J. W. Trask, District Engineer of the California Division of Highways since 1950, has been transferred to Marysville to take charge of the district office there. He replaces A. M. Nash, the present district engineer who goes to take charge of the San Luis Obispo office.

Trask is a graduate of Utah State in the class of 1923. He worked for the Bureau of Reclamation and Bureau of Public Roads until 1928. He then came to the California Division of Highways and worked in the bridge department in Sacramento and was later transferred to the Bay Bridge at San Francisco. He then moved back to Sacramento and became assistant office engineer in 1939, and then became assistant engineer in charge of city cooperative projects in 1939.

Red Bluff Bull Sale Sets \$484 Per Head Average

Prices at the 15th annual Red Bluff Range Bull Sale last week ran somewhat lower than in past sales, but sale officials said they felt this was an indication of a general lowering in cattle prices, rather than the reflection of any reduction of quality in the bulls offered at the sale.

In the final day of the sale, a total of \$98,855 was paid for 203 Hereford sires in the sale at the Tehama County Fairgrounds.

Striking an average of \$484 per head, the Hereford sales followed the trend set by the Shorthorn, Angus and Polled Hereford sales earlier. The average represents a 36 per cent decline from the 1955 average of \$752 per head.

The March of Dimes bull, donated by Frank and Margaret Day of Montague, brought in a total of \$3,775, as guest auctioneer Princess Kekaulike Kawannakoa sold

the bull to 30 donors, each of whom re-donated the bull for sale, and, for the ninth consecutive year, Charles and Bertha Stover of Red Bluff were the final purchasers.

San Isabel Ranch of Westcliffe, Colorado topped the sale in purchasing a consignment of the Grove Hereford Ranch of Millville, Shasta County for \$3,650. Next in line money wise was another Grove entry bringing \$2,900 from E. L. Gardner of St. George, Utah.

T. M. McIntyre of Corning, Tehama County gave the third highest price in paying \$2,650 for a consignment of Herbert Chandler of Baker, Oregon. The show's champion, consigned by Peterson Brothers of Ogden, Utah went to Daggett and Hayes of Joseph, Oregon for \$2,450, while the reserve champion of Double M Hereford Ranch of Adams, Oregon brought \$1,200 from Raymond A. Ferrario of San Leandro, Calif.

In the pen classes, Bear Valley Ranch of Olena, Sonoma County, paid \$2,000 for a pen of two consigned by Double M Hereford Ranch, while the champion pen of two from the Collier Hereford Ranch at Pomeroy, Washington went for \$1,100 to S. L. Van Vleck

of Sloughhouse, Sacramento County.

The Double M Ranches champion pen of five brought \$3,500 from Bear Valley Ranch. A pen of three entry by Schwisow Brothers of Ritzville, Washington went for \$2,550 to Dr. Clarence C. Reed of Montague, Siskiyou County while the champion pen of three by Peterson Brothers sold for \$1,500 to Kerr Brothers of Blue Lake, Humboldt County.

Total sales for both days came to \$146,145.

Among the Hereford consignors:

were the Dudley Parker Ranch of Gazelle, Lawrence Horton of Poe Valley, the Day Hereford Ranch of Montague, the Hoy Hereford Ranch of Weed.

Hereford buyers included L. Meshe of Tulelake, C. A. Grissom of Edgewood, F. W. Odenchain of Bly, Dr. Clarence C. Reed of Montague, Geary Brothers of Klamath Falls, Jess Martin of Montague, W. C. Dalton Corp. of Malin, Earl B. Flock of Montague and the Wolff Ranch of Chiloquin.

The average paid for the 60 Shorthorns sold was \$329.75. The

only buyer listed who operates in Southeastern Oregon was R. H. Kerr of Lakeview.

The average price of the 27 Angus was \$441.85. Consignors included the Scott Valley Ranch of Etna, Dale West of Merrill and the Alta

Vista Ranch of Montague. Carl R. McConnell of Etna was among the buyers.

The top average price was the \$530.81 paid for the 31 polled Herefords. One of the bulls was sold to Anton Sutz of Merrill.
