Boston Pops KF Program Announced

For its first Klamath Falls performance Wednesday evening, the Boston Pops Tour Orchestra has arranged a program of music carefully calculated to appeal to nearly every taste. Top open the program, the orchestra, directed by Harry John Brown, assistant conductor, will play Tchaikovsky's Polonaise from "Eugene Onegin." Overture to "The Barber of Seville" by Rossini, Fantasia on Greenleaves, by Vaughan Williams and the Suite from the Ballet "Graduation Ball" by Stravinsky.

Ruth Slenczynska (pronounced Slen-chin-ska), piano soloist, will play Mendelssohn's Concerto for Piano and Orchestra No. 1 in G minor, Opus 25, and Kukus' The Sorcerer's Apprentice following intermission.

In the third grouping, the orchestra has programmed "Popsgrams" arranged by Mason, which includes "Mister Sandman," "Melody of Love," "The Naughty Lady of Shady Lane," "Three Coins in the Fountain" and "Tweddle-Dee." The final numbers will be "On the Trail" from the "Grand Canyon Suite" by Grofe and "Look Sharp — Be Sharp" by Merrick Bennett.

Fringe Benefits Appeal Told In Air Force Program

The old adage "Little Things Mean a Lot" may actually explain the appeal of the so-called "Fringe Benefits" available to Klamath Basin veterans under the Air Force's Prior Service Program, according to T-Sgt. Don Adams, local Air Force Recruiter-Salesman.

Even though the opportunity for higher pay, a base of choice, and a former grade and skill may ordinarily be considered the "big things" in the Prior Service Program, Sergeant Adams said, "the fringe benefits of an Air Force career often mean even more to the veteran and his family."

In-service education and technical training opportunities are foremost in this group. Official Air Force policy encourages young men and women to acquire as much education as possible before enlisting; however, high school, college and technical-level schooling facilities around the world allow personnel in the Air Force to gain technical job experience and improve their formal education at the same time.

Fringe benefits particularly useful to married veterans and their families would include the commissary and base exchange privileges, as well as the free medical and dental care provided Air Force personnel.

Typical of the longer-range career benefits available to Klamath "vets" enlisting under this Air Force program are job security, free disability and life insurance, and retirement income.

"Fringe benefits are available regardless of the particular Air Force program in which an eligible man or woman enlists," Sergeant Adams said, "but veterans who enlist because of the 'big benefits' available under the Prior Service Program are able, nevertheless, to benefit from these features of Air Force service, which do mean a lot."

Klamath Basin prior servicemen interested in further information on their qualifications under the new program are urged to contact Sergeant Adams, at the post office building, local U.S. Air Force Recruiting Station in Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Mass Killer Blocks Move

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Leslie (Mad Dog) Irvin, Indiana mass murderer, who was captured in a pawnshop here, blocked efforts Friday to send him east to the electric chair with a demand to see his lawyers.

Irvin, condemned to death for one of six holiday murders in Indiana and Kentucky, refused to waive extradition and won a postponement until Tuesday.

The 31-year-old prisoner broke out of an "escape proof" jail in Princeton, Ind., on Jan. 19 and eluded police in ten states. He was finally picked up by two San Francisco patrolmen Thursday when he tried to pawn two rings stolen in a Los Angeles robbery.

The usually mild, almost passive Irvin changed sharply when he was asked to waive extradition. "No," he snapped, "not until I see my lawyers."

He said his lawyers were James Lopp and Theodore Lockyear of Evansville, Ind. Lockyear, reached in Evansville, said there was little possibility of him traveling to California to visit Irvin.

"I don't know where the money would come from," Lockyear said. Municipal Judge James J. Welsh continued Irvin's arraignment until Tuesday to permit him to consult with counsel.

Guardians Ruled For Minor Members Of Klamath Tribe

Only guardians appointed under state law will be entitled to receive the property of enrolled members of the Klamath Indian Tribe of Oregon who are minors under the laws of the state where they reside or otherwise incompetent to manage their own affairs.

The secretary's statement was made to clarify the department's position on one important phase of the readjustment program which is now being carried out at the Klamath Indian Reservation.
