Two Arraigned For Safe Theft

Two youths, who are alleged to have stolen a safe containing approximately \$1,380 from the Drumstick Tavern, were arraigned before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor on burglary charges.

The accused burglars, Donald Ray Birdwell, 21, Woodland, California, and Billy Joe Mattox, 21, Klamath Falls, both ranch workers, were arrested in Redding, California, 24 hours after the safe theft early Sunday morning.

The strongbox was found Wednesday morning in a spud cellar near the Klamath Falls Airport. City Detective R. N. (Bud) Adkins said the bottom of the safe had been knocked off with hammers. The accused burglars revealed the location of the safe after Adkins and Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon took custody of them Tuesday afternoon in Redding.

Adkins said \$1,380 in cash was recovered. The youths were arrested by Redding police while waiting at a garage to have the radio on an automobile repaired. Adkins said they readily admitted the safe burglary to Redding police and waived extradition. However, they first told officers they threw the safe in the Klamath River. Later they revealed its location.

Deputy District Attorney Robert Nichols said after their appearance before Judge Van Vactor, Birdwell and Mattox said they wanted to waive grand jury investigation and appear immediately before Judge David R. Vandenberg. It was expected they would be arraigned in circuit court late Wednesday afternoon.

Three False Fire Alarms Reported

One flooded oil stove and three false alarms, none of them malicious, were reported by Klamath Falls and Suburban fire departments for the 24 hour period ending at 10 a.m. today.

The overheated oil stove was at the residence of Raymond Hall, 6345 Simmers Avenue. Suburban firemen, who answered the call at 4:07 p.m. Tuesday, said damage was confined to the stove.

The Suburban department also had two of the false runs. One was at 1:04 p.m. Tuesday in the 2900 block on Hope Street and the other Wednesday morning in the 3900 block on Mack Avenue.

The city alarm was at 7:39 a.m. Wednesday in the 1500 block on Crescent.

Firemen said that in each case, they had received reports of smoke, but had been able to find any evidence of a fire.

McClain Gets Prison Term

George Amos McClain, 42-year-old bookkeeper, who pleaded guilty to embezzling \$1,000 while employed at the Willard Hotel here, was sentenced to 10 years in Oregon State Prison Wednesday by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Before passing sentence, Judge Vandenberg cited an FBI record which showed McClain had previously been convicted on another charge of embezzlement and also armed robbery.

McClain gave himself up two weeks ago to FBI agents in Philadelphia. He said he was wanted in Klamath Falls for embezzlement. Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon brought him to Klamath Falls from Philadelphia last week.

The complaint against McClain was signed by Marvin Brown, manager of the Willard.

Judge Performs Happy Task

DUNSMUIR—Judge A. A. Smith had another happy task this week. That of returning money for Christmas purchases to a minister's son and lifting the cloud of suspicion from a Dunsmuir lad.

Twenty-six dollars in water-stained bills with a billfold corrupted by fire marks was sent by registered mail to the Rev. William H. Gavin, minister of the First Presbyterian Church in Sitka, Alaska, yesterday by Judge Smith of the Dunsmuir Judicial Court.

The Rev. and Mrs. Gavin and their three sons had stayed overnight in Dunsmuir on December 3 en route from Lynn, Massachusetts to their new assignment. Bill Gavin, 13, had his Christmas money in a billfold and while playing in the snow, he lost it. The family confided to Mrs. J. Morgan Jones, motel owner, that they suspected the missing billfold had been picked up by a neighbor boy

with whom they had been playing. On December 30, Mrs. Harold K. Walsh kicked at what she thought was a worn piece of inner tube in the gutter. It was the missing billfold, same identification except for the initials W.H.G. She turned it in to the judicial court and arranged for proper advertising. The Gavins had thought it would be futile to report their loss to the proper authorities.

A maid at Oaklo motel called the advertising to the attention of Mrs. Jones and the Rev. Gavin promptly acknowledged a letter from her. When Chap Wentworth, publisher of the Dunsmuir News, heard the story, he marked the advertising paid and Mrs. Walsh paid for postage and registered mail so young Gavin could have his lost money returned intact.

Eugene Youth Named Finalist

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two Pacific Northwest teen-agers were among 40 high school seniors named finalists Wednesday in the 15th annual Science Talent Search contest conducted by the Science Club of America.

They are John M. Goodman, 16, Seattle, who wants a career as a research nuclear physicist, and Daniel Chen, 18, Eugene, Ore. who wants to be a university professor.

The eight girls and 32 boys—chosen from a field of 29,328—will arrive here March 1 to take part in the five-day science talent institute.

On March 5, the Westinghouse Educational Foundation, which is supported by the Westinghouse Electric Corp., will present cash awards to the pupils for application toward a science education. The top prize is \$2,800, second is \$2,000, the next eight are \$400 each, and the remainder receive \$100 each.
