Schmidt Taking Look-See

SEATTLE (AP) — Like a pot of cooling mulligan stew, the University of Washington football cauldron bubbled a little under the surface Saturday as Pacific Coast Conference Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt "looked-see" the situation.

The Internal Revenue Bureau expressed interest in the money received by athletes from the university grant-in-aid program of a much-discussed "downside fund."

Roscoe C. (Torchy) Torrance, administrator of the "downside fund," was preparing to tell his side of the story in a television and radio talk at 6:30 p.m. (ST) Sunday. The Times said Friday that athletes were given money from the fund in addition to the grant-in-aid "salaries" permitted by the conference.

HUNTING

And the university was hunting a coach to succeed Johnny (Cowboy) Cherberg, deposed, and an athletic director to replace Harvey Cassill, resigned. The stew began boiling in late November when Cherberg's football players revolted. He was fired in January; Cassill quit this week.

Commissioner Schmidt happened by just after the Cassill resignation, Schmidt said the visit was routine, but added it was his job to look into all matters of interest to the conference. He held a meeting with Cherberg's assistant coaches but no word leaked out as to what transpired.

Schmidt indicated there would be no conference action until the regular meeting in late May—if any is taken.

William E. Frank, the district director of the Internal Revenue Bureau, warned the football players that money from the grant-in-aid program or the "downside fund" must be reported as income in tax returns.

PERMITTED

The fund, operated by Washington alumni, is legal under conference rules up to a point. Alumni are permitted to pay transportation costs, including food and lodging, of prospective athletes on visits to the campus. Payment of salaries of bonuses from such a fund is banned. Torrance has said the fund was tapped for "transportation, entertainment and expenses" of the prospects.

University Vice President H. P. (Dick) Everest has been silent on the likely candidates for the two vacant jobs. Joe Kuharich, coach of the Washington Redskins professional football team, is generally believed to be the No. 1 coaching choice.

Two men have said they were interested in the post of athletic director. One is William Henry Harrison (Tip) Dye, Washington's basketball coach. The other is Bert Rose, publicly director for the professional Los Angeles Rams and a former assistant to Cassill.

Goofy Gomez Banquet Guest

SEATTLE (AP) — Vernon (Goofy) Gomez will provide the chief chatter Monday night at the annual midwinter banquet of the Puget Sound Sportswriters and Sports-casters Assn. in the Olympic hotel.

Banquet committee reports the affair is a 500-seat sellout at \$7.50 per head. Association members get in at the rate of \$5. The event this year will have a distinct baseball tinge, with a couple of new Pacific Coast League managers on tap along with Gomez, the former southpaw pitcher and talking star of the New York Yankees.

One is Luke Sewell, who succeeds Freddie Hutchinson as top man in the Seattle Rainiers dugout, and Leroy O'Doul, who is a "new" manager only because his Vancouver team is a new entry in the loop. A high spot of the annual event is the selection of recipient of the Charles E. Sullivan award, given each year to some person who has contributed to the development of sports in the Pacific Northwest over a period of years.

D'Olivo Top Scorer For Losing Fresh '5'

EUGENE (AP) — Gary Goble, 6-3 freshman from Toulon Lake, Wash., led the Oregon State Beavers to their fifth straight win of the basketball season, a 60-56 decision over the Oregon Frogs.

Goble scored 18 points. The Beavers trailed by 10 points midway through the final period, but put on a rally that carried them to the win. Center Dave D'Olivo of Klamath Falls led the Frogs with 17.

The Pelican grapplers invaded Corvallis High Saturday morning, and swept their hosts' mats clean in registering a decisive 64-10 victory. But the Whiteblades were in hostile territory, when they engaged Oregon State College's rugged Rooks Saturday evening in preliminary action to the OSC-UCLA variety competition, losing 32-15.

Jim Brown grabbed five points for Simons' crew by pinning Rook Clyde Zumwalt in 1:35 of the first round. Bernard Hardman contributed three more in decisioning Dick Magnus. Richard Berg, KOHS, drew with Larry Wright.

Respects Paid To 'Mr. Mack'

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Connie Mack was buried Saturday leaving behind him a personal baseball history which never will be forgotten.

"Mr. Baseball" was laid to rest this cold, rain-swept day in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery not too far from the ball park where he and his teams thrilled baseball fans of two generations.

The grave was part of the Mack family plot. His immediate family, the widow, four daughters and three sons, stood with heads bowed as the coffin was lowered into place.

Baseball dignitaries, notable political figures, friends and just plain fans of this great baseball personality joined the bereaved family in paying last respects.

GENIUS

While his feat of guiding the Philadelphia Athletics to nine American League pennants and five World Championships will remain as tangible evidence of his genius as a baseball man, his associates and former players will remember him more for his kindness, charity, consideration, patience and tolerance.

This grand old man of baseball, who died Wednesday at the age of 93, was laid to rest in the gray, stone Roman Catholic edifice which he attended during a major portion of his adult life—St. Bridget's in northwest Philadelphia.

