ACCUSATIONS

BOMBAY. (AP) — India Tuesday accused foreign newspapers of carrying inaccurate and exaggerated reports of the death toll in the January Bombay riots. A communiqué said only 76 persons had been killed in the rioting "and not between 250 and 400" as published in "foreign newspapers." During the rioting, responsible sources who checked hospitals said more than 300 persons had died of wounds in the mob violence.

Toothbrush Still Best Weapon For Tooth Decay

(Editors Note: This is the third in a series of six articles on dental health being presented in cooperation with the Klamath County, as part of the 1956 observance of National Children's Dental Health Week, Feb. 5-11.)

The number one weapon in the home arsenal for fighting dental disease is still the toothbrush. Used correctly and at the proper times, with or without a commercial dentifrice, the toothbrush can be an invaluable aid in keeping tooth decay and gum diseases from getting a start.

Somewhere between a child's second and third birthdays, the second molars, last of the 20 teeth in the first set, will make their appearance. At the same age, the child should begin learning to use a toothbrush.

Starting a child on toothbrushing much before this time is unwise because the gums may be highly sensitive while the teeth are in the process of erupting.

Usually, a child will be quite interested in learning to use a toothbrush at the age of two-and-a-half or three, particularly if he sees his parents brushing their teeth after eating. A pleasant tasting toothpaste and a brush scaled to the child's size are added inducements.

Dentifrices can be an aid to the toothbrush in cleaning the teeth, just as soap is an aid in cleaning the hands. But it is the toothbrushing after eating that helps to prevent dental disease and not the dentifrice.

Toothpaste, rather than tooth powder, is recommended for a small child for the practical reason that less will be spilled. The toothpaste should be chosen for its taste rather than for any therapeutic claims which may be made for it.

As for the toothbrush, it should be small enough to reach all areas of the mouth. A brush with a straight, small head about one

inch long and with all tufts the same length is the most effective. But most important is the timing. Teeth should be brushed immediately after eating in order to remove bits of food before they have a chance to ferment. A vigorous rinsing of the mouth with water is the next best thing.

There is no universally "best" method for brushing teeth. Your dentist can show you what type of brushing is suited to your child's particular needs.

One satisfactory way is to brush the teeth the way they grow, up on the lower teeth, down on the upper teeth. Brush them in a definite order and be certain to clean both the sides by the tongue and by the cheeks as well as the chewing surfaces.

WASHINGTON. (AP) — The House has passed a bill extending polio vaccination aid to states until June 30, 1957. The aid authority was due to expire this month. The bill now goes to the President.

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
