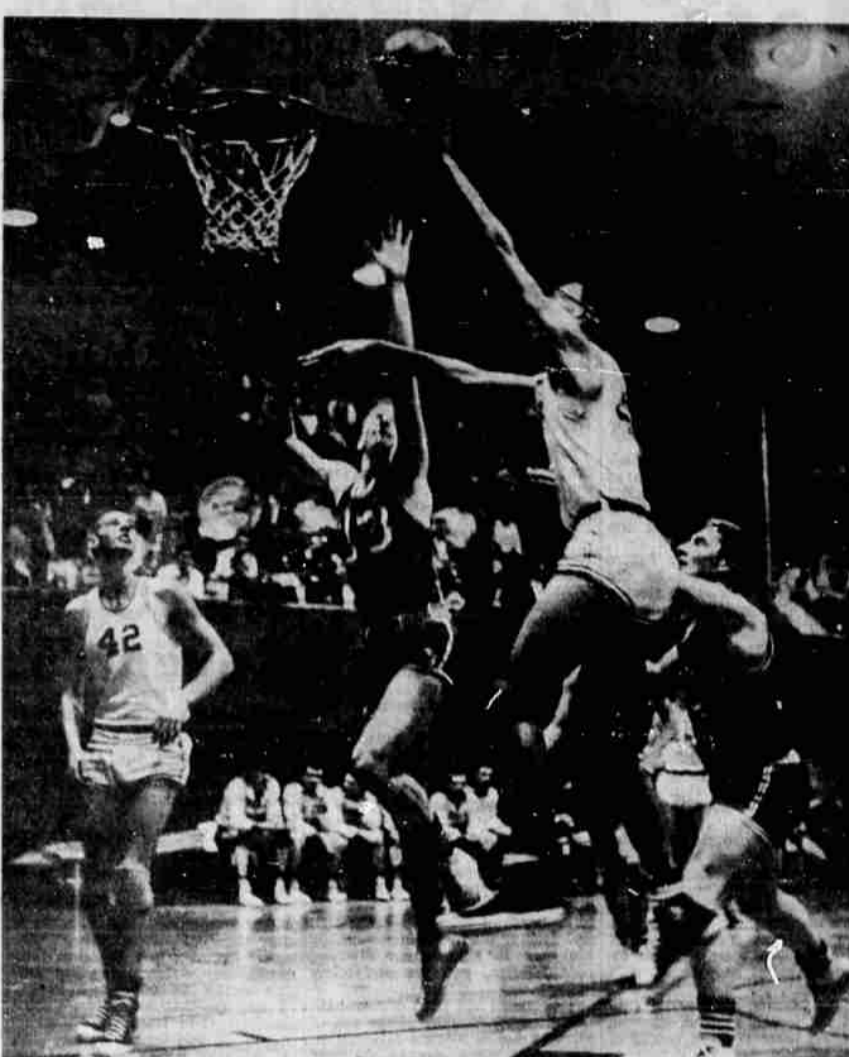

Webfoot '5' Loses; Bears Rap Vandals

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — California tightened its defense in the second half Saturday night to sweep a 2-game Pacific Coast Conference series against Idaho with a 67-58 victory.

The Bears had almost the same margin as Friday night, when they won 54-44, but used a different pattern for victory.

Unlike the first game when they were cold from the floor, Idaho hit more than half its field goal shots in the first half and it was California that had to stay in the game through free throws. The Bears hit 17 of 19 gift tosses in the first half to get a 33-35 tie at intermission.

The visitors moved quickly in front in the second half, while Idaho went 3-11 minutes early in the period without a point.

The California regulars put the pressure on the less experienced Vandals and began connecting on more of their own floor shots.

Idaho's Jay Buhler topped all scorers with 22.

Owls Divide OCC Series With EOC

Eastern Oregon College staved off a last two-minute desperation burst by Oregon Tech Saturday night, and walked off with a 70-67 triumph, which evened the week-end series between the two Oregon Collegiate Conference teams. OTI won 74-55 Friday night.