His faith in the resurrection and the life, "I am the resurrection and the life," he said, "who believes in Me, even if he dies, shall live."

Outside in the rain, standing under umbrellas and peering through the gloom of this dreary winter day, a throng of people bore testament to that gospel. Connie Mack, born Cornelius McGillicuddy 93 years ago, still lived in full measure in the hearts of baseball lovers all over the world.

Honorary pallbearers were led by Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick and National League President Warren Giles. Others were: Frank Lane, St. Louis Cardinals; George Sisler, Pittsburgh Pirates; John Ogden, Milwaukee Braves; George E. Van Brocklin was hampered by an injured right hand in the 1955 season but still led the Rams to the Western Division title of the National Football League. He completed 53 per cent of his 272 passes, including eight touchdown passes, and gained 2,242 yards.

Also signing 1956 contracts were offensive end Bob Boyd and defensive end Andy Robustelli. Boyd missed most of the team's late season action because of an injured knee. He recently underwent surgery for the knee and now is reported in top shape for next season.

USC Runs Wild Over Cougar '5'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Southern California's Trojans made it two in a row over the Washington State basketball team with an 85-54 victory Saturday in a Pacific Coast Conference game.

The win kept the Trojans in second place behind UCLA in the PCC race. It was their eighth win in 10 conference games.

The visiting Cougars were thoroughly outmanned and outclassed after the first few minutes. Washington State scored the first four points, then collapsed as the Trojans tallied 16 without a break. At halftime Trojans had taken a commanding 47-24 lead.

Southern Cal hit for 46 per cent of its shots in the first half but cooled off after intermission. The Trojans, however, wound up making 38 per cent of their floor shots to 39 per cent for the Cougars.

Forward Jack Dunne was high-point for the Trojans with 15. Larry Beck, Cougar forward, led his mates again with 14.

Washington State now has a 1-7 record in conference play. The Trojans captured the opener of the two-game series Friday night, 75-55.

Troj's top five played less than half the game as Coach Forrest Twogood followed Friday's procedure of clearing the bench and letting the reserves do most of the work. USC didn't do too badly when confronted with USC's second and third stringers.

The Cougars were in the game only briefly. Guard Dick Rapp pumped in a jump shot with the game only five seconds old. Fouled after the shot, Rapp rolled in two foul shots and WSC was ahead, 4-0. However, Trojan Captain Tony Psaltis quickly bucketed two to tie the count and stringbean Jack Lovrich added two more to make it 8-4. The Trojans remained in front from then on.

Four Trojans scored in double figures. Besides Dunne, with 15, Lovrich, Ken Pearson and guard Danny Rogers each had 11.

As in Friday's walkaway, the husky Trojans controlled the backboards with ease.

Competition Nothing New To NY's Collins

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Always a best man, never a groom. That's the baseball destiny — and not an unhappy one — of Joseph Edward Collins of the Yankees.

Every spring Collins is advertised as just one of many candidates for the first base job, which has had about as many incumbents as the French premiership since Lou Gehrig left in 1939. Every September, however, Col-

lins stand out as the Bombers' first sacker.

But as the pennant season unfolds, Collins is platooned, occasionally drafted for right field, now and then commandeered as a pinch hitter, and always sure to deliver a "best-five - got" job.

On March 1, when Collins steps onto the field at the Yankees' St. Petersburg, Fla., training camp, he will find Bill Skowron, Eddie Robinson and a few kids from the farm circuit in the first base area.

Joe will laugh and head for the outfield where he'll run hard and fast. "When Casey wants me for first base he will know where to find me," Joe will explain, as he always does.

Fast, plodding, being moved around and then yanked for left-handed pitchers hurt Joe?

"If you mean," he says, "have I any resentment over such moves, the answer is a big no. Maybe the platooning will make me last longer."

"One thing I do know. I've got to pull myself out of that .334 average the pitchers hung on me last season. Just imagine, I went .079 against Kansas City of all clubs. I had three hits in 38 times at bat. I dropped to .203 for the last month."

"I did pick myself off the floor in the World Series with two homers off Don Newcombe. I used to hit him pretty well when I was with Newark and he was Montreal. "When I'm going well, I get the feeling I'm doing something wrong at the plate," he says. "I cannot analyze myself. Last season I was a low ball hitter. In 1954 I was a high baller, in 1953 low. This year I may be high again. But no .334. I couldn't take that again."

"The big secret of hitting well, Yogi Berra says, is not to think. Maybe I ought to try that."

"I came up the hard way," Joe says, "no bonuses. I always have been involved in contests with a lot of rivals. At Butler, Pa., there were only nine first basemen. Finally it came down to Ike Bell and Collins, then to Collins."

"From then until I came to the Yankee Stadium in 1950, it was the same. But Casey used me in 106 games in 1950. I had arrived. Or at least I figured I had."

"Any way you look at it, I have played more games at first base than any other Yankee except Lou Gehrig."
