Oregon Firms To Open Mills

KEMMERER, Wyo. (AP)—Two firms announced Friday they will build sawmills four miles north of Kemmerer to process about 50 million board feet of timber. Fall Creek Lumber Co. of Fall Creek, Ore., and Mills Lumber Co., of Kalispell, Mont., announced the sawmills would process lumber from the Gypsum Creek area of Bridger National Forest, 40 miles north of Pinedale.

The firms were successful bidders on 15,000 acres of timber. They plan to cut 15 million board feet each year. The logs will be trucked to the Kemmerer mills, which will saw about 50,000 board feet daily.

LETTER FROM WASHINGTON

The first big bill of this session will be on the floor of the House in a few days. This bill, to provide federal assistance in the construction of school classrooms, is generally referred to as the legislation to carry out President Eisenhower's recommendation. Actually, as reported by the House Committee on Education and Labor, it is closely related to the President's plan but differs from it in several important respects. The administration proposal was to authorize \$250 million a year for five years. The bill calls for \$400 million a year for four years. The administration proposed to make grants to states on the basis of need in relation to a state's population. The bill also into consideration the effort made by the state to meet its own need. The Kelly bill simply proposes to make available to each state an amount arrived at by multiplying the number of children between the ages of 5 and 17 by \$11.30.

Some states now have adequate classroom facilities but under the Kelly bill the money will be there for all if and when such states decide they do need it. I am afraid this method of allocation will have the effect of ultimately shifting a heavy portion of the cost of building schools over to the federal government. I am going to listen carefully to the debate on this part of the bill. The Kelly bill formula might be the best but I doubt it. I feel inclined now to vote for an amendment using the President's idea.

So far as Oregon is concerned we will gain nothing in dollar aid from this bill. In fact we will be just a little better off if the

federal treasury would merely let us keep the amount of tax money to be paid by Oregon taxpayers for the support of this program. Some of the Southern states now fighting the Supreme Court decision on race integration are also states badly in need of more school classrooms. As I understand it those states plan to get around the anti-segregation decision by diverting state funds to private schools. Regardless of whether or not the Powell anti-segregation amendment is adopted, the Southern states referred to would get no help from the Kelly bill except for their public-school systems. If their idea is carried out surely they would then have enough classrooms. The bill provides funds for the public-school systems only. Thus these Southern states would pay their share of the cost of the Kelly bill but might receive nothing from it for themselves.

Recently I testified before the House Appropriations Committee which is writing the money bill for the Forest Service and "related functions." The latter includes the Fish and Wildlife Service, the Bureau of Land Management and some others. I urged appropriation of the budgeted figures in most cases but made an appeal for at least 25 million dollars for the construction of timber access roads in place of the 17 million dollars asked in the budget. Now I am busy preparing some rather lengthy testimony to be given before the Public Works Subcommittee regarding the need for more money for flood control, surveys, irrigation and navigation projects in our Fourth Congressional District.

We plan on giving a radio program over the 4-H Program on KFJL. The date hasn't been set yet, but we plan on giving it toward the first of February.

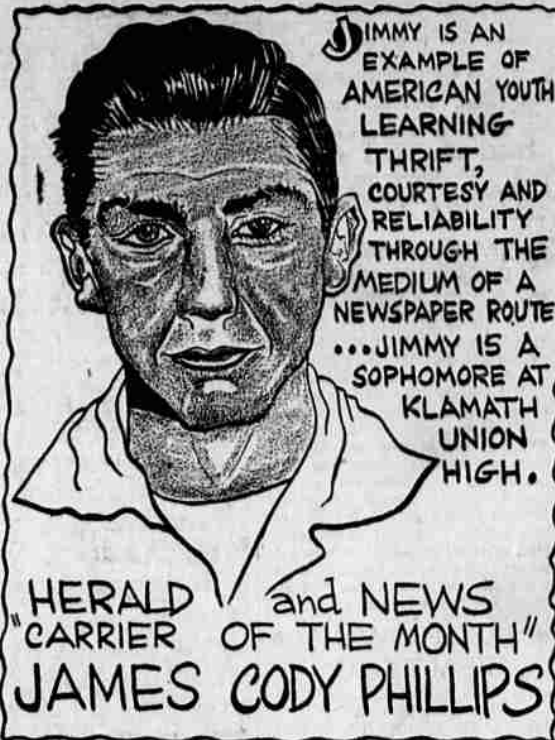

NEW BOOKS ON THE DESK

On my desk are many different kinds of books. I will give you just a sample:

"In My Father's House" by Grace Nies Fletcher is the story of her father's life. A Methodist minister with one of the largest parishes in the America of his day, his vitality and living faith helped thousands to see the way.

