International Farm Youth Delegate To Visit Klamath

A full calendar of public appearances has been arranged for Donna Lingle of Doring, near Oresham, who was a delegate last year at the International Farm Youth Exchange program sponsored by the National 4-H Club Foundation and the Cooperative Extension Service.

Miss Lingle, who returned to Oregon last November after spend-

ing six months with farm families in Greece, will discuss her experiences and show slides taken during the trip.

A Klamath Falls youth, Tom Zinn, a student at Oregon State College, will be a delegate this year. He is to spend about six months in the Middle East.

Miss Lingle, scheduled to arrive in Klamath Falls this afternoon by bus, will speak at a total of 14 meetings before returning home Thursday.

At 7 p.m. today, she will speak at a meeting of the Mt. Laki Community Church Christian Endeavor.

On Monday, she will speak at 9 a.m. at the Klamath Elementary School; at 10:30 a.m. at Shasta Elementary School; at 1:30 p.m. at Bly High School, and at 7:30 p.m. at a 4-H Leader's meeting at St. Barnabas Church in Langell Valley.

On Tuesday, she will speak at 9 a.m. at Allamont Junior High;

at 10:30 a.m. at Fairhaven Elementary School; at noon at the Exchange Club at the Winema Hotel; at 1:45 p.m. at a meeting of the County Farm Bureau Women at the Winema Hotel, and in the evening at the Fairhaven Parent and Patron meeting.

On Wednesday, she will speak at 11 a.m. at Merrill High School; at noon at the Tulelake Rotary Club; at 2 p.m. at the Malin elementary school, and at 6:30 p.m. at a meeting of the Toketee Lions Club at the Winema Hotel.

The IFYE program for rural young people is a project intended to aid in the establishment of international understanding. Young people from the United States are given expense-paid trips to various foreign countries, where they live and work with farm families for a period of six months.

Farm youth from foreign countries visit American farm families on a similar basis.

One of the features of the program is the reports which the delegates are required to make to their home lands. These reports, according to program sponsors, force the delegates to analyze the situation he finds at the farm he is visiting.

Although several governmental agencies are involved in the program, no government money is used to pay the expenses of delegates. All the money is from contributions by service groups, individuals and other organizations.

Fluoridation Subject Of Dental Study

(Editors Note: This is the last in a series of six articles on dental health being presented in cooperation with the Klamath County Dental Society as part of the 1956 observance of National Children's Dental Health Week, February 5-11.)

Fluoridation of water is quietly revolutionizing the dental health outlook for today's children.

In 1945, after some 15 years of extensive investigations, the first controlled fluoridation project was started in Grand Rapids, Michigan. In 1955, at ceremonies marking the tenth anniversary of the program, the results were enthusiastically called "almost too marvelous to describe."

In Grand Rapids, in Newburgh, N.Y., and in Brantford, Ontario, all of which have passed the 10-year mark in fluoridation, the reports have been the same: children who drink fluoridated water while their teeth are forming have only about one-third as much tooth decay as children who drink fluoride-deficient water.

And there are absolutely no ill effects.

At Newburgh, extensive physical examinations of the children were made by pediatricians. In addition to the usual pediatric examinations there were X-ray studies of the hands, forearms and knees, and blood and urine analyses. Eye and ear tests were also given to groups of the children.

The results of drinking fluoridated water were found to be wholly beneficial.

An interesting sidelight on the Newburgh report was the finding that fluoridation was especially effective in preventing dental decay on the side surfaces of the teeth where it is particularly difficult to detect and correct.

Since 1945, more than 1,100 cities and towns have adopted fluoridation as a necessary public health measure. From Anchorage, Alaska, to Miami, and from Philadelphia to San Francisco, it has become a routine water department operation.

In every instance where results have been measured, it has been pronounced effective and in no case has any harmful effect been reported.

In a review of the entire program, Dr. A. P. Black, of Gainesville, Fla., head of the department of chemistry at the University of Florida, commented:
