California Prison Fund Total Gains

SACRAMENTO (UP)—The new state budget released today proposes to spend \$38,727,101 to operate state prisons in the next fiscal year.

The amount requested by the Department of Finance is 5.4 per cent above current expenditures. The department asked the Legislature to authorize 187 new positions. It estimated the adult prison population in the 1956-57 fiscal year at 15,893 inmates, an increase of 2.9 per cent.

Parolees in the same period will total 7235, an increase of 9.8 per cent, the department estimated. The amount budgeted for the various penal institutions, per cent of increase over 1955-56, total number of inmates expected and number of prison employees includes: Medical Facility, Vacaville, \$2,415,727, up 9.8 per cent; 1350 inmates, 226 positions.

Polson, \$3,199,438, up 5.9 per cent; 2510 inmates, 395 positions. San Quentin, \$5,149,978, up 5.9 per cent; 3450 inmates, 610 employees, 23 new positions requested. The Department of Finance estimated a decline of 444 in the population at San Quentin.

Soledad, \$3,047,620, up 5.5 per cent; 2057 inmates, 375 positions. Deuel Vocational Institution, Tracy, \$2,574,894, up 5.2 per cent, 1200 inmates, 332 positions.

The Youth Authority budget was set at \$9,867,691, up 5.7 per cent or \$528,963. A population of 2430 was estimated for facilities in the 1956-57 fiscal year.

The proposed budget for various Youth Authority installations and per cent of increase over current expenditures included: Northern California Reception Center, Sacramento, \$162,791, up 3.2; Fricot Ranch, Calaveras County, \$484,426, up 9.2; up 6; Preston, \$1,791,307, up 4.1 per cent; Los Gullucos, Santa Rosa, \$719,126, up 12.5 per cent.

California's Mental Hospital Plight Grows

SACRAMENTO (UP)—The State Department of Mental Hygiene estimated today more than 42,000 persons will be confined in California mental institutions by mid-1957 and asked the Legislature to approve a record-breaking \$79,913,081 budget for the next fiscal year.

The budget request was submitted by the State Department of Finance to the Assembly Ways and Means Committee today. The mental hygiene budget is up 10.6 per cent over current expenditures or an increase of \$7,947,894.

Mental hygiene asked the legislators to hire 1,020 additional staffers to help care for the mentally ill at 14 different institutions.

The proposed budget for each institution and per cent of increase: Agnew, \$6,533,674, up 6.0. Atascadero, \$2,221,725, up 10.8. Camarillo, \$9,313,440, up 8.7. Dewitt, \$4,826,874, up 3.6. Mendocino, \$4,048,250, up 12.9. Metropolitan, \$4,457,303, up 22.8. Modesto, \$5,003,558, up 2.6. Napa, \$7,964,002, up 13.3. Patton, \$6,883,847, up 7.1. Stockton, \$7,401,546, up 7.4. Fairview, \$168,603 (new institution), Pacific, \$5,425,176, up 22.1. Porterville, \$5,383,012, up 22.6. Sonoma, \$6,091,453, up 7 per cent.

Mental hygiene asked for a 10.9 per cent increase in funds to run outpatient mental clinics in Los Angeles, San Diego, Fresno, Sacramento, Chico and Riverside.

Additional Salk Vaccine Here

PORTLAND (UP)—An additional 8,900 shots of Salk anti-polio vaccine have been allocated by the State Board of Health to Oregon, the State Public Health Service reported Saturday.

The vaccine, expected later this month, will increase the number of shots allotted to Oregon since last July 31 to 222,100.

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