This book tells of his joys, and sorrows. He was an immigrant boy who grew up with the love of God in his heart, and his ministry was without frills, but one of deep conviction and love. In some ways he reminds me very much of Peter Marshall in "A Man Called Peter." There is the same unaffected love of all human beings, poor and rich alike.

For the plant lover and gardener, there are two new books on house plants. The first one is "Orchids as House Plants" by Rebecca T. Northern. The author claims they can be raised as easily as other common house flowers. The second book is "Growing Plants Under Artificial Light" by Peggie Schulz. This author says that artificial light is the Twentieth Century's greatest boon to gardeners. She tells how to contrive your own set-ups. She gives detailed culture for some 155 plants and much more information.

"Pondoro, Last of the Ivory Hunters" by John Taylor is the story of Mr. Taylor's life. The name Pondoro is a shortening of the word Chimpondoro, meaning "the lion like one" or the "roaring of the lion." For more than thirty years, Taylor has been a profes-

sional hunter. The story he tells is interesting not only of the elephant, but of other animals as well. The author has a great understanding of the natives that I found very interesting.

She was placed in neck traction yesterday to relieve pain from a five-year-old skiing accident, her studio announced. Occasionally a slight strain aggravates the injury. She is expected to leave St. John's hospital tomorrow for a rest in Palm Springs.

Park Visitor List Rises

Visitors to Crater Lake National Park during 1955 were 7.2 per cent fewer than in 1954, the record year at the park, superintendent Tom Williams reported today.

Williams said that there were several factors which might have contributed to the decline, including disagreeable spring weather, road repairs in the park and smoke from forest fires which seriously reduced visibility in September. He said that 26,715 fewer people visited the park in 1955 than in 1954. There were 343,839 visitors riding in 56,934 autos in the park in 1955 compared to 370,554 visitors in 102,342 autos in 1954.

The top month in 1955 was August, when 112,047 persons visited the park. The top month in 1954 was July, when 115,154 persons were logged into the park. July 4, 1954, was the record single day, with 5,981 persons visiting the park.

Yreka Concern Gets Bid Award

DUNSMUIR — A. J. McMurry Construction Company of Yreka was low, at \$152,568, among the six bids opened January 31 for construction of four classrooms and a multi-purpose room at the Cypress school in Redding. Award of the contract will not be made until bids on similar projects at Manzanita and Bonny View schools have been opened.

Siebert Stephens, Redding district superintendent, said trustees hope to award contracts Tuesday night, February 7, but will wait until all bids are read. They want to be certain the district has enough money to finance all construction from the bond issue of \$481,000, which was passed last June by the voters.

Former Governor To Address OTI

Dan Thornton, administrative assistant to President Eisenhower will address OTI students at an assembly Monday morning in the campus theater, according to Institute Director W. D. Purvine. Thornton was governor of Colorado for two terms, from 1950 to 1954. Preceding Thornton's address on the mile-high campus there will be a musical program by the Harmonaires, Baritone Lawrence Smith and pianist and soprano Barbara Pearson will present "Song America Loves," folk songs, spirituals, popular and semi-classical numbers.

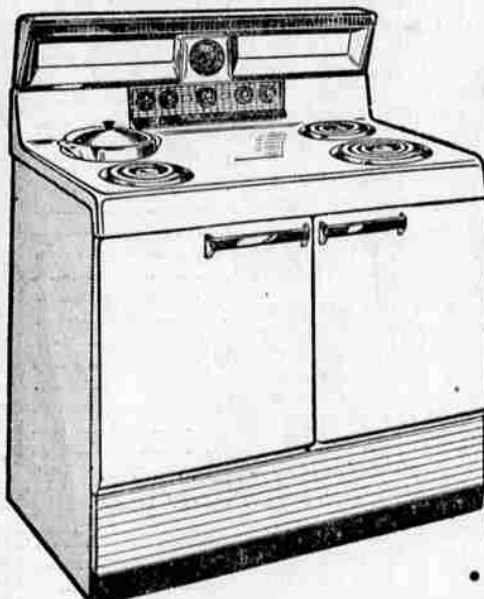
AGREEMENT SIGNED
