Benson Scores Proposed Hog Price Support Plan

AUSTIN, Minn. (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson told farmers Wednesday a government program to buy hogs at supported prices "would hurt you more than it would ever help you."

Benson reiterated on the second day of a swing through the Midwest hog belt that the U. S. government is stepping up its pork-buying program—but that it won't purchase and store vast quantities of meat products to bolster prices.

"There are those who because of ignorance of the problem, mistaken judgment or for well-intentioned political purposes insist that your government go into the livestock buying business," the secretary said in a speech prepared for the Minnesota-Iowa Swing Producers Assn.

"This won't work," he said. "In my judgment such action would hurt you more than it would ever help you."

DA To Ponder Prison Terms

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Dist. Atty. Victor H. Blanc said he will recommend at a hearing today reconsideration of prison sentences given the couple who performed an abortion fatal to food chain heiress Doris Silver Osterreicher.

Blanc said Tuesday night after a meeting with Judge Vincent Carroll and counsel for Mr. and Mrs. Milton Schwartz that Carroll had agreed to reconsideration of the sentences for the Schwartzes.

Mrs. Schwartz, a 38-year-old beautician, was given an indeterminate sentence, in the State Industrial Home for Women, that her attorney William Gray said could keep her confined for "up to 10 years."

Schwartz, 49, a bartender, got a 3 to 10-year term in the Eastern State Penitentiary.

Gray had requested prior to the sentencing "yesterday" that his clients be given 11- to 23-month terms so they could be sent to the county prison here.

Just before the Schwartzes heard their sentence, Carroll had given the third principal in the case, Mrs. Herman Silver, mother of the 22-year-old abortion victim, a suspended sentence. She had arranged the abortion.

All three could have received maximum penalties of 10 years imprisonment and a \$5,000 fine. Carroll said in sentencing Mrs. Silver, 49, that the "memory of this dreadful tragedy... will be substantial and overwhelming punishment." Mrs. Silver had pleaded no defense to a charge of being an accessory to the abortion last Aug. 24 in the Schwartzes' North Philadelphia apartment.

State Politicos Comment On Patterson's Death

Oregon political leaders made these comments on learning of Gov. Paul Patterson's death:

Wendell Wyatt, state Republican committee chairman: "Oregon has lost a great governor, a great patriot and a great citizen. My sympathy—the bounds of which I cannot express—is extended to his family and to all the people of Oregon."

Monroe Sweetland, state senator and Democratic national committeeman: "Paul Patterson was a gentle, kindly man. Even those with the strongest political differences liked and respected him personally."

Jess Gard, Oregon Republican national committeeman: "I am shocked and grieved beyond all comprehension. It is sad that he could not have continued his great service to the state of Oregon and the nation."

Howard Morgan, state Democratic chairman: "I was deeply distressed and genuinely sorry to learn the sad news of Gov. Patterson's death. On behalf of all members of my party, I extend deepest sympathy to Mrs. Patterson and all the members of the governor's family."

State Rep. Elmer Deetz, who would have opposed Gov. Patterson in the May primary for U.S. Senator: "I am deeply grieved to hear of the death of Gov. Patterson. I have nothing to say politically at this time."

State Rep. Edward Geary, Klamath Falls, speaker of the Oregon House of Representatives: "The state and the nation have lost a marvelous man. His death is a terrible blow to the lot of us. I would say it is one of the greatest political losses ever suffered by the State of Oregon."

Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay: "His death is a great loss to the people of Oregon. Paul Patterson was a great public servant. A close friend, I had a very great admiration for him, for his integrity and ability. I express my deep sympathy to his family."

Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore): "I'm awfully sorry and terribly shocked. Both Mrs. Morse and myself are deeply sorry for this news. We extend to Mrs. Patterson and other members of the family our deepest sympathy and prayers for strength in the hour of sorrow."

Although we did not always agree politically, he was the sort of person who made you realize that political differences between people of good will were essentially superficial. His passing is a tragic loss to our state, to our country, and of course, particularly to his devoted family. We are fortunate we had the benefit of his public service for a good many years."

Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore): "I am very shocked. I have known him for years—ever since he was a constituent of mine in Hillsboro. My greatest sympathy is extended to his family. His death is a great loss to all."

French Socialist Mollet Takes Over Premiership

PARIS (AP)—France's first Socialist Premier since 1947 took over the governmental reins today, heading a non-Communist leftist coalition pledged to prompt negotiations to end the costly Algerian conflict.

The Socialist party secretary general who once taught high school English was confirmed as the nation's 22nd postwar Premier by an unusually large majority of the National Assembly.

The vote was 420-71 with 83 abstentions.

Mollet presented his 113 ministerial Cabinet and 23 secretaries-of-state to President Rene Coty in a formal ceremony at the Elysee Palace Wednesday morning. The new Cabinet will hold its first meeting Friday.

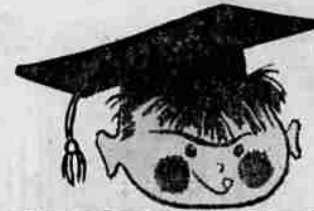
The chamber's 151 Communists gave their votes to Mollet to pressure him for the "popular front" tieup they seek with the Socialists. To counter this, the Catholic MRP (Popular Republican Movement) and other moderate groups voted with Mollet's Republican Front of Socialists and Radicals, and most rightists abstained. This gave the new Premier a majority of those voting without the Reds.

The Republican Front, which Mollet leads jointly with Radical party leader Pierre Mendes-France actually has only about 180 votes in the 596-member Assembly. Because of this the government is generally conceded a life expectancy of only three or four months.
