

K.F. LIBRARY CLUB PLANS GALA BENEFIT BRIDGE TEA

Women of the Klamath Basin will play cards and drink tea Saturday afternoon, February 25, in the Pine Grove Room at the Willard Hotel. They'll greet friends, look each other over—perhaps gossip a little bit—and have a lot of fun. But these big-hearted gals aren't as frivolous as they may sound.

All the time they're attending this annual charity event sponsored by the Women's Library Club, they're keenly aware of the purpose for which the gala affair is held. It's for the Children's Case Benefit fund, by means of which needy children of this area—not eligible for aid through the welfare commission—get infected tonsils removed.

Rheumatic fever, teen-age psychosis, failure in school are only a few of the serious situations which may be prevented by a tonsillectomy at the proper time. The library club takes care of children—be they elementary school or high school age, when they're eligible. All candidates are screened by county health officer, school and home nurses working with teachers and local physicians, until physical and economic need is determined.

Mrs. A. Ivan Thompson is chairman this year of the Children's Case Benefit fund for the Women's Library Club. This is the seventh consecutive year that the benefit has helped local children, she stated. Prior to this time, the

club contributed to Doernbecher Hospital in Portland.

The first benefit bridge tea held by the Library Club was an event of January 30, 1936, in the club rooms of the City Library. Since then it has been an annual affair. Mrs. Ray W. Oldenburg helped set up the Children's Case Benefit program, and served as Library Club chairman for the fund for a number of years. Past chairmen, who served for two years each, are Mrs. Marvin Nersteth and Mrs. George H. Adler. Dr. Neil Black also gave valuable assistance to the club in organizing the program and has continued in an advisory capacity over the past seven years.

Mrs. Walter Brown was club president in 1947-48 when the local tonsillectomy program was established and set in on organizational meetings and contributed valuable assistance.

Mrs. Chester J. Stonecypher, Tulelake, Mrs. Harry Glesin and Mrs. James Thornton are co-chairmen of this year's bridge-benefit tea, working with Mrs. Merton Ferebee, president of the club. Any kind of cards, as well as bridge, will be played at the party which is scheduled to begin promptly at 1 p.m. As in years past women will bring their own playing cards and card table covers.

Mrs. Robert Egge, 2-0708, and Mrs. Glesin, 2-1392, are taking reservations for the event. After an hour of cards, a program will precede the tea which will be served at 3:30.
