Police Grab Killer Irvin In Bay Area

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Indiana officers were coming to San Francisco today to return Leslie (Mad Dog) Irvin, velvet-voiced slayer of six who was captured quietly in a pawn shop on Market Street yesterday.

Irvin, 31-year-old Evansville pipe insulator sought throughout the nation, was picked up when he tried to unload two diamond rings he admitted took from a home at Redondo Beach, near Los Angeles. "I wasn't too surprised," he said in an interview. "I've been expecting to get picked up for quite a while."

His arrest was coincidental. Inspectors John O'Keefe and Leo Ferragiaro dropped in to the Market at Third Street pawnshop routinely. Said O'Keefe: "He acted suspiciously, as if he didn't belong to the diamond."

Irvin, who was unmarried, produced identification of Victor Davis of Los Angeles, pianist with Tex Williams' Western orchestra. He spent one night, Jan. 28, at Davis' apartment after thumping a ride with the pianist.

Irvin had hitchhiked from Princeton, Ind., where he escaped Jan. 18 from the Gibson County Jail. Irvin was convicted Dec. 20 of fatally shooting W. Wesley Kerr, Evansville filling station attendant. He was charged also with slaying five others: Mrs. Mary Holland; Mrs. Wilhelmina Saller, in her country home near Solitude, Ind.; and three members of the Goebel Duncan farm family, near Henderson, Ky.

He was awaiting transfer to Michigan City, Ind., for execution June 12. Arrested here, Irvin was taken to the Hall of Justice and booked simply "en route to Los Angeles," a holding charge.

"After we told him we had talked to Victor Davis, he said, 'You want to know who I really am?' Then he said he was Leslie Irvin and wanted in Indiana for killing six people," O'Keefe said. "I wouldn't hurt anybody," Irvin said. "All the way out here I got along fine with people and they were very nice. I was recognized twice that I'm sure of, once by a motorist outside Springfield, Mo., and by a truck driver at Cozad, that's in Nebraska. But I knew he was calling police so I left, in a hurry."

Pickup Truck Hits Parked Auto

One man was injured as the result of a pickup truck hitting a parked vehicle in the 1600 block on Oregon Avenue, Klamath Falls police reported today.

The injured man was Clayton Larson, 1615 Oregon Avenue, who was sitting in the parked vehicle. He was X-rayed this morning in an effort to detect possible internal injuries, police reported.

The driver of the pickup, Claude Butler of Chilcoquin, pleaded guilty in police court this morning on charges of drunk driving and driving without an operators license. Judge Frank Blackmer deferred judgment and set the bail on each count at \$100.

The accident occurred at about 3 p.m. yesterday, police said.

U.S., Britain Begin Work On War Curb

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States, Britain and France were said today to be working against a March 1 deadline to develop deterrents to renewed fighting in Palestine.

The focal point of Western concern, officials said, is an area in a demilitarized zone between Syria and Israel on the Jordan River. The spot, on the Israeli side of the river, is called Jar Bnat Yacov.

An Israeli canal at that point is separated from the Jordan River waters by a few hundred feet of unexcavated earth.

Israeli officials have maintained they have a right to enter the demilitarized zone, finish the excavation and tap the Jordan waters for use in the canal. Syria has told the United States it fears a military incident if the Israelis try to do so.

Officials here speak of March 1 as a kind of deadline because after that time, they say, the weather would be favorable for whatever operations Israel might undertake.

The full resources of American and British diplomacy are being used to try to dissuade Israel from any move which would set off a clash with Syria. Such a clash might bring Egypt in on the side of Syria.

President Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Eden last week directed a new study of steps which might be taken to prevent an outbreak of open warfare in Palestine. British American and French officials started the study here Wednesday.

At the Wednesday meeting, it is understood, the United States and Britain advanced several suggestions if fighting occurs. They include an immediate appeal to the United Nations to order the fighting to stop. Sanctions to cut off money from the outside, an economic embargo to shut off supplies, and a naval blockade.

U.S. and British officials are seeking quick French agreement to such measures because they would like to confront Israel and the Arab states with their decisions before the potential crisis at Jar Bnat Yacov has a chance to develop.

Death Takes R. G. Pickett

MALIN—Richard Garfield Pickett, 71, a resident of Klamath County for 45 years, died shortly before noon February 9 at Hillside Hospital. He had been in failing health for the last two years. Mr. Pickett, a native of Gilico, California, was born October 17, 1882.

He was the son of Charles and Carrie Pickett who came to this country in 1891 to settle first in Poe Valley and later four miles north of Malin, where Mr. Pickett resided on the home ranch until his last illness.

Mr. Pickett was identified with the early development of agriculture in the Basin before the settlement of the town of Malin. He was a long-time member of the Moose Lodge at Merrill.

Survivors include his widow Mrs. Muri Pickett, Malin; two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Childers and Mrs. Bess Kent, both of San Francisco; a brother, Ben Pickett, Malin; two stepdaughters, Mrs. JoAnn Shewmaker, Klamath Falls and Patricia Patrick, Malin; also two stepsons, Kenneth Patrick, Morris, New York and Jimmie Patrick, Umatilla.

Funeral services will be held Monday, February 13, 1 p.m. from the chapel of Ward's Klamath Funeral Home. Final rites and interment will be in the Hillside Cemetery, Poe Valley. The Rev. Dale Hewitt, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Klamath Falls, will officiate.
