Two Klamath Falls boys, aged 12 and 13, arrested early this morning by city police, have admitted burglarizing the Klamath Falls Moose Hall, officers reported today.

Police said that in this case, they worked "backwards," getting the boys before the crime was reported. A patrol car picked them up at about 2:15 a.m. while they were hitch hiking out of the city on Kit Carson Way.

When questioned, they said they went on their way to Eugene to visit a relative of one of them. When police discovered that they had a relatively large sum of money, they reportedly admitted the burglary.

The boys had a total of \$53.25, some cigarettes, candy and gum, and a ring of keys they said belonged to the lodge, investigators said.

The boys reportedly told officers they entered the building while it was still open and hid until it closed. They said the money came from the bar.

Juvenile Officer Francis Mathews ordered them held for further investigation. Police said one of the boys had recently been released from the juvenile home.

Brush Burning Warning Given

MOUNT SHASTA—All persons burning trash, brush or other debris are cautioned by the U.S. Forest Service headquarters to be careful.

Although no burning permits are required until April 15, the forest service warns that it is against the law for anyone to willfully or knowingly allow a fire to burn uncontrolled.

People eager to burn winter accumulated debris are apt to overlook the fact that the weather has become dry and windy, the forest service observed.

A small brush fire in Dunsmuir on Sunday required control to insure safety to the surrounding area, the service reported. The vigilance of several Dunsmuir youngsters prevented serious damage, the forest service said.
