

Washington, Uclans Mix In PCC 'Crucial'

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Washington and UCLA clash in the 10th what may be the tell-tale series for the Pacific Coast Conference championship and a berth in the NCAA playoffs.

Although both teams have been bounced around more than somewhat in non-conference engagements, they look powerful inside their own loop.

UCLA, with an overall record of 10 wins against five defeats, has a perfect 4-0 record inside the conference; the Huskies, winners of nine and beaten seven times overall, have a 5-1 mark in league play.

This clash is expected to steal some of the thunder from the upstart California Basketball Association race, which will feature the University of San Francisco Dons going after their 42nd consecutive triumph tonight against Loyola of Los Angeles.

UCLA fans who have been used to watching such great performers as Maurice Taft and Willie Naulls in action, will get to see something new in Bruno (Bonco) Boin—one of the finest young hook-shot artists to come along in recent years. Boin is only 18 years old and a sophomore, but he stands six feet, eight inches tall and still is growing. He has developed an overhead hook shot from the corner of the floor that is tremendously successful and so far this season he has averaged 16 points per game—which isn't bad for just a beginner.

Santee Refuses To Enter

NEW YORK (AP)—Wes Santee, America's controversial and fastest miler, has withdrawn, apparently by request, from three of the top indoor track and field meets of the season, including the Millrose Games at Madison Square Garden in which he was scheduled to meet unbeaten Ron Delany in the Wanamaker Mile tomorrow night.

In almost identical telegrams to promoters of the Millrose meet, the New York A.C. Games on Feb. 18 and the National AAU championships Feb. 25, Lt. Tom Rosanovich, coach of the Quantico Marines, cancelled Santee's entry because of "personal business." Santee, a lieutenant in the Marines, is stationed at Quantico.

While "personal business" was given as the reason, America's chief hope for the Olympic 1,500-meter title obviously has decided to forego further running until final decision is reached regarding his amateur standing.

Santee, reached at Quantico, said the "personal business" had nothing to do with a leg injury, which sidelined him until last Saturday when he ran fourth in the National Delany at Boston. Delany was timed in 4:06.3 and Santee in 4:08.

While declining to comment further, the former Kansas ace did indicate his withdrawal was the result of a request by a seven-man AAU investigating committee.

The charges against Santee allege he received exorbitant expenses for competing in four California meets last spring. He was absolved of wrongdoing by a split vote of his local Missouri Valley AAU executive committee last fall. But the case was reopened at the AAU's national convention in December.

Nats Launch Pennant Drive

The Syracuse Nationals, defending champions in the National Basketball League, were ready to launch a drive for a playoff berth today when they met Captain Paul Seymour is back in harness.

Fully recovered from a broken wrist suffered early last month, Seymour came off the bench Thursday night to spearhead the Nationals to a come-back 97-80 victory over the Rochester Royals.

It was the Nats' first victory in their last four games and moved them to within three games of the third-place New York Knickerbockers, who dropped an 88-87 verdict to the Philadelphia Warriors on the same bill at Syracuse.

In another twinned bill at St. Louis, the Hawks climbed out of the Western Division cellar by surprising the Fort Wayne Pistons, 96-90, while the Boston Celtics edged the Minneapolis Lakers, 109-101. Bill Sharman scored 35 points and Ed Macauley had 31 for the Celtics.

Pascual Selected For MVP

Little Camillo Pascual of Washington, the apple of Charlie Dressen's eye, is being sought by several American League clubs but his chances of landing him were not enhanced today when he was named the Most Valuable Player in the Cuban Winter League.

Despite the 2-12 record Pascual posted with Washington last year, Yankee skipper Casey Stengel goes into rhapsodies describing him and Marty Marion of the White Sox has indicated he wouldn't mind having him, either.

With Washington last season, Pascual was knocked out in 15 of his 16 starts and couldn't do anything right. With the Cienfuegos club, for whom he is pitching in Havana now, he can't do anything wrong. Latest league records credit him with 12 victories and five defeats.

Pascual outpiled Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell, the St. Louis Cardinals' fireballer who is now toiling for the Havana Reds, 13 votes to six, in balloting by sports writers covering the Cuban league.

The Arthur Gardner Trophy, emblem of the most valuable player award in Cuba, will be presented to the 150-pound Pascual in a special ceremony Sunday, Gardner, the U.S. ambassador to Cuba, will make the presentation personally.

Even while receiving the good news from the Cubans, the Senators were signing players. Wheeler Sparks Bearcats

A classy Cincinnati club, with a powerhouse guy named Phil Wheeler, left the selection committee of the National Invitation Tournament crying in its bed today over what might have been.