Paced by the scoring of Ken Westenskow, the Mountaineers broke open a tight ball game midway in the second period, and before the Owls deiced, the visitors had stowed away a 68-55 lead with but two and one-half minutes remaining. The Owls roared back and came to within three points of erasing the 13-point deficit as the game ended.

OTI had the lead briefly at the opening of the game, when Johnny Foster hit from the side. Eastern Oregon took over at 5-4 with Lowell Kolbaba's free throw. The Owls moved into the lead again at 11-9 on McCutcheon's two-pointer.

Coch Wally Palmberg's crew got the lead back with about seven minutes to go in the first frame as Foster caused an under-and-up to put the Mile High Campus gurg out in front at 23-22.

The biggest OTI edge came with exactly five minutes to go, when Foster's two free throws gave the Owls a 31-28 lead. A minute later, Jerry Fasten's follow of Foster's miss made the Owls' lead 33-26.

Then in the last few minutes the lead exchanged five times with Reinking's field goal in the last seconds giving the Mountaineers a 38-37 lead at the intermission.

While it was Kolbaba's scoring that kept EOC in the ball game in the first half, the "cruncher" role was played by Westenskow, who exploded midway in the second frame to virtually sew up the ball game. He started with a field goal from high pivot, followed with three free throws, then after Foster's jump shot, came on with a sweater from the right side. That made it 33-47.

The Owls tried to move back in the game, as Foster scored a tip-in and Paul Hatcher canned a jump, but it was evident Palmberg's boys were running out of gas.

Westenskow bagged a free throw to tenkrow and Reinking scored, and make it 69-53. Reinking added another field goal, as he tipped in Schadewitz's missed second free throw.

With 5:36 remaining in the half, the Mountaineers moved into a semi-final and drew costly fouls, as the Owls went after the ball. It was double hits from the free throw line by Schadewitz, and Westenskow that hoisted the visitors' bulge to 68-55, with 2:36 minutes to go.

With OTI working out of the same type of zone defense that slowed down Portland State and stopped Southern Oregon, Tech looked as if they were out to walk away from their highly favored foes like USF leaves some of its opponents. Ore Tech ramblod to a 9-0 lead before Ken Westenskow tallied a lone free throw with 12:20 remaining, giving Eastern Oregon its first point of the night. Foster's defensive board rebounding plus the fact that EOC was unable to buy a basket, played a vital role in Tech's initial jump on the La Grande collegians.

The first field goal for the Mounties came with 10:55 remaining in the half as Ted Schadewitz finally found his mark with a long one-handed pusher to make the score stand 12-4. Tech maintained their lead through the remaining minutes of the period to hold a 29-16 halftime margin. Thanks to an unbelievable desperation shot by Ted Fischer.

Fischer took an out-of-bounds pass from Bobby Whitman as the final seconds ticked off the scoreboard clock, added a few quick dribbles then fired a "hope-and-pray" shot that arched towards the OTI basket as the horn sounded. The ball bounced off the backboard and through the hoop, some 57 to 60 feet away from the spot Fischer had fired.

Eastern Oregon recovered from Tech's long-range attack in the opening moments of the last half to take their first lead of the night. Lowell Kolbaba tossed in two free throws to give EOC a 52-31 lead. Whitman came back for Tech with a field goal, only to have Kolbaba lay one in from underneath the boards to shoot the Mounties back in the lead, 34-32.

With 15:00 left in the game, Whitman countered with a driving lay-up through the Eastern Oregon defense, and on the same play was awarded a free toss after being fouled by Westenskow, his fourth of the night. The play-making Owl hit from the charity line to give Tech a 36-34 lead, one that was never headed. The closest the Mounties could come in the action to follow was this two-point spread.

Bylines from the SIDELINES

DURING THE PAST SEVERAL months, death has claimed some of the brightest names in baseball, including the one and only Cornelius McGillicuddy, otherwise and probably better known as Connie Mack. The death of Mack last Wednesday afternoon shook the sports world from one end to the other, as old father time caught up with the one person who has done the most to further our national pastime.

From the time he first took up a bat as a player, until he sold the Kansas City Athletics, Mack had one byword . . . BASEBALL. And very few men in the sport have done as much to aid the game as "Mr. Mack", a man of many colorful and human stories.

