Two Crises Face Alabama University; Calm Reigns

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP)—Two crises confront the University of Alabama, beset by problems stemming from its removal of racial barriers by court order.

A strained calm ruled today on the campus, scene of disorders that erupted in protest against integration, as university officials faced these problems.

1. A Negro coed, excluded from the campus "until further notice" after increasingly violent demonstrations against her presence, threatens court action unless she is admitted to classes by tomorrow.

Autherine Lucy, 26, first of her race to enter the 125-year-old university, said yesterday: "I am still determined to attend the University of Alabama."

2. And William Adams, dean of admissions at the school, has been summoned into federal court at Birmingham tomorrow morning to show cause why he should not be held in contempt for the school's refusal to enroll Mrs. Polly Ann Hudson.

The two Birmingham women both won a federal court ruling that the university cannot deny Negroes enrollment because of their race.

The Board of Trustees denied Mrs. Hudson admission on the basis of her "conduct and marital record." She is seeking a divorce. She charged that the order was a "smear."

The Alabama Legislature endorsed the trustees' action in excluding Miss Lucy as a necessary step, but criticism came from another quarter.

In New York, the National Assn. for Advancement of Colored People said it had sent a telegram to Atty. Gen. Brownell urging him to start criminal proceedings

"against any and all persons acting in this manner" to prevent the coed from attending classes. Brownell is out of the country.

The Lucy-Hudson cases reached their turbulent climax last week after the university lost the legal tug-of-war over racial segregation in U. S. District Court at Birmingham and in the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals at New Orleans.

The school still can appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court, but no decision has been announced on this possible step.

An apprehensive calm returned to the campus yesterday after the trustees excluded Miss Lucy on the grounds it was necessary for her safety and that of other students and faculty members.

Dr. O. C. Carmichael, university president, reported that Jeff Bennett, assistant to the president, told him the young woman was twice within 20 seconds of "stark tragedy" during riotous, campus disturbances Monday.

ACADEMY WARNS

PARIS (AP)—France's National Academy of Medicine warned parents Wednesday children under 14 shouldn't drink alcoholic beverages. After 14, it said, a little diluted wine, light beer or cider was all right at mealtimes. The academy took a dim view of parents who let young children pack a bottle with the lunches they take to school.

Three Negroes Enroll At NC

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP)—Three Negro undergraduates have been absorbed in the 6,500-member student body at the University of North Carolina with no more violent campus reaction than raised eyebrows.

One semester after a federal court order broke the racial barrier at the general college level, not even startled expressions followed Leroy and Ralph Frazier and their friend John Lewis Brandon across the campus of this 161-year-old traditionally white Southern university.

The quiet end to segregation was thrown into sharp relief this week by turmoil at the University of Alabama, where rioting students greeted the admission of a Negro coed.

While Autherine Lucy fled eg-thriving classmates at Tuscaloosa, John Brandon exchanged casual greetings with white boys rooming in the dormitory with him on this peaceful village campus.

Leroy, 15, and his brother Ralph, 14 months younger, live within a couple of blocks of North Carolina College in Durham, a state-supported institution for Negroes. Brandon, 18, also lives within easy distance.

After high school, they trained their sights instead on the University in Chapel Hill, some 12 miles distant but a world away for Negro undergraduates until that time.

SIX JETS CRASH

Former Flood Threat Told

ROSEBURG (AP)—Southern Oregon, rather than Northern California, might have taken the brunt of the Christmas holiday rainstorm, it was disclosed Monday.

Robert Root, Medford, a member of the State Water Resources Board, told the Chamber of Commerce here only a quirk in the weather prevented it.

Root said the Weather Bureau told him forecasters had predicted the storm would center on Mt. Seixon, between Roseburg and Grants Pass. Instead it hit farther south, in Northern California.

Southern Oregon, of course, came in for plenty of damage from the storm.

Root said there was a loss of nearly 2 million dollars in the Rogue River Basin and about 1 million in the Umpqua River watershed.

Total damage to the state, he said, was 13 million dollars. He did not break the figure down by areas.

Root said the Water Resources Board got its damage estimates from Army Engineers.

The board was told, he said, that if the center of the storm had hit Southern Oregon, the Rogue River would have had to carry 2.7 times as much water as it did; the Umpqua 2.5 times, and the Willamette 1.75 times.

Root met here with representatives of Umpqua Basin communities. The basin had been chosen as the first area to be surveyed in the board's water control program, authorized by the Legislature.

The Douglas County Court called the meeting to get advice on how a local cooperating committee can be set up.

BRICK STAINS
OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—Mrs. Nora Smith, back home yesterday after being out of town three weeks, took one look at her living room and telephoned police.

"There are blood stains on my wall and some of it is dripping down from the attic," she said. Det. B. G. Thurman investigated, found the "blood" to be brick stains which had seeped through the chimney wall from melting ice and snow.