The Bearcats looked great in beating St. John's of Brooklyn 93-78 at Madison Square Garden last night. Wheeler scored 37 points. But for all the raves, Cincy (14-3) is beyond reach of the NIT because of NCAA probation.

The NIT has decided to skip any teams not acceptable for the NCAA championship tourney.

St. Louis also left the NIT a bit gloomy last night, coming from 11 points back to edging Wichita 90-88 on two free throws in the last 3 seconds by Jim McLaughlin, who scored 36. That gave the Billikens a 5-0 record in the Missouri Valley Conference and a trump card in the title chase that leads to the NCAA Tournament.

The NIT would much rather have the Bills wind up second in the Missouri Valley—and pay a return visit to its shrines.

St. Louis, which also defeated Cincy, along with Indiana, is rated No. 11 in the nation and was one of three ranked teams in action last night. Louisville (No. 5) hit 47 per cent from the field and 23 of 24 tosses to rally Toledo 93-64. Morehead (Ky.), however, upset 18th-ranked Marshall 108-103 in overtime. Morehead is No. 1, Marshall No. 2 in national offense rankings.

Wheeler, a 6-4 hometown product, wanted the whole show for Cincinnati. He got his help from Frank Nimmo, who scored 20 from outside, and 6-9 soph Connie Dierking, who did well off the boards when regular Dave Plunkett, 6-8, was shackled by fouls and spent most of the game on the bench.

St. Louis got into an early hole at Wichita and trailed 48-37 at the half before catching fire.

Big Charley Tyra, as usual, was high for Louisville, which tumbled Dayton from the unbeaten Saturday. He hit 10 of 14 from the field and finished with 20 points.

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Congressman Suggests Ring Tax Program

WASHINGTON (AP)—Joe Louis' income tax troubles have prompted a Virginia congressman to suggest it might be a good idea if a boxer's purse was made subject to withholding deductions.

A discussion of the situation came up last week during closed door testimony by Internal Revenue Service officials before a House appropriations subcommittee. The testimony was made public Thursday night.

Rep. Gary (D-Va.), the subcommittee chairman, and other members of the group wanted to know how come the former heavyweight champion of the world had fallen so deeply in arrears to Uncle Sam. (Total income tax liens against Louis now total \$1,210,789. They cover the years 1946 through 1951).

Internal Revenue Commissioner Russell C. Harrington told Gary that since Louis was in the category of an "independent contractor," his big purses were not subject to withholding deductions for income tax purposes.

Harrington also said he could understand how a man with such "enormous" expenses could find that "when it came to paying the tax he had no money."

At that point, Gary said serious consideration should be given to changing the law so boxers and others in a like earnings situation would be subject to withholding during the same hearing. O. Gordon Delk, the Revenue Service's deputy commissioner, said tax officials are eyeing some of Louis' trust funds. Delk said that if the funds to set up these trusts "came from money that should have gone to the government taxes, it is possible we could reach into them."

John Salkeld Wins
VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP)—John Salkeld of Calgary outpointed Buddy McDonald of Edmonton Thursday night to win a unanimous decision in the main event of a boxing card.

The fight was billed as for the Pacific Northwest welterweight championship. Salkeld weighed 143 1/2; McDonald 146 1/2.
Earle Lewis, 151, Seattle, scored a second round knockout over Gerry Fraser, 164 1/2, Spokane, in a preliminary.

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U.S. Bobsledders Make Bid For Winter Olympics Medal

America's daring bobsledders made a record-smashing bid for the four-man championship Friday and Austria's "miracle man of the skies," Toni Sailer, rang up an unprecedented Alpine grand slam in the Winter Olympic Games.

Art Tyler, a 40-year-old Rochester, N.Y., physicist, piloted his sled to third place, behind two fast Swiss entries, after the first two of four runs on Mt. Tofana's chipped-up mile-long chute. But he has less than a second to make up in Saturday's final shots.

Sailer, handsome, 21-year-old plumber, already winner of the giant and special slalom races, became the first triple gold medalist of the seventh games when he won the downhill race in 2 minutes, 52.2 seconds.

The approximately one mile, 1,020 yard skiing strip, with a sharp drop and lightning snow, was strewn with accidents.

A young Austrian couple, Elizabeth (Sissy) Schwarz, 19, and Kurt Oppelt, 21, captured the figure skating pairs title, upsetting the favored world champions from Canada.

The Canadians, Frances Dafee and Norris Bowden, finished second in very close scoring.
