

French Okay Mollet Plans

PARIS (AP)—The French Cabinet endorsed Premier Guy Mollet's policies for Algeria today and authorized him to bring his proposals before the National Assembly this afternoon.

The Socialist Premier's plan was expected to hinge on his controversial proposal to set up a one-house Algerian legislature of both Moslems and French colonists as soon as possible. Mollet hopes this will produce Algerian leadership with which France can negotiate for an end to the 15 months of fighting between Moslem nationalists and French troops.

To quiet Algeria's French colonists who opposed such a proposal last week with riots and demonstrations, Mollet was reported planning to offer guarantees—as yet unspecified—against their being swamped. Algerian Moslems outnumber the French 8 to 1; at present each has its own legislative house with the French chamber dominant.

Presentation of Mollet's proposals was expected to furnish a respite from the filibustering and brawling in the Assembly by followers of anti-lax leader Pierre Poujade. They have brought the chamber to a virtual standstill for the past two weeks battling attempts to unseat 13 Poujadist deputies whose elections have been challenged.

Segregation Rule Defied

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Defiant segregation leaders declared today that "the people of Louisiana will not integrate" to comply with a federal court's ruling ordering desegregation in public schools.

State Sen. W. M. Rainach, segregation leader in the Legislature, criticized the three-man court which gave the ruling yesterday and the Orleans Parish (county) School Board said the next step would be to appeal the decision.

Rainach said the three judges "took an oath of office to uphold the constitution of the United States, not an oath to uphold the palpably unconstitutional decision of the U.S. Supreme Court justices."

The court tossed out as unconstitutional the segregation laws enacted by Louisiana to sidestep the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling against separate white and Negro public schools.

In the wake of Wednesday's decision, U.S. District Judge J. Skelly Wright ordered New Orleans to end racial segregation in its public schools "with all deliberate speed."

He was quick to point out, however, that this did not mean the mixing of classes would come "overnight or even in a year or more."

Wright directed the school board to integrate classes "after such time as may be necessary to make arrangements for admission of children to such schools on a radically non-discriminatory basis."

Rainach aimed his criticism at Wright and his two fellow jurists, all natives of Louisiana. Judge Wayne G. Borah of the 5th Circuit and U.S. Dist. Judge Herbert Christenberry shared in the ruling.

Wright cautioned that "the problem of changing a people's mores, particularly those with an emotional overlay, is not to be taken lightly."

After the U.S. Supreme Court decision in 1954 abolishing segregation in public schools, the Legislature passed a series of laws placing segregated schools under the state's inherent police powers.

The District court ruled that the laws were unconstitutional.

FIRE EXCHANGED

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The Defense Ministry said Chinese Nationalist units on Little Quemoy Island exchanged artillery fire with Communist forces at Amoy before dawn Wednesday. The announcement said the Reds fired 38 rounds. It added that Little Quemoy had been the target of Communist artillery daily since Sunday.

Westinghouse Strike Enters 123rd Day; Ending Remote

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The Westinghouse Electric Corp. strike entered its 123rd day today and an early settlement seemed remote after the firm's rejection of a public inquiry into the walkout.

Gov. George M. Leader of Pennsylvania, in cooperation with four other governors, had set up a two-man fact-finding board to study the strike which has idled 44,000 workers at 30 Westinghouse plants since Oct. 17.

Gwilym A. Price, Westinghouse board chairman and president, sent telegrams to the governors rejecting the plan.

"Westinghouse cannot delegate to outsiders . . . the right to determine the fundamental terms of the union agreement under which Westinghouse must live for some years," he said.

In Washington, the AFL-CIO International Union of Electrical Workers said Westinghouse should "abandon its futile attempts to adjust this dispute by million-dollar propaganda campaigns" and try to achieve settlement by presenting its case to the fact-finding board.

The IUE, which already has accepted the governors' proposal, charged Westinghouse management with a "campaign of lies, duplicity and misrepresentation". Gov. Leader, who previously said the probe would go on even without Westinghouse, had no immediate comment on Price's rejection.

Meanwhile, more violence at the firm's Sharon plant was reported. One auto was overturned and other cars were stoned yesterday. Some windows in the plant were broken. No arrests were made and no injuries were reported.

The union originally asked a 15-cent hourly increase under a two-year contract which expires this October. Westinghouse offered a five-year contract which it said would boost wages a minimum of 23 cents an hour during that period.

The IUE says it has since scaled down its demand to a 7-cent hourly boost for the first year of a proposed three-year contract. Under the old contract workers averaged \$2.10 an hour.

THIRTY-ONE DIE

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP)—Thirty-one persons died during Rio de Janeiro's hectic four-day pre-Lenten carnival and 3,884 were injured, police reported Wednesday. The death toll did not include 11 killed in auto accidents outside the city.

Nixon May Get GOP Nod

WASHINGTON (AP)—A cross-section sampling of Senate Republicans and Democrats showed today most of them think that if President Eisenhower runs again Vice President Nixon will be on the GOP ticket.

Eisenhower has indicated he will give his second-term decision around March 1. If he says then he is available, there is little doubt the vice presidential nominee named at the August convention will be the man he wants.

Sen. H. Alexander Smith (R-N.J.) said he believes Eisenhower will want Nixon to run with him despite what Smith termed "some opposition" within the party.

"I think most of the Republican opposition to Nixon is directed at him as a possible presidential candidate, if the President doesn't run again, rather than as a vice presidential nominee," Smith said.

Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont.) said he thinks there is little likelihood of any move by Eisenhower to shelve Nixon.

Sen. Bush (R-Gonn.) said in view of Eisenhower's complimentary remarks about Nixon he thinks the ticket will be the same as in 1952. Sen. Curtis (R-Neb.) agreed.

Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.), the 1952 Democratic vice presidential nominee, said he doesn't think Eisenhower is going to run again. But if he does, the Alabama senator predicted Nixon will be his running mate.

A novel suggestion for the 1956 GOP ticket came from Sen. Long (D-La.), who reiterated his contention of a year ago that Eisenhower will not run again.

He predicted in an interview with the New Orleans States that Chief Justice Earl Warren will be the presidential nominee and that Eisenhower will run for the vice presidency so that the GOP can "get the greatest possible use out of the Eisenhower name."

Knowland Filed In Primary

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP)—Minnesota Republicans may have the choice of two delegates states in the presidential primary March 20 after filing of the name of Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) yesterday, last day for entering the race.

John Alexander, Minneapolis attorney who submitted the list of 25 Knowland delegates, said it was aimed not against President Eisenhower, whose slate was filed recently, but as an "insurance" move to:

Provide a Republican contest and to guard against "having to submit to an unwanted favorite son candidate" in the event Eisenhower withdraws.

He did not elaborate on the "unwanted" in his statement. The Eisenhower delegate listing is topped by the name of Sen. Thye (R-Minn.). It was filed by the state GOP organization. Should the President fail to withdraw by Feb. 25, the deadline, both the Eisenhower and Knowland delegations would go onto the ballots.

Sen. Knowland himself previously has indicated he would withdraw from all primary activities if the President announces he will run again.

There is also a Democratic contest in the primary, with Adlai Stevenson and Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) competing, Stevenson with the backing of the state Democratic-Farmer-Labor party.

The Knowland filing was made just 23 minutes before the entry deadline.

Alexander said it was aimed to give a chance for expression to those favoring the Bricker amendment, those against recognition by of Red China, those objecting to the spending of resources in foreign areas, and to those who "believe it is high time for our country to end its leftist movement."