Everyone knew that time had just about run out on Connie, but even though they knew it was coming, it still rocked the North, East, South and West. His passing added to the list of former greats, who had preceded him to the "happy hunting grounds". Names such as Honus Wagner, Clark Griffith, Bill Evans and Cy Young all were erased since the end of the 1955 World Series. In fact, Mack's death came just two months and one day after Wagner passed away. But Mack, who's real name was shortened to fit in a newspaper boxscore, never knew that these close friendships had been parted by time.

The tall thin "Mr. Baseball", still lays claim to the record of managing nine pennant winners in American League play, a mark that will probably stand for some time to come, if not ever. These nine pennants came during the 50 consecutive years he managed the A's, which is another mark that is not expected to be bettered.

Although many people say that a fall from his bed several months ago brought on his death, we and many others think that the selling of the A's to Kansas City gave Connie Mack a broken heart, one that never healed. When the Mack Athletics left the city of brotherly love, so went his spirits and reason for living.

As we mentioned above, Connie Mack is probably the author of thousands upon thousands of colorful stories about the diamond, but one especially will live forever with the name "Connie Mack", that of breaking up two world championship teams. In 1914 after winning four titles in five tries, and in 1931, with three consecutive American League triumphs, the man behind the A's broke up two great baseball teams by trades and sales. God only knows what fortunes, spiritually and financially, that the Philadelphia Athletics would have grown to had Mack refrained from breaking up these two clubs.

The 1931 American League win was the last for Connie Mack, and the last for the Philadelphia Athletics. Now a Kansas City, the A's will be hard pressed to capture another pennant unless their fortunes take a quick change to the good. Without Mack, the A's don't seem to be the A's, and American League baseball won't seem the same without the gray hairs of Cornelius McGillicuddy.

OREGON TECH'S Ted Fischer, John Foster and John McCutcheon have grown an eye for the basket. This trio of deadeyes are rolling along at a good clip from the (Bylines Continued On Page 11)

GP Stymies Pels In Tourney Chance

If the Klamath Union High School Pelicans are going to play in the 1955-56 State High School Basketball Tournament next month, they will have to wait until next weekend, at least, before gaining an official invitation.

Last night at Pelican Court, the Whitebirds had their opportunity to make things official and to sew up the second half allotted to this district for the tourney, but a hard-fighting band of Cavemen from Grants Pass extended the Pels' waiting period by capturing a spine-tingling 47-46 victory. It was a game that ended with blood pressure rising to new "highs", when the Cavemen staged a brilliant last period rally to "pull" the game out of the fire.

The win for the Cavemen gives the Grants Pass quintet added life in the race for the District 6-A-1 and Southern Oregon Conference crown and the same award which the Pels are seeking—a berth in the state playoffs. Klamath clinched at least a tie for second place in the final league standings, and need only one more win of their own, or a loss by Grants Pass to assure themselves of the spot in the 16-team tournament at Eugene.

Trailing four points going into the final eight-minute period, Grants Pass exploded with a soaring offensive burst in the opening minutes of the quarter to overtake the Pels, 29-27, on a jump shot by Alan Drews and another basket by Larry Henderson with about six minutes left in the game. This lead was never lost as the Cavemen went into a stall to force the Whitebirds from their zone defense.

Drews added another field goal from the right-hand corner to shoot Grants Pass to the lead, 41-37. Chuck Weller was fouled, and hit one of his two shots, and the Dyeys dumped in two more from the charity line to give Grants Pass a seven-point bulge, 37-44.

Butch Kimpton was awarded a free throw — one and one — but missed his shot, only to have Glenn Moore tip in the free ball to cut the lead back to five points, 42-39. Moore contributed another free toss, and Kimpton dumped in a tip-in basket to draw the teams into a 44-42 difference.

With 1:15 remaining in the game, Taucher hit from the field to tie the game, but Tom Bernet completed for one of two free throws with 1:08 left to give Grants Pass a 49-44 lead, as the pressure began to mount. Moore knotted the count at 45-44 with a single gifter with 50 seconds showing on the clock. With only six seconds left, Drews hooked in a right-hander from the side of the basket to
