## Vet Medical Abuse Told

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Olin E. Teague (D-Tex.) said today federal investigators have found "some very flagrant" abuse of the system of free Veterans Administration medical care for penniless veterans.

Teague, chairman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, received the report from the General Accounting Office. He said he is so concerned that he may make public the names of some of the veterans involved, as a means of reducing the abuse.

Among cases reported by the GAO in a sample survey:

1. A retired construction engineer having a net financial worth of \$507,670 and an income of \$21,719 a year got free VA hospitalization for 25 days.
2. A farmer with income of \$3,000 a year and net worth of \$28,053 also got VA hospital treatment for 25 days.

Both men were treated for illnesses not connected with war service and made sworn statements that they were unable to pay.

Present law requires the VA to provide free hospitalization for non-service-connected cases upon the veteran's own word that he can't afford the cost of private treatment. That's provided the VA has beds available after taking care of service-connected cases.

## New Marilyn Busts Out All Over During Press Confab

NEW YORK (UP)—The "new" Marilyn Monroe was unveiled Thursday but another, unsuspected unveiling left little doubt that the old Marilyn Monroe was still around.

Mrs. Monroe, a blooming young actress who wants to do dramatic parts, met the press along with her new associate, Sir Laurence Olivier.

For a time everything went along just fine and the "new" Monroe discussed a picture she plans to make with Olivier as photographers duly recorded the spectacle of a black sheath dress that covered roughly the lower two-thirds of her famous frame.

Then, a strap broke and the old Marilyn Monroe busted out all over.

There was a near stampede and flashbulbs popped in dazzling profusion.

Someone (a woman reporter) produced a safety pin but the ice had broken along with the strap and things took on the atmosphere of a Mardis Gras.

Amidst the assertion of photographers that they could die happy, Olivier loudly volunteered to take his coat off, too.

No one took up his offer so Olivier clung to his dignity until the tumult died down and the strap was pinned up.

"No leg pictures of Miss Monroe boys," he cautioned photographers, "from now on, she's too ethical."

The news conference revealed, among other things, that Miss Monroe has hired Olivier to star in a film, "The Sleeping Prince," being produced by Miss Monroe. She said she will co-star, using the new dramatic techniques she has learned in New York's exclusive Actors Studio.

Asked if she still wants to do Dostoyevsky's "The Brothers Karamazov," Miss Monroe said: "I don't want to play the brothers Karamazov. I want to play Grushenka. She's a girl."

Asked if she still has the ability, Olivier said: "Miss Monroe is, in my opinion, a brilliant comedienne and therefore an extremely good actress."

"I hope we produce the movie in London. I've never seen Europe before," Miss Monroe said. "I'll

## Mrs. Lubken To Attend Meet

The meetings will be held March 5, 6 and 7 at Hotel Statler, Washington, D.C., with Bertha S. Adams, assistant to the chairman of the Republican National Committee, as conference director. Her committee includes Mrs. Sherman Adams, wife of the assistant to the President; Mrs. Leonard W. Hall, wife of the Republican national chairman; Mrs. Randolph Burgess, wife of the under secretary of the treasury; Mrs. Barry Goldwater, wife of the chairman of the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee; Mrs. Richard M. Simpson, wife of the chairman of the Republican Congressional Committee, and Mrs. Carroll D. Keatts, president of the National Federation of Republican Women.

Eight Oregon women attended the third annual conference last year and approximately 30 are expected to go to Washington this year. About 1,500 women from all over the country are expected.

During the general business sessions reports will be heard from several officials, including Herbert Hoover, Jr., under secretary of state; Wilbur M. Brucker, secretary of the Army; Charles S. Thomas, secretary of the Navy; Donald A. Quarles, secretary of the Air Force; George M. Humphrey, secretary of the treasury; James P. Mitchell, secretary of labor; Ezra T. Benson, secretary of agriculture, and others.

Campaign discussions will occupy most of the second afternoon of the conference. A tour of the White House and a luncheon will conclude the sessions on March 7.

A gold medal award also was presented to Buddy Adler, producer of "Love Is A Many Splendored Thing," who is the new acting production head of 20th Century Fox.

A crowd of 500 persons attended the magazine's 35th annual presentation at the Beverly Hilton.

## Felon Makes Freedom Try

Robert Lee Williams, 21-year-old robber, awaiting sentence for a grocery store holdup, made a break for freedom Thursday afternoon after leaving a physician's office in the Medical-Dental Building.

Williams had been taken to the doctor's office for treatment of a bullet wound in his left shoulder. He was in custody of Deputy Sheriff Del Summer.

Summers acceded to Williams' request to remove a pair of handcuffs from his wrists as they were entering the office building.

Later as they were leaving the building and Summers started to replace the handcuffs, Williams suddenly bolted and ran along Ninth Street.

Summers overtook the youth near the Montgomery Ward Store. A struggle followed and Williams escaped again. He was finally retaken by Summers near Ward's Klamath Funeral Home on High Street. Again Williams put up a fight but Summers subdued him.

He was returned to his cell in the county jail.

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg is scheduled to pass sentence on Williams next Tuesday. He pleaded guilty to armed robbery.

The youth was wounded by Lawrence B. Gaylord, attendant at Yader's Service Station during an attempted holdup. He later was arrested when he appeared at Klamath Valley Hospital for treatment.
