.C. (UP)—Wake Forest College's athletic director, Pat Preston, today announced his resignation after the sudden resignation of Baseball Coach Taylor Sanford.

Sanford, who coached the demon Deacons to the college "world championship" last summer, quit Tuesday because "I was given no assurance that I will have a job here after June 30."

He called a meeting to announce his decision, which he had reached "only a couple of days ago," and then handed a formal letter of resignation to Dr. Harold W. Tribble, president of the Baptist institution.

It was the third blow-up in the Wake Forest athletic department since the Dec. 3 resignation of Athletic Director Pat Preston and Head Football Coach Tom Rogers.

Last week the college hired former Army assistant Paul Amen to replace Rogers and named FBI agent William H. Gibson athletic director.

Tribble declined to comment on Sanford's resignation and refused to see reporters. He sent word to "just say I have no comment."

During a demonstration, Dec. 5, against rumors of possible athletic de-emphasis, students asked Tribble about Sanford's status and about reports that he would not be retained or had been asked to look for another job.

Tribble said at that time the college had considered the possibility of employing Sanford on a part-time basis to permit spending funds for coaches in minor sports. He added that he favored retaining Sanford.

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Soviets' Onrush Hits Snag

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP)—Madelaine Berthod, a petite Swiss farmer's daughter, and a trio of fair-haired lassies from Finland captured gold medals in the Winter Olympic Games Wednesday, upsetting Russia's hopes to cushion its unofficial team lead.

Miss Berthod, a cute five-footer celebrating her 25th birthday, streaked down the approximately one-mile Tolano course with wild abandon to win the "women's downhill race" in 1 minute, 40.7 seconds. She had a 4.7 second edge over the runnerup, Freda Danzer, another Swiss girl, while third place went to surprise, freckle-faced Canadian, Lucille Wheeler, who was clocked in 1:46.

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP)—Hayes Alan Jenkins, slender Colorado College senior, led an American 1-3 sweep of men's figures skating honors Wednesday and brought the United States its first gold medal of the seventh Winter Olympic Games.

Eighteen-year-old Ronnie Robertson of Long Beach, Calif., gave a brilliant demonstration in the free skating to gain second place, very close to the winner, while Jenkins' 19-year-old kid brother, Dave, won third.

It was Canada's first medal of the games—a bronze one—and the Dominion's first Olympic skiing medal ever.

Glady's (Skeets) Werner of Steamboat Springs, Colo., made America's best showing in the event, finishing tenth in 1:49.6, as bad luck continued to plague the two-time Olympic champion of 1952, Mrs. Andrea Mead Lawrence of Parahall, Colo.

Mrs. Lawrence, beaten in the two slalom events in which she won championships at Oslo, finished far back in the list in the slow time of 1:55.2.

Siri Rasmussen, a sturdy Finniest miss with her blonde hair flying from beneath a colorful woolen cap, put on a tremendous finishing burst on the final lap to score an upset victory over Russia in the 15-kilometer women's ski relay race.

The winning time for the nine miles, 564 yards through the Ampezzo Valley was 1 hour, 9 minutes and 1 second.

Russia's (Ljubov) Kozyreva, who won the 10-kilometer race last Saturday, took the favored Soviet team off to a 24-second lead in the first 5-kilometer lap of the race.

But Mirja Hietamies, taking the baton from Sirka Polkunen, picked up 18 seconds and 20 yards of the distance before yielding the stick to Miss Rasmussen, who proceeded to win by 27 seconds.

Russia was timed in 1:09:28 and Sweden, third, in 1:09:48.

This second place finish hoisted Russia's unofficial team point total to 94, which still is nearly twice that of the closest challenger, Austria, with 48 1/2. Norway was 44 and Sweden, 41.

The United States, given a tremendous boost by the 4-1 hockey victory over Canada Tuesday night trails with 9 1/2 points.
