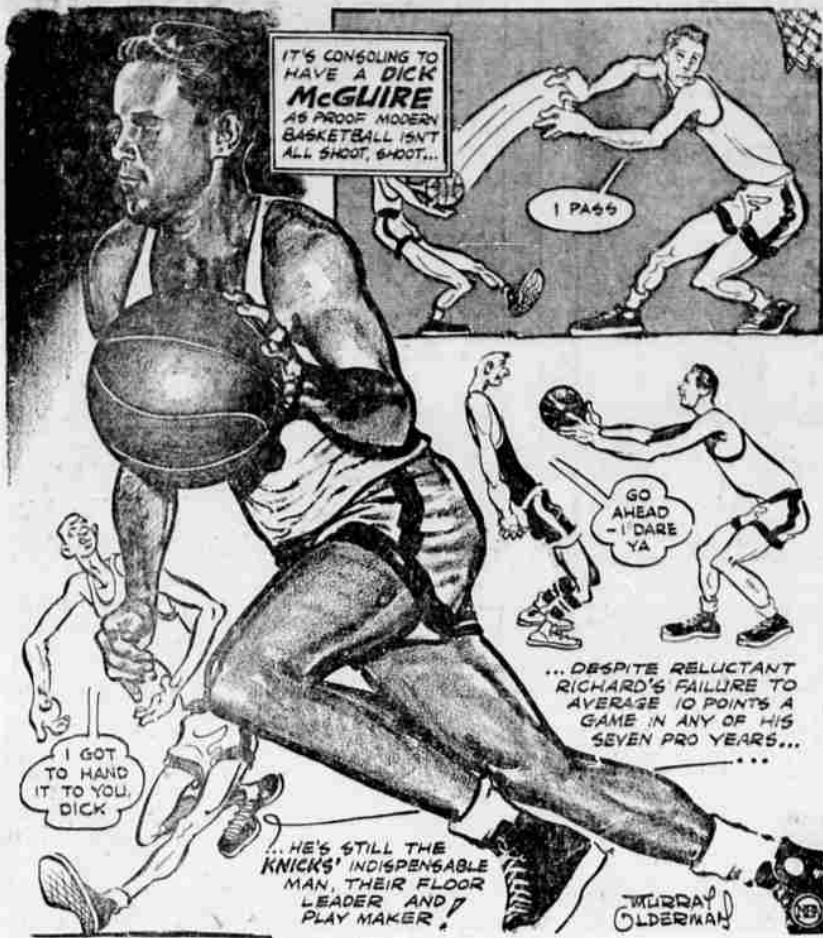

British Claim Moore Tied To Bout Pact

LONDON (U.P.)—"I've got a contract," cried promoter Jack Solomons Tuesday when told Archie Moore may refuse to defend his light heavyweight boxing crown in London next month unless he has an American referee.

Moore's statement, issued Monday night in the interview at San Diego, Calif., has "got me lost for words," Solomons said. Then he rattled off his own statement: "I have a contract that Moore will defend the title over here and it says the referee will be appointed by the (British) Boxing Board of Control."

"When our boys go over there, we don't ask for English referees," Moore, who is scheduled to defend his 175-pound crown against Trinidad's Yolande Pompey March 13, said Monday night. He was alarmed by a recent London fight in which English welterweight Peter Waterman was given a decision over former world champion Kid Gavilan. British boxing writers described the verdict as "scandalous."

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (U.P.)—Archie Moore today demanded an American referee when he defends his world light-heavyweight boxing title against Yolande Pompey in London March 13. "I want to put up the fight the way it stands now," Moore said, referring to a recent controversial decision handed Kid Gavilan in England. "I won't meet Pompey unless the third man in the ring is an American."

Moore said "with the English system of officiating the way it is, I just feel it would be too risky to put my title at stake."

Meanwhile, it was disclosed that Moore had signed for a non-title bout here Feb. 27 against Dave Whitlock, San Francisco heavy-weight, as a warm-up for the Pompey battle.

Russian Win Mixes Olympics

NEW YORK (U.P.)—Who'll it be—the United States or Russia for the team championship of the 1956 summer Olympics? That's the question most of the sports world is asking since Russia's resounding triumph in the winter games at Cortina, Italy, earlier this month. While the answer isn't going to come until Dec. 6, it's a question that doesn't concern Australia.

For that sports loving continent, imbued with intense national pride, is going all out to make the XVI Olympic at Melbourne, Nov. 22-Dec. 8, the most successful one since World War II. It doesn't care which country wins so long as the games surpass those in London in 1948 and those in Helsinki, Finland in 1952.

With the opening of the worldwide sports spectacle more than nine months away, Melbourne is further advanced in its planning and construction than either London or Helsinki was six months before these cities held the games.

The various sports venues are going to equal or surpass those at London and Helsinki, with one exception. Housing is going to be better for both the athletes and visitors. Food and other over-all accommodations are going to be superior, too.

OLD BUILDING
The one thing the athletes and fans may not like at Melbourne is the Glaciarium, where the basketball competition is going to be held. It is an old building, seats only 2,500 and while the court is up to Olympic specifications, the ceiling is low and is sure to result in complaints.

The sports venues—there are 36 in all—will be more concentrated at Melbourne than either London or Helsinki. The Melbourne cricket ground, the 120,000-seat main Olympic stadium, is only a 5-minute walk from the center of the city.

Already, a record entry of nations has been assured for the 1956 games. Of the 82 nations invited to compete, 67 have accepted—two less than the number which competed at Helsinki—and most of the 15 nations which have not been heard from are expected to accept.

NEW YORK (U.P.)—Zella Toppazzini of the Providence Reds was held to a single point last week but retained an 11-point lead over Dunc Fisher of the Jersey Bears today in the race for the American Hockey League's individual scoring crown.
